4-H BUILDING EXHIBITS

GENERAL 4-H RULES AND REGULATIONS

Exhibits will be judged on the Tuesday before the fair, according to the judging schedule posted in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.

1. This department is open to youth who are participating in 4-H Youth Development Programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension. All exhibitors must be enrolled in 4-H/FFA/FCCLA during the current year and have signed "Iowa Youth Code of Ethics" on file at the Extension Office.
2. All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the 4-H General Rules and Regulations and all 4-H department exhibit class rules and regulations.
3. The following general rules and regulations apply to the following departments: Animal Science, Agriculture & Natural Resources, Creative Arts, Family & Consumer Sciences, Personal Development and Science, Engineering & Technology. 4-H'ers must also follow the specific rules in the individual departments, classes, and lots.
4. 4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) are eligible to exhibit at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Group exhibits from an entire club may include 4th grade members.
5. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H'ers participation in 4-H projects or programs during the current 4-H year. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project or program. The exhibitor should determine the class that relates to their goal. Exhibits cannot be in more than one class.
6. Exhibits that do not comply with the class description, size guidelines, copyright, safety, and approved methods will be disqualified and not put on public display.

7. Copyrighted materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits. (See also special rules for Visual Arts and general copyright information for 4-H'ers.)
8. Endangered and threatened plants and animals (includes insects), or songbird feathers and nests may NOT be used in any exhibit. Wild flowers taken from parks should NOT be used. Game animals "legally taken", such as pheasant, duck, goose, and quail are acceptable. Purple loosestrife (*Lythrum salicaria*) is a plant that should not be planted in gardens. It has a potential of becoming noxious in Iowa.
9. Due to security, we discourage 4-H'ers from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as the exhibit or part of an exhibit. The Cherokee County Fair and Iowa State University Extension will use diligence to insure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement, but will not be responsible for damage or loss by fire, theft, etc.
10. Large items such as tractors, outdoor equipment, etc., may be displayed outside the exhibit buildings.
Exhibitors of large exhibits selected for the Iowa State Fair will be requested to transport them to and from the State Fair.
12. The 4-H'ers goal and applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance and design. Exhibitors will receive written evaluation comments on the exhibits and a blue, red, or white ribbon. Refer to exhibit class evaluation criteria in each class. This information is located on each 4-H project page at <http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/projects>.
13. A written explanation, an audio cassette, or video tape is to be included as part of each exhibit. The exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit:
 - A. What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?)
 - B. What steps did you take to learn or do this?
 - C. What were the most important things you learned?

Exhibitors are encouraged to check for additional requirements in exhibit classes for Visual Arts, Clothing & Fashion, Home Improvement, and Sewing and Needlework.

"Exhibit Goal" sheets containing the three questions are available from club leaders, the Cherokee County Extension website and the Cherokee County Extension Office. **THIS FORM MUST BE ATTACHED TO YOUR ENTRY!**

These forms are also acceptable to place in the member's record keeping system when fair is over.

14. All exhibits, activities, and programs must represent appropriate safety procedures in the development of the exhibit and during the evaluation process. This includes static exhibits and activities revolving around the communications program.
15. Exhibit classes are broad categories. To plan exhibits, 4-H'ers are encouraged to use project guides and manuals and program materials to determine goals and learning experiences. Some project manuals include specific exhibit suggestions and procedures. An exhibit can represent an idea, a part, or all learning involved in the respective project or program. The Cherokee County Extension Office has more information on exhibits.
16. Members are not limited to one entry per class, but a variety of techniques is strongly recommended.
17. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - * Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size.
 - * Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48" x 48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (unfolded) dimensions.
 - * Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" in height or width and 12" in depth.
18. Each club will be assigned an entry and judging time. All members in a club will be expected to enter at that assigned time. Anyone coming in for judging after the last scheduled club will be disqualified, unless arrangements have been made prior to judging day. A judge will evaluate the exhibits with the member. Ribbons will be awarded at that time.
19. All exhibits must remain in place until 4:00 p.m. on the Sunday of the Cherokee County Fair but removed before 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. If the exhibitor is unable to be present to pick up the exhibits, she/he must arrange for someone else to pick them up. If exhibits are removed early, the 4-H'er will forfeit 4-H Foundation premiums and lose State Fair eligibility.
20. "Reduce, Reuse, Repurpose" awards will be given to exhibits that follow the principles of reducing, reusing, and/or recycling. These exhibits may include: exhibits demonstrating ways of reducing waste, exhibits demonstrating ways of reusing objects, and exhibits demonstrating recycling techniques and practices.

An exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above.

CREATIVE ARTS

610 Music

An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangements, instruments, musical styles or history.

620 Photography

Project Page: <http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/projects/photography.htm>

An exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display, that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only, not video.

- * Photographs may be either black and white or color. They may be processed from negatives, slides, or digital cameras and computer manipulation programs. Photographs must have been taken since the county fair of the previous year.
 - * Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally. 4-Hers are responsible for design decisions such as border, color and size. Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.
 - * Non-mounted photos may be exhibited in a clear plastic covering, such as a page protector or zip-loc baggie. No shrink wrap please.
 - * A series is a group of photographs or slides [3 to 5] that are related or tell a step-by-step story. Photographs must be mounted together in story order or sequence. Slides should be numbered.
 - * Digitally altered photos should include a copy of the photo before changes.
- Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.

630 Visual Arts

An exhibit that shows learning through original art, exploration of an art technique, or study of any other visual arts topic.

- * All exhibitors are to include 2 Design Elements and 2 Art Principles in their write-up on the Goal Sheet. For more information be sure to check the project page, contact your leader or the Extension Office.
- * Exhibits made from kits or preformed molds will not be accepted. They have their own category "Kit Korner". Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, whiteware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.
- * If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source or inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included.
- * Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist, or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.
- Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H'er is prohibited without the written permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibits is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner. FAMILY & CONSUMER SCIENCES

710 Child Development

740 Food & Nutrition

An exhibit that shows learning through cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, including safety practices. Exhibits may include prepared products or educational displays. See also 4-H 3023 "Inappropriate Food Exhibits for Iowa 4-H Fairs" for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products.

- * 4-H'ers are to bring the entire prepared product to the fair. Once it is judged, they will be allowed to leave a portion for display and take the rest home.
- * Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- * All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
- * Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.
- * Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- * Meat jerky products are prohibited.
- * The recipe must be included for any prepared food exhibit; credit the source of the recipe.
- * Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2010 is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used.
- * Preserved food exhibits must include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display. Exhibitors will leave a portion of the perishable food for display, and can take the rest home.

- Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a reclosable plastic bag with the goal sheet attached to the outside.
- The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

- * Only one poster per 4-H'er may be entered.
- * All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board. Size minimum of 14" x 20" or maximum of 15" x 22". Posters may be vertical or horizontal. Posters may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage.
- * Posters **cannot** be 3-dimensional. materials used to make the poster may not extend more than 1/8 inch above the poster or foam core board.
- * Each poster must have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.
- * Posters **cannot** use copyrighted material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
- * 4-H'ers may include the 4-H clover in the poster. The 4-H Clover is a protected emblem. 4-H'ers may not copy/print other material over the 4-H clover.
- * The themes for "Communicating Through 4-H Posters" are:
 - a. 4-H is . . . (open to 4-H'ers interpretation)
 - b. Join 4-H
 - c. *Aiming for Adventure* (2011 Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme)

Topics include aerospace, biological and chemical sciences, computers & networking, earth & climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS), robotics, or any other application of Science, Engineering, or Technology.

CLOTHING EVENT

* The Clothing Event consists of 3 age groups: Junior (grades 4-6), Intermediate (grades 7-8), and Senior (grades 9-12).

* The Clothing Event consists of 3 classes: Constructed, Selected, and \$15 Challenge

* Judging for the Clothing Event will take place prior to the fair. The results will be announced at the Clothing Revue Style Show.

* Participants are highly encouraged to be in the Clothing Revue Style Show at the Cherokee County Fair. See the fair schedule for date and time.

