We'd like to remind all Master Gardener's that these publications are available and recommend them to anyone who may be canning to help prevent anyone from getting sick from improperly preserved food. We had a good turnout for the Demonstration Garden potluck and fall planning meeting. We reviewed plans for this fall and for next year, including swapping the location of the Food Pantry garden with the Theme Garden, and the 'Character Counts' color theme for the 2010 Theme Garden, with help from the classes at Valerius Elementary School. Thanks goes to Cindy Miller for helping to coordinate. If anyone is interested in assisting on the Theme and Food Pantry gardens, please let me know. I also have an opening in the Ring Around the Rosey garden.

We also had a great day on September 19 to rejuvenate the iris, hemerocallis and Asiatic lily beds. The new 'bulb bed' has been reworked and replanted, with some of the same plants as well as daffodils, more irises, Oriental lilies, alliums and will be the future site of summer bulbs. Thanks to Clel Ruppert for his donation of surprise lilies, and to the Master Gardeners who assisted with the renovation: Aaron Bewyer, Marj Akers, Sharon Cummins, Linda Thomas, interns Jennifer, Linda and Phil Murphy, Cindi Larson and Janet Piller. It will be a lot of work on a few remaining Saturdays (Oct. 3, 17 and 31); October 31 also is the date of the fall cleanup, starting at 9 a.m. Thanks for your ideas!

Botanical Center Grounds News

Well, all you have to do is look around you and the signs of fall are everywhere. You can feel and smell it in the air right now. One of the things always amazes me in the fall - a weed that germinated such a short time ago, and may be only a couple inches or so tall, will still set seeds, when normally at maturity it would be two or more feet tall. It's like a baby having babies. But their mission and connection with the time of year are so strong, that they know their days are numbered; few die from frost without first fulfilling their destiny to go to seed. I bring this up since it is the time of year we tend to let our guard down and stop removing those pesky weeds - especially the little ones - as frost will soon get them. This is poor logic, as the seed remains viable even though the parent plant has died. So, even though the threat of first frost is ever growing closer and all those pesky weeds will die, we must remember that their ability to infest our soil with new seed remains unless the seed is removed before it drops to the ground.

Miscellaneous Bits!

Free Sedum! Pam Heilskov has 3 large containers of "orphan" tall, red-headed sedum from a bed redesign. They can be picked up ANYTIME from the driveway at: 755 NE Spring St. in Ankeny. If I get home from work and they are gone, I know that they have found a good home! Directions: From the 1st St. exit from I-35 (exit 92) drive north on Delaware Ave. to NE 47th St.; turn left (west) about 4 blks to Briarwood Dr.; turn right (north) on Briarwood to NE Spring St. (first street going west); turn left (west) just around the corner. The plants are on the driveway of the first (corner) twinhome on the south side—west unit. You cannot miss them! The neighbors will be forever grateful if the sedum finds a new home.

Pam also has a question for the group: Has anyone ever used the deep window wells for egress windows as a place to overwinter potted plants (geraniums, mums, etc.)? I am going to try setting some out there on the gravel, covering the well with clear plastic, and opening the window a crack for heat just to see if it's a viable option. I have a "well" on the south and one on the west. I think I will put out a thermometer as well. Not sure about the ventilation. I know that they sell hard plastic covers for these large wells, but want to be sure a person can still climb out in case of emergencies.
