Program Delivery

The program will be delivered using Wimba Live Classroom, a real-time, virtual classroom. Wimba can be used on any computer that meets the requirements listed. Participants will need access to an active Internet connection that has Internet access at 56K or above, windows 2000+, Mac OSX 10.2+ or Linux, 128 MB RAM (256 MB recommended) and IE 5.0+, Netscape 7.0+, Mozilla 1.0+ (Browser must be Java and Javascript enabled). One could use a computer at a library or extension office. It is easy-to-use and is interactive