* Clothing Event projects may also be entered as an exhibit in the "Clothing and Fashion" class.

* Entries must be made on the Clothing Event Entry Blank. The due date for entries is June 17th.

* Participants will be evaluated on the following:

- a.) Learning to Communicate—goals, knowledge, confidence
- b.) Developing Individual Self-esteem—grooming, posture, poise
- c.) Making Decisions about Appearance and Design—clothing/fabric choices, fit of garment
- d.) Choosing Clothes for Specific Occasions or Purposes—appropriateness of outfit and accessories
- e.) Identifying Quality Garment Features—knowledge of quality features of garment and fiber content
- f.) Managing to Get your Money's Worth—cost of clothing, budget

Class A Constructed Garment/Outfit

* 4-H'ers may model a garment or outfit they have constructed, hand-knitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted themselves during the current 4-H year.

* A garment or outfit consisting of one to three pieces such as party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear, and/or coats are acceptable entries.

* A garment such as a vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, dress, coat, etc. is an acceptable entry.

* Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered as garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected.

* All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected by the member.

Class B Selected Garment/Outfit

* 4-H'ers may model a selected and/or purchased outfit that represents the 4-H'ers goal or intended use for the selected outfit.

* The outfit may be selected and/or purchased from any source, including clothing store, department store, consignment shops, used clothing stores, etc.

* Clothing items which are home-sewn are not eligible unless the completed garment was purchased from a used clothing source. Clothing items which are custom sewn specifically for the participant are not eligible.

* Gifts of clothing are eligible, only if the 4-H'er was actively involved in the selection of the garment/outfit.

Class C \$15 Challenge

* Cost of outfit must be \$15 or less, not including shoes, accessories or undergarments. Receipt(s) **MUST** be turned in with the 4-H Clothing Event Report Form.

* 4-H'ers may model an outfit they have selected and/or purchased within the current 4-H year from a garage sale, consignment sale, or resale shop (i.e. Goodwill, Salvation Army or other stores of this type) that represents the 4-H'er's goal or intended use for the selected outfit. Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts that were selected by the 4-H'er belong in Clothing Selection.

COMMUNICATIONS

The Communication Department is designed to provide opportunities for youth to select a method by which they might develop their personal communication skills in sharing talents, knowledge, or information with others. The classes are designed to provide a series of developmental experiences for various age levels. The ability to communicate will be the major criteria for evaluating this department.

* Entries for this department must be made on the appropriate forms and returned to the Cherokee County Extension Office. The due date for entries is June 17th.

* The following premiums will be paid on an individual basis for the Communications Department:

Blue Ribbon	\$3.00
Red Ribbon	\$2.00
White Ribbon	\$1.00

* Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits may be given by one or more 4-H'ers. Teams consisting of youth of mixed grades will be entered in the class of the member in the highest grade level (i.e. a team with a 5th grader and an 8th grader must be entered in the intermediate/senior class).

* 4-H'ers are encouraged to wear appropriate clothing representative of the 4-H Youth Program and/or the topic of the presentation. If clothing contributes to the topic being presented, such as wearing a beekeepers' outfit while doing a presentation on bee raising, a 4-H'er is encouraged to wear such clothing. Where distinctive clothing is not involved, clothing that alerts the public it is a 4-H'er giving a presentation is strongly encouraged.

Educational Presentations

Provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience in order to gain a desired response.

881 Educational Presentations (Junior, 4-6 grade)

Junior presentations must not exceed 15 minutes.

882 Educational Presentations (Intermediate/Senior, 7-12 grade)

Intermediate/Senior Presentations must not exceed 20 minutes.

*** Presenters are expected to comply with all copyright/trademark regulations. Copyrighted material may not be distributed without permission.**

* Cherokee County may send six Educational Presentations to the Iowa State Fair and one entry to the Clay County Fair. This is up to the judges' discretion. Those selected for the State Fair will receive purple rosettes and those selected for Clay County will receive lavender rosettes.

*A trophy in memory of Clarence Alquist will be awarded at the 4-H Awards Ceremony to the 4-H'er(s) giving the Most Outstanding Educational Presentation.

Working Exhibits

Provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to communicate, interact with, and teach an audience in an informal and experiential way.

883 Working Exhibit (Junior, 4-6 grade)

884 Working Exhibit (Intermediate/Senior, 7-12 grade)

*** Presenters are expected to comply with all copyright/trademark regulations. Copyrighted material may not be distributed without permission.**

* Working Exhibits will be scheduled for a 30 minute period.

* The best subjects involve action by the members to involve the audience in some doing, feeling, smelling, or judging.

* Cherokee County may send four entries to the Iowa State Fair and one entry to the Clay County Fair. This is up to the judges' discretion. Those selected for the State Fair will receive purple rosettes and those selected for Clay County will receive lavender rosettes.

Share the Fun

Provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to share their skills and talents before an audience purely for the sake of enjoyment.

885 Share –the– Fun Program

* This can be a club or individual entry. If the Share-the-Fun act involves a whole club, the following criteria must be applied to determine if the club can be entered in the Share-the-Fun Program at the Iowa State Fair.

* Share-the-Fun performances must not exceed eight minutes in length.

* Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act plays, dance, and other entertainment will be acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.

* Cherokee County may send three entries to the Iowa State Fair and one entry to the Clay County Fair. This is up to the judges' discretion. Those selected for the State Fair will receive purple rosettes and those selected for Clay County will receive lavender rosettes.

Extemporaneous Speaking

Encourage the development of communication skills by providing an opportunity to think, organize thoughts, prepare a speech, and respond to questions when given a limited amount of preparation time.

886 Extemporaneous Speaking Program

* Participants must be senior 4-H'ers , who have completed 9th-12th grades.

* Program Format:

a.) Thirty minutes before the program, each participant will draw three of the available topics, selecting one to speak on. The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H. The selected topic will not be available to the other participants.

b.) A preparation room will be available. A participant may not leave the preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help from a parent, leader, other adult, or any other youth. Each participant will have 30 minutes preparation time.

c.) All reference material will be screened by a program official on the following basis:

* Participant may bring his/her own books, magazines or newspaper clippings for reference during the thirty minutes of preparation.

* Reference material must be printed material such as books or magazines (cannot be notes, outlines or speeches prepared by the participant or by another person for use in this program.)

* Some relevant reference material may be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historical material related to the 4-H program.

d.) Each speech shall be the result of the 4-H'ers own efforts using approved reference material that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided. Plain 3" x 5" note cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. If notes are used, the 3" x 5" note cards provided must be used in delivering the speech.

e.) Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.

f.) Each speech shall be not less than four but no more than six minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the judge. The participant will be shown time cards in an ascending order (1,2,3,4,5) by the time keeper. "Stop" will be said at six minutes.

g.) The program time keeper will introduce each participant by name and the club he/she represents. The participant will be expected to introduce his/her speech by title only.

h.) Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters or audiovisuals of any sort. A podium will not be available.

* Speeches will be evaluated using the following criteria:

* A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included as a part of the program.

* Cherokee County may send two entries to the Iowa State Fair. This is up to the judge's discretion.

PRIDE OF IOWA

This class encourages participation at the county fair and helps acquaint 4-H'ers with products grown or produced in Iowa. This class also serves as a first step in communications exhibits.

2012 Theme for Pride of Iowa "Wrap it Up"
Entrants interpretation of "Wrap it Up"

* Entrants must be enrolled in 4-H. 4th graders are encourage to enter. Entries may be made as an individual or as a team. The team can be any number of members and a mix of age levels.

* The 4-H'er must submit their entry on the Pride of Iowa entry form due into the Extension Office by June 17th. The entry must include the recipe and the recipe must include one ingredient that is a product of Iowa. Examples would include beef, pork, turkey, lamb, dairy, eggs, corn or fruits and veggies. This would include items grown in your garden.

* The member prepares or demonstrates how to make the recipe at the contest. The member is not required to narrate or give a verbal presentation. However, they should be prepared to answer the questions fair goers or judges might ask. The recipe should be relatively simple to prepare and should be appropriate to the age and skill of the member.

* Samples of the finished recipe should be given away to fair goers. It is suggested that you have enough "samples" to serve approximately 75 people. Some of the samples can be prepared ahead of the contest.

* Members must supply their own folding table(s) not to exceed a total of six feet (for demonstrating and serving), food ingredients, and equipment. Ingredients can be partially prepared ahead of the contest, (nuts chopped, meat precooked, mushrooms drained, etc) but the ingredients of the recipe must be mixed together at the fair during the time of presentation.

* Each entry must have a poster with their name(s), recipe, and club they are representing displayed.

* A panel of volunteers from the county will serve as judges. Criteria for judging will include

- a.) taste and flavor of the product
- b.) attractiveness of display area
- c.) use of theme and originality
- d.) enthusiasm of the entrants
- e.) serving and food safety
- f.) recipe appropriate to age and skill

* All participants will receive "Participation Ribbons" and a \$2.00 participant premium.

* Judges will award 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place. 1st place will receive Grand Champion rosettes and \$15 in prize money. 2nd place will receive Reserve Grand Champion rosettes and \$10 in prize money. 3rd place will receive white ribbons and \$5 in prize money. The top three prize monies are sponsored by Jerry & Micky Conley & Family.

CONSUMER JUDGING CONTEST

* The contest is open to any 4-H member and/or FFA/FHA member enrolled in Cherokee County and adults.

* The contest will be on the Tuesday of the fair from 10:00 a.m. – 2:30 p.m. and Friday, from 6-8 p.m. in the 4-H buildings.

* All 4-H/FFA/FHA and adult entrants will be considered for individual awards.

* The contest will consist of judging classes in 4-H project areas.

* Certificates will be awarded to the top ten placings of Junior 4-H'ers, Intermediate/ Senior 4-H'ers and FFA/FHA members, and adults.

* No premiums are paid for the Consumer Judging Contest.

* Results of the contest will be posted in the South 4-H Building. certificates will be presented at the Clothing Revue on Saturday during the fair.

* The top five Junior 4-H'ers and the top 5 Intermediate/Senior 4-H'ers will be able to advance on to the District Consumer Judging Contest at the Clay County Fair in September.

BEAUTIFUL BUCKETS (county class only, not eligible for State Fair)

In this contest, participants decorate a three to five gallon bucket (available at discount stores or reuse the bucket from last year) to coordinate with the current year's theme.

* All entries will arrive during static judging on Tuesday.

* The 2011 theme is "Aim for Adventure" or a theme of your choice.

* Participants should use live plant material of their choice.

UGLY CAKE CONTEST (county class only, not eligible for State Fair)

Cakes should be brought to the North 4-H Building on Tuesday evening from 5-7 p.m. or Wednesday morning from 10-noon.

(Ribbons will be awarded. No Premiums)

Ugliness is in the mind of the beholder (or in this case, the Judge). The Ugly Cake Contest will accept entries that are ugly or gross.

* All cakes must be ugly. No pretty or average looking cakes. Cakes will be judged on their ugly appearance and must taste good. All cakes will remain on display the entire fair.

* All cakes must be entered in one of the following age groups:

Ages 5-8 Ages 9-13 Ages 14-18 Ages 19 and older

* 4-H membership is not a requirement for this department. Adults are encouraged to participate.

* Cakes can be homemade or from a package mix. The ENTIRE cake and decorations must be edible. Cakes with non-edible decorations or foreign objects will be DISQUALIFIED!

* Cakes must arrive at the contest on disposable containers such as a cardboard or cake round. Only whole cakes will be accepted.

* Cakes must be given a title. Title of cake should be visible for all to see during the judging period.

KIT KORNER (county class only, not eligible for State Fair)

- * Exhibits in this department are not eligible for the State Fair.
- * Exhibits are made from kits or preformed molds. Evaluation will be based on design of the article, workmanship, and what was learned.
- * The written description of the exhibit must include: the 4-H'ers goal, reason why this exhibit was bought/created, source of idea (or manufacturer of kit), and what was learned by creating this exhibit (technique practiced, etc.).
- * All exhibits must be labeled with 4-H'ers NAME and CLUB and a goal sheet.

CLOVER KIDS FAIR SHOWCASE

Entry on Tuesday, July 5th, 2011
from 5-7 PM in the North 4-H Building

1. Open to all children in Kindergarten through third grade in Cherokee County.
2. Clover Kids will have the opportunity to discuss their showcase items with a caring adult as items are entered.
3. There is no limit to the number of showcase items entered by a Clover Kid; however all items must be made by the Clover Kid under adult supervision. (Items may be made at Clover Kids, at home, in school, at day care, or at camp.)
4. Showcase items may be entered on Tuesday, July 5th, from 5:00PM to 7:00PM at the Cherokee County Fair Grounds in the North 4-H Building. Contact the Cherokee County Extension Office at (712)225-6196 or the 4-H Fair Office for directions.
5. All showcase items will receive a participation ribbon. No premium money will be given for these items.
6. Showcase items will be on display at the Cherokee County Fair until 4:00PM, Sunday, July 10. Items may be picked up at this time. Items not picked up at the Fair Grounds will be available for pick-up at the Cherokee County Extension Office during normal office hours.
7. The Cherokee County Extension Office and the Cherokee County Fair Board will use diligence to ensure the safety of all items entered at the Cherokee County Fair; however we are not responsible for damage or loss by fire, theft, etc.
8. Showcase items may be in any of the following categories:

Class A: Animals

Showcase items related to all species and types of animals. The actual animal may not be brought to the fair.

Class B: Creative Arts

Showcase items related to art, photography, and music.

Class C: Agriculture and Natural Resources

Showcase items related to plants, agriculture, and the environment.
Notice: Due to the risk of bringing live plants to the county fair, you will be totally responsible for the care of your plant(s) while they are at the fair.

Class D: Family and Consumer Science

Showcase items related to food, clothing, or home decorating. Sewn or home-crafted items can be included in this class.

Class E: Personal Development

etc. Showcase items related to or created by you, such as stories, poems,

Class F: Science, Engineering, and Technology

Showcase items related to science or technology or items that you have designed and built, such as wood items.

Class G: Other

Showcase items that are not included under any of the above areas.

Clover Kids Stuffed Animal Pet Show

1. Open to all children in Kindergarten through third grade in Cherokee County. No pre-fair entry is required.
2. Clover Kids will have the opportunity to show the audience their stuffed animal and discuss the animal with a caring adult.
3. Clover Kids may enter the Stuffed Animal Pet Show at 1:00 PM on Saturday, July 9th. The show will be held at 1:30 PM Saturday. Registration and the show will take place in the North 4-H Building.
4. Participants will receive a participation ribbon. No premium money will be given.

4-H LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS

GENERAL 4-H RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All exhibitors must be enrolled in 4-H/FFA during the current year and have a signed "Iowa Youth Code of Ethics" on file at the Extension Office.
2. 4-H'ers in grades 4th-12th are eligible to show. All members must exhibit their own project unless excused by the general superintendent. Anyone assisting with the showing of livestock must be a 4-H or FFA member in good standing in Cherokee County.
3. Animals must be identified on the proper 4-H Identification form by May 15th of the current year in order to be eligible for any fair class. Market Beef, Market Sheep, and Meat Goats were ID'd at their respective weigh-ins.
4. All 4-H livestock show entries MUST be made through the County Extension Office on the correct Fair Entry Form and accompanied by the proper entry fee by 4:30 p.m. on June 17th. No late entries will be accepted.
5. All livestock must be accompanied by a signed health certificate, available from your local veterinarian, which must be turned in to the Cherokee County Extension Office before the fair. The due date will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.
6. 4-H'ers exhibiting swine, beef, sheep, dairy (cattle and goat), rabbits, meat goats, and poultry at the county fair, Iowa State Fair or Clay County Fair are required to have 4-H FSQA certification.

The guidelines for FSQA are:

* Youth, grades 4-6th, must recertify annually by attending a FSQA training class.

* Youth, grades 7-9th, can attend a training class annually or complete the intermediate test which will certify them until they are in the 10th grade.

* Youth, grades 10-12th, can attend a training class annually or complete the senior test which will certify them until they are age 19.

7. Stalls will be assigned by clubs. All calves must be tied in the assigned stall. All other livestock must be in the appropriate pen.
8. Weigh-in times in ALL livestock classes will be strictly observed. All weights must be recorded by the superintendent in charge.
9. No advertising of feeds or commercial products will be permitted in connection with the 4-H and FFA shows.
10. It is strongly recommended that wood shavings or wood chips be used for bedding. Bedding will NOT be available at the fairgrounds.
11. Club members will furnish their own feed, pails, feed boxes, hay troughs, forks, rakes, showing equipment, manure handling equipment, wood chip bedding, etc. All equipment should be labeled with the exhibitor's name. Exhibitors should take home all equipment and feed not used.
12. Gates on the barns will be closed at 10:30 p.m. and everyone is to be out of the barn by that time. No 4-H exhibitor can stay overnight at the fairgrounds.
13. Only one fan will be allowed per animal. All fans must be securely mounted off the floor with protective screening and safe wiring.
14. The Dress Code for the show arena: All 4-H exhibitors will present themselves in an image appropriate to 4-H while in the show arena. Example: green or white 4-H shirt with appropriate jeans or slacks (without holes, tears or fraying edges), and hard sole shoes. No hats are to be in the show arena.

Exhibitor number must be displayed on the back of the exhibitor. **Horse and dairy exhibitors please see special dress requirements under your department.**
15. Any animal that is not under control of the showman shall not be exhibited. The decision shall be made by the superintendent in charge.
16. Any attempt to change color of hair, or to alter the normal appearance of animals can result in disqualification. Exhibitors can use colored grooming aids on hooves only.
17. No drugs or medicines of any kind may be administered except by the order of the official fair veterinarian.
18. No unnatural means of providing an animal feed or water, i.e. stomach, I.V., etc. will be allowed except by the order of the official fair veterinarian.
19. All livestock exhibitors and their parents will sign an insurance release form at the time of entry. The Fair Board will not be held responsible for damage or injury due to animals exhibited.
20. All livestock will be released on Sunday of the fair at 4 p.m. Removal of 4-H live stock before the designated dismissal time will result in forfeiture of fair premiums and Foundation premiums, unless the proper form is completed, approved

The only dogs allowed on the fairgrounds are those entered in competition or guide dogs for the disabled.

22. All exhibits must be in place by the time assigned in the fair schedule.
23. The Association is not responsible for damage or loss of exhibits, but will use care to insure their safety.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK, POULTRY, AND BIRDS AT THE CHEROKEE COUNTY FAIR

Any evidence of warts, ringworm, foot rot, pink eye, draining abscesses, or any other contagious or infectious condition will eliminate the animal from the show.

All livestock must be accompanied by a signed Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, available from their local veterinarian, on entry day. Health certificates for 4-H animals are due to the Extension Office by the date announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter. If an exhibitor does not have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for his or her livestock project, they will not be permitted to exhibit that project.

Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.

BREEDING BEEF: Cattle originating from a herd, or area, not under quarantine can be exhibited without other testing requirements when accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, showing individual identity. Cattle from a herd, or area, under quarantine for tuberculosis may not be exhibited.

DAIRY: Dairy animals must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, showing individual identification for each animal, and originate from a herd not under quarantine.

DOGS AND CATS: All dogs and cats exhibited must have a current rabies and distemper vaccination certificate. Dogs also need a parvovirus vaccination.

GOATS: All sexually intact goats must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag or an official tattoo registered with USDA (To request free scrapies tags, call 1-866-873-2824).

HORSES AND MULES: All horses shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with individual identification or a description of the individual animal.

These requirements apply to all horses entering the fairgrounds.

MARKET BEEF: Steers and beef-type heifers exhibited in market classes must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, showing individual identification for each animal, and originate from a herd not under quarantine.

POULTRY AND BIRDS: All poultry exhibited must come from U. S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean or equivalent flocks, or have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within 90 days of public exhibition and the test must have been performed by an authorized tester.

RABBIT: All rabbits must be healthy and free of contagious or infectious conditions.

SHEEP: All animals must be individually identified on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and originate from herds or areas not under quarantine. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for sheep will require clinical inspection by an accredited veterinarian within 14 days prior to date of entry to exhibition grounds. All sexually intact sheep must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag. (To request free scrapies tags, call 1-866-873-2824) **Any evidence of club lamb fungus, ringworm, draining abscesses, foot rot, sore mouth, or any other contagious disease will eliminate the animal from the show.**

SWINE: All swine must be vaccinated for erysipelas at least 30 days prior to show. All swine exhibited must be accompanied by a record of a negative pseudorabies test, the test having been performed within 30 days prior to show, for swine originating from a Stage 4 or lower status county. No pseudorabies testing is required for swine originating from a Stage 5 county. (Iowa is Stage 5.)

OTHER SPECIES: Other species must be healthy and free of contagious or infectious conditions and comply with any inspection/health requirements specific to that par-

ticular species.

THE DECISION OF THE OFFICIAL SHOW VETERINARIAN WILL BE FINAL.
HEALTH REQUIREMENTS MAY BE REVISED ONLY BY OFFICIAL FAIR VETERINARIAN.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Adopted by the Association of Iowa Fairs, December 2002.

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. **This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show.** In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial, and national levels. **All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts.** Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. **Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues.** The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. **Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules.** Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association

of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions, and any special notices to members.

11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

HERDSMANSHIP AWARDS

Herdsmanship, which insures a safe and healthy environment for livestock projects, is an important part of the Cherokee County Fair. Although maintaining the environment may take some work, it is worth the effort. It demonstrates the exhibitor's dedication to his or her livestock and represents a positive image of the livestock industry to the public.

Exhibitors are expected to keep their stall and barn presentable at all times. To encourage this, awards will be given daily to individuals who display the best herdsman-ship. A special committee will observe the barns on Wednesday evening, Thursday through Saturday between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m., and Sunday between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

The individuals will be judged on four (4) different categories.

1. **Cleanliness:** proper amount of clean bedding, feed boxes clean, manure hauled out and deposited in proper place, and alleys clean.
2. **Arrangement of exhibit:** exhibits attractively arranged; cords and grooming equipment not cluttering alley; forks, brooms, show boxes, feed and watering equipment neatly stored when not in use; and exhibitor's stall card attached over stalls or above pens.
3. **Animal Care:** animals clean and brushed, adequate feeding equipment, securely tied or penned.
4. **Attendants:** present and courteous while interacting with the public and other exhibitors, work being done by exhibitor.

Exhibitors from each species will be chosen as "Outstanding Herdsmen of the Day" and will receive a food certificate. Certificates must be picked up at the 4-H Fair Office following posting of the previous day's winners.

SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

1. Four top showmen, two juniors and two seniors, will be selected for beef, dairy, exotic animals, horse, meat goats, poultry, rabbit, sheep, and swine during the regular showing on the following points:

A. Fitting an Animal

1. Condition

3. Grooming

- 2. Training
- 4. Doing one's own work
- B. Show Ring Performance
 - 1. Performance of animal
 - 2. Presentation of animal
 - 3. Alertness of showman
 - 4. Sportsmanship of showman
 - 5. Appearance of showman
 - 6. Equipment
- 2. Juniors are those exhibitors who have completed grades 4-8. Seniors are those exhibitors who have completed grades 9-12.
- 3. Senior Showmanship contest will be held first in all species followed by the Junior Showmanship contest.

LIVESTOCK JUDGING CONTEST

District 4-H/FFA Livestock Judging Contest – Registration 11:30 a.m.-12:15 p.m.; Contest – 12:30 p.m.

- 1. Contest is open to any 4-H or FFA member enrolled in Cherokee County or the Northwest Iowa Extension area.
- 2. Results announced after the conclusion of the contest will be considered official and final.
- 3. The following 4-H discs will be awarded by the Cherokee County 4-H Foundation at the County Awards Program to county 4-H winners.

1st Place - Plaque & Gold Disc	3rd Place - Bronze Disc
2nd Place - Silver Disc	4th Place - Bronze Disc
- 4. District contest trophies and ribbons are sponsored by the Cherokee County Fair Board.
 - Trophies for 1st and 2nd place teams and individuals
 - Ribbons for 1st - 5th place team and 1st - 10th place individuals

BREEDING BEEF

- 1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
- 2. This species requires FSQA (Food Safety Quality Assurance) training. See rule #6 of the General Livestock Rules & Regulations for details.
- 3. It is recommended that animals be double tied.
- 4. All commercial breeding heifers will be in one class unless there is an adequate number of entries to class by weight.
- 5. Purebred/registered breeding heifer identification must include tattoo number, ear tattooed (left/right/both), birth date, breed, and registration number. Calfhood vaccination tattoo is not an acceptable identification.
- 6. Commercial breeding heifer identification must include birth date along with either an individual ear tag number and ear tagged (left/right/both), or individual tattoo number and ear tattooed (left/right/both). (Commercial heifers shown at Ak-Sar-Ben and the Iowa State Fair must be tattooed.)

7. The Beef Show Committee reserves the right to combine Class C-Purebred/Registered and Class D-Commercial if numbers warrant.
8. The Supreme Breeding Champion Class will consist of Overall Champion Commercial Heifer, all Breed Champions, and Foundation Cow/Calf Champion competing for the Supreme Breeding Champion. (Animals in Class A – Calf Selection are not eligible.)
9. A \$200 U. S. Savings Bond and a \$100 U. S. Savings Bond will be awarded to the exhibitor(s) showing the Supreme Breeding Champion and Reserve Champion respectively in memory of long-time cattleman Les Gregg.
10. A Champion and Reserve Champion County Drop Breeding Female will be selected from all of the commercial and purebred/registered heifers (Classes C & D) and cows (Class B) combined. To be eligible, animals must be born in Cherokee County.
11. Awards and certificates are available through the American Simmental Association, Iowa Maine Anjou Association, Polled Hereford Association, Iowa Limousin Association, and Iowa Angus Auxiliary for Grand and Reserve Champion in each breed. Check with the department chairperson to be sure you are nominated for these awards.

Class A - Calf Selection (only calf exhibited)

Lot 1 - Heifers Lot 2 - Steers/Bulls

1. Calf must be born between January 1 and June 1 of current year.
2. Calf will be exhibited on halter.
3. The entry will be brought to the fair on the day of the show and returned home the same day.
4. Exhibitor must own the calf or own it in partnership with parents.
5. Calf must be identified on the Livestock ID form and calving date indicated. ID forms are due May 15 in the Extension Office.

Class B - Foundation Herd (cow and calf exhibited)

1. Cows must calve between January 1 and June 1 of current year.
2. Cow and calf will be exhibited on halter.
3. Cow must be a previous 4-H heifer project.
4. The entry will be brought to the fair on the day of the show and returned home the same day.
5. Exhibitor must own the cow and calf or own them in partnership with parents.
6. Cow and calf must be identified on the Livestock ID form and calving date indicated. ID forms are due May 15 in the Extension Office.

Class C – Purebred/Registered Breeding Heifer

1. Entries in this class are open to purebred and/or registered heifers born between January 1 and December 31 of the previous year.

2. Registration papers shall be presented to the general superintendent as tattoos are checked on entry day and the papers will show sole ownership or ownership with a parent or guardian.
3. Heifers will be exhibited on halter.
4. Only breeding heifers recognized as registered and eligible to show by their respective Breed Associations will be allowed to compete in the breed classes. A lot will be provided for any breed. Breeds will show in alphabetical order.
5. Heifers shown in this department cannot be shown in any Market Beef class.

Class D - Commercial Breeding Heifer

1. This class is open to all crossbred or non-registered breeding heifers born between January 1 and December 31 of the previous year.
2. Heifers will be exhibited on halter.
3. Heifers shown in this department cannot be shown in any Market Beef class.

Class E – Pen of 3 Breeding Heifers

1. Exhibitors may show one out of the pen as a halter animal.
2. Animals do not need to be halter broke.
3. Heifers shown in this department cannot be shown in any Market Beef class.
4. If needed, class can be divided into Commercial and Purebred animals.
5. It is suggested that 4-H'ers identify 4 animals for the May 15th deadline. Then when it comes time to go to the fair, select the best matching 3.

MARKET BEEF

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. This species requires FSQA (Food Safety Quality Assurance) training. See rule #6 of the General Livestock Rules & Regulations for details.
3. Calves will be judged in weight classes.
4. Calves will be placed in blue, red, and white groupings and premiums will be awarded on the basis of these groupings.
5. Weigh-in dates and entry dates will be announced in the “4-H Highlights” newsletter.
6. Recognition will be given to the top ten calves for Rate-of-Gain in 2 divisions. They are tie animals and Advanced Cattle Feeding
7. All market beef must be weighed and identified on the proper 4-H Identification Form by January 15 in order to be eligible for exhibit. Weigh-in dates will be announced in the “4-H Highlights” newsletter.
8. The Supreme Market Beef Champion Overall Class will consist of the Grand and Reserve Champion Market Heifer, Market Steer, and Market Dairy Steer.

Class A - Advanced Cattle Feeding

Lot 1 – Heifer Pen

Lot 2 – Steer Pen

1. The objective of the advanced cattle feeding program is to make it possible for 4-H or FFA members to feed cattle and market on a business basis.
2. Members are required, to bring the project to the fair. They do not need to be groomed or halter broken.
3. 4-H and FFA members may feed as one pen, three head of cattle, either steers or heifers. Each individual may exhibit two pens.
4. The cattle must be weighed between November 1 and January 15 and a certified scale ticket (example: from any grain elevator) and a sales receipt must be brought to the Cherokee County Extension Office by January 15. The cattle may also be weighed in at the 4-H Market Beef Weigh-In and designated as an Advanced Cattle Feeding project at that time. The cattle need an official 4-H tag. They must be ID'd by January 15 and the tag number and color in their ear noted on the official ID form.
5. At the fair, members will be required to give the history of their project, including management techniques, feeding, and the costs during the year.
6. One animal from the pen of three may be shown on halter in Class B or C. Halter animals from the pen of three must be entered into the correct market class (B or C) on the pre-fair Market Beef entry form. The entry due date will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.
7. Each project will be evaluated on the following 100 point grading system. The management will be scored during the feeding season.

8. Four-week Feed Reports need to be completed by the 4-H'er. Feed records need to be mailed or delivered to the Cherokee County Extension Office within seven working days of completion. 4-H'ers are encouraged to retain a copy of all feed records for their own records.
9. If the project is brought to the fair, it will be evaluated live by the beef judge.
10. Those animals weighed individually at the beef weigh-in will be eligible to compete in the rate-of-gain competition. Rate-of-gain will be in two divisions: advanced cattle feeding and tie calves.
11. Calves should have their own pen at home.
12. If needed, the class will be split into two lots: Steers and Heifers. Heifers must gain 2.0 pounds a day to receive a blue or purple ribbon. Steers must gain 2.2 pounds a day to receive a blue or purple ribbon.
13. Each 4-H'er will be asked to select the top individual(s) from their pen(s). Youth should be able to explain their choice.
14. Exhibitors with cattle ready to market will be required to enter a Beef Carcass Contest. Carcass merit will be determined by the selected packer's grid system and other criteria as determined by the beef judge. Each exhibitor will complete an Iowa Animal Care and Management Disclosure Statement for those animals going to slaughter. Each exhibitor will also be required to provide an affidavit declaring the origin of the cattle to comply with COOL (Country of Origin Labeling) requirements.

15. The Frank Bryant Memorial Award (\$100), sponsored by Robert Bryant, was created in memory of Frank Bryant who was an excellent judge of cattle quality and economic value. He was a good teacher and enjoyed sharing his cattle experiences with younger cattle feeders. This award will be given annually to a 4-H'er in Advanced Cattle Feeding who best carries on the tradition of sharing the cattle feeding experience with younger 4-H members. Each 4-H'er will be evaluated on the following 100 point system:

Class B - Market Heifer

1. A County Drop Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected.
2. Minimum weight 800 pounds. All entries under this weight can be put in a feeder class.
3. A market heifer must gain 2.0 pounds a day from the official county beef weigh-in day to the fair entry day to receive a blue or purple ribbon. Weigh-in dates and entry dates will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.
4. Heifers will be exhibited on halter.
5. There will be a Champion and Reserve Champion selected overall.

Class C - Market Steer

1. A County Drop Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected.
2. Minimum weight 875 pounds. All entries under this weight can be put in a feeder class.
3. A market steer must gain 2.2 pounds a day from the official county weigh-in day to the fair entry day to receive a blue or purple ribbon. Weigh-in dates and entry dates will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.
4. Steers will be exhibited on halter.
5. A Grand and Reserve Champion lightweight, middleweight, and heavyweight steer will be selected. These, plus the Grand and Reserve Champion County Drop calves, will be judged for Grand and Reserve Champion overall.

Class D – Market Dairy Steer

1. Minimum weight 850 pounds. All entries under this weight can be put in a feeder class.
2. Dairy steers must show appropriate breed characteristics.
3. Dairy steers will be divided into weight divisions if appropriate.
4. A dairy steer must gain 2.2 pounds a day from the official county beef weigh-in day to the fair entry date to receive a blue or purple ribbon. Weigh-in dates and entry dates will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.

5. Steers will be shown on halter.
6. There will be a Champion and Reserve Champion selected overall.

DAIRY

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. This species requires FSQA (Food Safety Quality Assurance) training. See rule #6 of the General Livestock Rules & Regulations for details.
3. Dairy exhibitors will wear a white shirt and white or blue jeans.
4. Dairy animals will be classified to their dominating breed characteristics.
5. Dairy animals will be placed by breeds in blue, red, and white groupings and premiums will be awarded on the basis of these groupings.
6. Heifers may be either purebred or grade Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein-Friesian, or Jersey cattle. Purebred papers are not needed.
7. First place winners from Lots 1-4 will compete for Jr. Champion. First place winners from Lots 5-8 will compete for Sr. Champion.
8. The following lots will be combined if there are not sufficient entries:
 - Lot 1 (Junior Heifer Calf) and Lot 2 (Senior Heifer Calf)
 - Lot 6 (3-4 Year-Old Cows) and Lot 7 (Aged Cows)
9. Any yearling heifer that has freshened prior to time of judging must be shown in the 2-year old class.
10. There are special awards for Brown Swiss exhibitors. Please contact the Extension Office for details.
11. Lactating dairy cows may be brought the day of the show and taken home following the show.

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. This species requires FSQA (Food Safety Quality Assurance) training. See rule #6 of the General Livestock Rules & Regulations for details.
3. All sexually intact goats must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag or an official tattoo registered with USDA (To request free scrapies tags, call 1-866-873-2824).
4. Exhibitors will be required to have horns disbudded, dehorned, or tipped blunt on all goats prior to arrival on the grounds.
5. Exhibitors are allowed to use halters or collars in the show ring.

Class B - Market Meat Goats

1. All market meat goats must be weighed and tagged on the Market Sheep and Goat Weigh-in date. The date of the weigh-in will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.
2. Market goats may be doe or wether kids.
3. Goats are to have milk teeth or may have one or both of the milk teeth, but there shall be no evidence of breaking of the skin or eruption of the two permanent front teeth.
4. Market classes will be divided by weight.

BREEDING SHEEP

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. This species requires FSQA (Food Safety Quality Assurance) training. See rule #6 of the General Livestock Rules & Regulations for details.
3. In order to comply with the State Veterinarian regulations, all sheep exhibited must have received their health certificates within 14 days prior to entry day, since sheep health certificates are only valid for 14 days. All sexually intact sheep must be identified with an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag and this number along with a 4-H eartag number must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. To request free scrapies tags, call 1-866-873-2824. The due date for health certificates will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.

Class A - Breeding Ewe Lamb

1. Entries are open to ewe lambs born on or after January 1st of this year and regularly enrolled in a 4-H sheep project. All lambs must be identified at birth. Birth date is to be given on entry form.
2. Lambs may be purebred, crossbred, or grade, but not the same lambs exhibited in the market classes.
3. Ewe lambs must be sheared over whole body with comb, and fed for maximum growth (not fattening) to encourage early sexual maturity.
4. Breeding ewe lamb and yearling classes will be judged on breeding characteristics.
5. Two lambs may be entered.

Class B – Commercial Breeding Yearling

1. Each exhibitor may exhibit two yearlings born between January 1 and June 1 of the previous year. Yearlings will be mouthed. Yearlings should be selected from exhibitor's own breeding flock that were exhibited as breeding ewe lambs at the previous year's Cherokee County Fair.

1. Birth date, ear tag number, and registry number of each yearling ewe/ram and ewe/ram lamb must be given on the entry blank. Sheep must be wearing an Asso-

ciation ear tag at time of showing.

2. Certificate of registry must be presented on the day of entry and must be approved or animals are not eligible to show.
3. Certificate of registry must be in your name.
4. Each exhibitor is allowed three ewe/ram lambs and two yearling ewes/rams to be ID'd by May 15. But exhibitor is allowed to show only two ewe/ram lambs and two yearling ewes/rams at the fair.
5. Entries in ewe/ram lamb classes shall be dropped after January 1st of the current year and from ewes obtained at least three weeks before lambing. Yearling ewes/rams shall be born between September 1 two years ago and August 31 of last year. Not more than one may have been purchased as a yearling by the member.
6. Entry in pair of ewes/rams class may consist of two ewe/ram lambs, two yearlings, or one of each.

MARKET SHEEP

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. This species requires FSQA (Food Safety Quality Assurance) training. See rule #6 of the General Livestock Rules & Regulations for details.
3. All market lambs must be weighed and tagged on the Market Sheep Weigh-in date. The date of the weigh-in will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.
4. A rate-of-gain contest for market lambs will be held with ribbons awarded for 1-10 placings.
5. In order to comply with the State Veterinarian regulations, all sheep exhibited must have received their health certificates within 14 days prior to entry day, since sheep health certificates are only valid for 14 days. All sexually intact sheep must be identified with an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag and this number along with a 4-H eartag number must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. To request free scrapies tags, call 1-866-873-2824. The due date for health certificates will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.

Market Classes A – C

Class A - White Breed Influence Individual

Class B - Black Face Individual

Class C - Pen of Three

1. Lambs must be born after January 1 of the current year.
2. All market lambs should be sheared within three weeks of the fair.
3. A pen of lambs will be composed of three lambs.
4. Each exhibitor will be permitted to show two pens of three and six individuals for a maximum of 12 animals.
5. Lambs that have not been docked or castrated are not eligible for a market class.
6. Either sex may be shown.

7. Any lambs showing evidence of club lamb fungus as determined by the official fair veterinarian will be asked to leave the premises.

Class D - Advanced Sheep Feeding

Lot 1 – Ewe Pen Lot 2 – Wether Pen

1. The objective of the advanced sheep feeding program is to make it possible for 4-H or FFA members to feed sheep and market on a business basis.
2. Members are required to bring the project to the fair. Sheep need to be groomed so they are presentable at the fair. Sheep do not need to be halter broken.
3. 4-H and FFA members may feed as one pen of three head of sheep, either ewes or wethers. Each individual may exhibit two pens.
4. The sheep must be weighed in at the 4-H market sheep weigh-in on the first Saturday in May and designated as an advanced sheep feeding project at that time. The sheep need an official 4-H tag. Initial purchase price of feeder lambs will be determined by Alta Livestock LLC on day of weigh-in. Sale price to be determined by Alta Livestock LLC on entry day of fair.
5. At the fair, members will be required to give the history of their project, including management techniques, feeding, and costs during the year.
6. Each project will be evaluated on the following 100 point grade system. The management will be scored during the feeding season.

Pen Performance	20 points	Farm Visit	20 points
Youth Interview.....	20 points	TOTAL	100 points
7. Four-Week Feed Reports need to be mailed or delivered to the Cherokee County Extension Office within seven working days of completion. 4-H'ers must retain a copy of all feed reports for their own records. All records must be brought to the Cherokee County Fair on entry day. The exact date of fair entry will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.
8. Project, as stated in rule 6, will be evaluated live by a feeder lamb judge at the fair.
9. Those animals weighed individually at the sheep weigh-in will be eligible to compete in the rate-of-gain competition. Rate-of-gain contest will be done separately for advanced sheep feeding and show lambs.
10. Sheep should have their own pen at home.
11. Sheep should be sheared at weigh-in for Best Rate-of-gain and #2 pelts.

SWINE

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. This species requires FSQA (Food Safety Quality Assurance) training. See rule #6 of the General Livestock Rules & Regulations for details.
3. Check weights and tags before entry. All swine weighed in must be slaughtered.
4. All pigs must have an official 4-H tag at the time of weigh-in.

5. **Hogs must be of U.S. origin.**
6. Breeding gilts can be shown only in the breeding class.
7. All pigs must be vaccinated for erysipelas at least 30 days prior to weigh-in date.
8. All swine exhibited must be accompanied by a record of a negative pseudorabies test, the test having been performed within 30 days prior to show, for swine originating from a Stage 4 or lower status county. No pseudorabies testing is required for swine originating from a Stage 5 county. (As of February 2005, Iowa is Stage 5.)
9. There shall be no coloring agents, powder, or oil used on pigs. Pigs in violation will be disqualified.
10. **4-H'ers may exhibit up to 10 pigs.** EXAMPLE: 4-H'ers may exhibit two pens of three market pigs, two breeding gilts, and two carcass pigs for a maximum of 10 pigs. Or they may designate up to two of their 4-H market pigs entered in classes A, B, or C as their carcass pigs.
11. Pigs weighed in and entered in the 4-H swine show may not be entered and shown in the Open Swine Show on Thursday morning prior to the 4-H show. 4-H'ers may bring additional pigs on Wednesday morning or Thursday morning to enter in the Open Swine Show. If bringing additional hogs on Wednesday morning, please contact the Extension Office prior to July 1 so that adequate pens will be available. The Open Swine Show entry fees are the responsibility of the 4-H'er.
12. All exhibitors need to furnish adequate planking for storage of tack over pens.

Class A - Market Individual - Barrow

Class B - Market Individual - Gilt

Class C - Market Pen of Three

1. Each exhibitor will be permitted to show two pens of three and four individual pigs (selected from these two pens) in the market class. Each pen of three must have two individual pigs exhibited from it. **(A maximum of six pigs may be entered in the Market Class.)**
2. Market pens will be composed of three pigs, same sex or mixed. They may be purchased or home-farrowed.
3. If an exhibitor is unable to bring a pen of three, they may exhibit up to two individual pigs.
4. 4-H and FFA members purchasing pigs may show these in the pens of three or in the individual class at the county fair and must own the pigs by May 1.
5. All 4-H pigs will be eligible to show. **Pigs must weigh at least 220 lbs. to be eligible for all championships.** Individuals less than 220 lbs. and a pen of three less than 660 lbs. will not be eligible for any championships.

Class D - Live Carcass

1. Each exhibitor will be required to specify at least one of their pigs to the carcass competition. These pigs will be identified and marked upon weighing in. **The carcass pigs must weigh between 230-290 lbs.**

2. A limit of two pigs may be entered in the 4-H Swine Carcass Show. (The carcass pig(s) may be selected from those entered and shown in the market classes or may be separate pigs entered only in the carcass class.) The Pork Producers will pay the first ultrasound fee. 4-H'ers will pay the ultrasound fee for their second carcass pig which will be deducted from their check.

3. Cash awards of \$250, provided by the Open Swine Show Committee, will be given to the top 13 carcass placings as determined by ultrasound analysis.

4. The 4-H carcass contest pig(s) cannot be shown in the Open Swine Show on Thursday.

Class E - Breeding Gilt

1. Each exhibitor will be permitted to show a maximum of two breeding gilts.

2. All breeding gilts will be eligible to show; however, gilts less than **220 lbs.** will not be eligible for championships. Breeding gilts cannot be selected from a market pen of three and cannot be designated as carcass hogs.

HORSE

Because of insurance responsibilities, confine horses to designated areas!

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.

2. **Horse exhibitors are normally required to stall one horse on the fairgrounds during the fair. The stalled horse does not have to be shown in the 4-H horse show, but must be ID'd and have a current health certificate. All other horses and foals would come the day of the show and return home following the show. Due to continued construction on the 4-H Expo Center, please watch your "4-H Highlights" newsletter or for correspondence from the Extension Office regarding stalling requirements for this year's fair.**

3. Entry fee is \$2 per class and is not refundable after the pre-fair entry due date. The exact due date of pre-fair livestock entries will be announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter. The Showmanship classes are open to all showmen. There is no entry fee or premium paid for Showmanship classes. All exhibitors are strongly encouraged to participate in the appropriate Showmanship class at the fair.

4. Each exhibitor may enter a maximum of four animals. Only one entry per exhibitor per class.

5. Premium money will be paid in all classes, except for Grand and Reserve Champion animals and Showmanship classes.

6. Show officials reserve the right to cancel and combine classes if insufficient entries warrant and to change or adjust the show order as needs dictate.

7. No substitution of horses without prior approval from the horse superintendent.

8. Ages of horse or pony will be based on January 1, not actual age.

9. No stallion may be shown in either halter, performance, or game classes, except in the Class 13, Halter Foals.

10. Ponies are any animal under 14.1 hands. A horse is any equine 14.1 hands and over (14.1 hands equals 57 inches). Ponies that are shod will have ½" deducted from height. POA height cards will be accepted. **Exception:** If you have horse breed registration papers, you are allowed to classify the animal as a horse. Example – a Quarter Horse who is 14.0 hands and is registered with AQHA, the equine can be classified as a horse. Registration papers must be provided. (*from Rules and Regulations for 4-H Equine Shows in Iowa, June 2008*)

11. Horse exhibitors in all classes will wear a white long-sleeved shirt or blouse with buttons, zippers, or snaps and a collar (tuxedo shirts are allowed) and dark blue jeans. Hard-soled boots are required, along with a 4-H armband worn on the upper left arm. English classes will wear the appropriate attire as described in 4H 511C. Check 4-H 511C concerning the use of spurs. All youth participating in any 4-H related horse event while mounted must wear properly fitting protective headgear passing or surpassing current applicable ASTM/SEI (American Society for Testing and Materials/Safety Equipment Institute) standards with chin strap and properly fitted harness secured. It is the responsibility of the rider, parent or guardian to see that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use, and is properly fitted and in good condition. Cherokee County Extension, Cherokee County Fair, 4-H, and FFA make no representation or warranty, express or implied, about any protective headgear, and caution riders that death or serious injury may result despite wearing such headgear as all equestrian sports involve inherent dangerous risk and as no helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries.

12. The classes in this department will be judged based on scoring procedures listed in 4H 511C, Rules and Regulations for 4-H Equine Shows in Iowa (Revised June 2008). This handbook includes descriptions of various classes and what the judge is looking for, as well as information on show ring etiquette and proper attire, appointments, and equipment. Copies may be purchased at the County Extension Office for \$3.50. Should the 4H 511C publication rules conflict with this fair book or an exhibitor letter, the latter two documents will govern.

13. All decisions will be final. The judge will make a reasonable effort to give reasons for final placing in each class. Any questions, comments, or complaints should be directed to the horse department superintendent.

14. Patterns – The Show Judge shall determine the patterns used for the Showmanship, Equitation (if used), Reining, and Western Riding classes and these will be provided in the exhibitor packet and/or posted prior to class time.

15. The Ranch Horse Conformation class is designed to showcase the conformation necessary for a ranch horse to do his job under saddle. Horses are ridden into the ring for judging. After walking to the judge and trotting past, horses are lined up by the ringperson along the rail, facing the center of the arena with ample space between each entry. The exhibitor will then dismount, proceed to ground-tie and unsaddle the horse, placing the tack along-side the horse on the left side. When unsaddled, the exhibitor may then take up the reins and stand the horse up for inspection by the judge. Bits may be checked by the judge. After all horses have been inspected by the judge, and the judge's card is ready to be marked, the exhibitors shall be signaled to re-saddle their horses, and riders may remount for presentation of ribbons. First and 2nd year exhibitors will be allowed to have helpers assist them with re-saddling. If Junior (Grades 4-8) class exhibitors need assistance, please visit with the horse department superintendent prior to class #28.

16. Classes 3, 6, 9, 12, 20, 23, 24, 29, 34, 37, and 42 **are for 1st and 2nd year exhibitors only.** If you exhibit in these classes, you **are not** eligible to exhibit in Classes 1, 2, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 11, 21,

22, 25, 27, 28, 30, 31, 32, 33, 35, 36, 38, 39, 40, 41, 43, 44 and 45. (1st and 2nd year exhibitor classes are meant for 4-H'ers with limited riding/show experience. If the exhibitor has the experience/ comfort level to enter the grade 4-8 or grade 9-12 level classes, they may do so; however, they cannot enter a mix of both levels.)

17. Class 25, Novice Western Pleasure, is for 3rd year exhibitors only and is meant to be a transition between walk-trot and western pleasure/ranch riding classes for the novice exhibitor with limited riding/showing experience. A lope is required.

18. Horse exhibitors should use the arena north of the cattle barn. Horses should not be ridden in any areas south of the cattle barn.

19. For safety reasons, while on the fairgrounds, horses may only be ridden by the 4-H'er. If a 4-H'er needs assistance with their animal, a member of 4-H'er's immediate family or other adult may receive approval to ride the animal after discussing the situation with the horse department superintendent and receiving permission to do so. Professional groomers and/or trainers are prohibited.

20. A Horse Sportsmanship Award will be given. This award will be given to any exhibitor in the horse/pony area that best demonstrates the 4-H slogan, "To win without bragging, lose without squealing." The winner will be chosen by a selected committee.

ALL horses on the fairgrounds must have a current health certificate on file with the Extension Office.

3. Each exhibitor is allowed six regular entries at the Fair.
4. All livestock in this department must have every indication of good health or will be sent back home.
5. All rabbits must be tattooed. There will be a county-wide tattoo workshop offered. Contact the Cherokee County Extension Office for date, time, and location.
6. **All exhibitors must furnish a padlock for each cage.**
7. Any meat pen or single fryer must be born within 70 days prior to entry day. Contact the Cherokee County Extension Office for exact date rabbits must be born.

3. Each member is limited to one Market Cockerel exhibit and one Laying Flock exhibit in the Commercial Class.
4. Market Cockerel: Each exhibit consists of three cockerels.
5. Laying Flock: Each exhibit consists of three pullets that are about to lay or are laying.
6. Each exhibit in each sub-lot must be a different breed. (Example: An exhibitor may enter a Plymouth Rock hen and a Rhode Island Red hen, but not two Rhode Island Red hens.)
7. In Classes B, C, D, E, F, and G, old birds (cock/hen) must be hatched before January 1 of the current year. Birds hatched after January 1 of the current year will show as young birds (cockerel/pullet).
8. A limited number of cages are available. Exhibitors should be prepared to furnish their own cages if necessary. Exhibitors of large birds (geese, turkeys, etc.) should inquire at the Extension Office about the availability of cages/enclosures.
9. All birds, except ducks and geese, must be Pullorum tested by a certified tester within 90 days of entry day at the fair, unless they come from a certified flock, in which case a certificate is required.
10. First and second place in each lot will compete for the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion in each class.
11. Grand and Reserve in each class will compete for the Best of Show and Reserve Best of

Show trophies.

12. All breed entries will be judged according to the American Standard of Perfection. A copy of the American Standard of Perfection is available for check out at the Extension Office.

13. All exhibitors are highly encouraged to participate in a showmanship contest following the show.

14. All exhibitors must furnish a padlock for each cage.

6. All exhibitors are responsible for their own pets.
7. Any female animal in season can not be exhibited.
8. An exhibitor is limited to enter in two classes, one entry per class.

4. The following events are available: Best Dressed, Pet & Owner Look-a-Likes, Best Trickster, Most Unusual, Best Beggar, Most Active.

DOG OBEDIENCE

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. All dogs must be enrolled on Livestock Identification forms filed at the Extension Office by May 15 of the current year. All dogs must be entered into the correct class on the pre-fair livestock entry form due into the Cherokee County Extension Office by the pre-fair due date announced in the "4-H Highlights" newsletter.
3. All dogs must be immunized against RABIES, DISTEMPER, and PARVOVIRUS. Proof of immunization is required.
4. Mixed and purebred dogs are allowed.
5. Dogs are to be shown by the 4-H member that owns them and trained them.
6. Any female dog in season may not be exhibited.
7. All dogs should be well groomed, free of loose hair, fleas, lice, and ticks. Toenails should be of suitable length and the eyes and ears clean and clear.

8. Entry of dogs will take place half an hour before the show. **Entries will not remain on the fairgrounds, but rather must be present only for the show.** All dogs must be on leash or crated while waiting for their class to be called.
9. Exhibitors must bring the necessary equipment to provide adequate care for their dog during waiting periods (water or food).
10. EXHIBITOR CONDUCT. Exhibitors shall not strike dogs nor use any other unnecessary harsh physical means of disciplining dogs. The exhibitor shall be ready with the dog when called.
11. This is not an AKC sanctioned dog show. However, AKC rules have been used as guidelines.
12. Dogs in obedience classes may also be entered in the 4-H Small Pet Show.
13. All exhibitors must be enrolled in 4-H/FFA during the current year and have a signed "Iowa Youth Code of Ethics" on file at the Extension Office.

Class A - Pre-Novice "A"

For dogs and exhibitors in their first year of 4-H dog obedience training. Dogs must not have finished any leg toward any CD degree. Dogs will heel, stand for examination, and do the figure 8 all on a leash. They will recall on leash and do sits for one minute and downs for three minutes on leash. (3001)

Class B - Pre-Novice "B"

For dogs and exhibitors in their second year or greater of 4-H dog obedience training, who have not achieved a qualifying score in Pre-Novice A. Dogs must not have finished any leg toward any CD degree. Dogs will heel, stand for examination, and do the figure 8 all on a leash. They will recall on leash and do long sits for one minute and long downs for three minutes on leash. (3002)

Class C - Sub-Novice

For dogs and handlers with two or less years of obedience training. Exercise: heel on leash, figure 8 on leash, recall OFF leash, stand for examination OFF leash, sit-stay (1 minute) and down stay (3 minutes) OFF leash. Dogs may not have any CD degrees to show in this class. (3003)

Class D - Novice "A"

For exhibitors with three years or less of 4-H dog obedience training who have achieved a qualifying score in a 4-H dog obedience show in a Pre-Novice A or Pre-Novice B class at the previous year's fair. Dogs entered in this class must not be entered in Class A, B, or C. Dogs in this class must not have completed their third leg toward any CD degree. Dogs will heel and do figure 8 on leash and heel off leash, stand for examination off leash, recall off leash, do long sits for one minute and long downs for three minutes off leash. (3004)
