General Rules

1. Exhibits are an outgrowth of a 4-H'ers participation in a selected project or program. All exhibitors must be enrolled by entry day in the project in which they are exhibiting. **Exhibits can be done by an individual or a group.** Exhibits might be, but not limited to, an actual product, poster, display box, report, notebook, model, audio cassette, etc.
2. The 4-H'ers **goal** will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include **demonstrated learning, quality of work and techniques, general appearance and design.**
3. An **Exhibit Goal Sheet must** be included with each exhibit. The completed goal sheets will include such information as: cost, time involved, procedure used, materials, etc., along with the following goal information: (a goal sheet is on the fair website www.hancockcountyfair.com)
 - a. What was your goal?
 - b. How did you go about working toward your goal?
 - c. What did you learn in working toward your goal?
 - d. What ideas or plans do you have for the future because of what you learned and did?

Check for additional requirements in exhibit classes.

4. **Age for exhibiting at the Iowa State Fair:** Youth must have completed 5th through 12th grades.
5. Exhibitors must have participated in the project or program from which the exhibit is an outgrowth. The exhibit is to be an outgrowth of work done to accomplish a goal(s) determined by the member or group **during the current 4-H year.**
6. Entry tags must be securely fastened on each exhibit. Members may enter a total of 6 (six) exhibits. (No limit per class). Fashion Revue, Clothing Selection and Challenge entries are beyond the 6 (six) Family Consumer Science entries.
7. **All entries must be exhibited at a local achievement show for all 4th-6th grade members. (Exception: Challenge)**
8. All articles entered are to be labeled giving name of member, address, name of club, class number and name of exhibit. Label should be sewn in garments in an inconspicuous place. Folder should have the above information on inside cover. Every separate piece of any exhibit should be labeled. Entry tags and entry sheets will be sent to leaders. **One copy of the entry must be returned to the Extension Office by July 1.**
9. When application of design elements and art principles must be explained, the following guidelines shall be used:
 - a. Members in grades 4-6 are responsible only for application of the design element line or color
 - b. Members in grades 7-9 are responsible only for application of two design elements

c. Members in grades 9-12 are responsible only for application of at least one design element and at least one principle of design.

10. **Fashion Revue and Clothing Selection entries and description forms are due to the Extension Office by the date specified on the forms.**
11. Conference judging on all family consumer science exhibits will be done. **Judging will be 8:30 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.** Each club will be scheduled for a definite time. Schedules will be sent to 4-H leaders.
12. **Exhibits will be released at 6:00 p.m. Sunday.** 4-H'ers who cannot adhere to the release schedule should make arrangements for someone to pick up their exhibit(s), or they should not enter the item(s).
13. Deserving exhibits in all classes will be rated as blue, red or white ribbon quality.
14. Super blue ribbons will be given to 4th-6th grade member exhibits that judge(s) feels are outstanding. (Would not be given to 5th -6th grade members advancing to State Fair.)
15. State fair exhibits will receive purple ribbons with the alternates receiving lavender.
16. Fair officials assume no responsibility for exhibits, but will do all they can to guard against damage or loss.
17. All premiums on individual entries will be paid to the members after judging is completed for both SMA and Family Consumer Science exhibits. Club entry premiums will be pro-rated to the 4-H clubs & the County Council.
18. **FOODS:** If canned goods are entered, label with standard 4-H label. Pick up labels at the Extension Office. Baked products, i.e. cakes, bars, muffins and cupcakes should be removed from pan and placed on flat cardboard or firm disposable plate which is labeled. Place in a resealable plastic bag with entry tag fastened to outside of bag. Pies and cakes should be brought whole. Cupcakes, muffins and cookies should bring seven (7). Cupcakes and muffins should NOT be baked in cupcake papers. Baked goods will be sold with the money going to the Hancock County 4-H Fund. Preserved foods will be returned to the exhibitor. **TWO COPIES of the recipe** should be attached to the exhibit if prepared food is included. One copy will accompany product to be sold and the other stays with the display and sample of the product. All food products and food preparation procedures used, illustrated, or described must be unquestionably safe. Any exhibit considered to be or to portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.

In addition to the general rules 4-H'ers entering Food and Nutrition exhibits must follow these special rules:

- 1) The recipe (ingredients, preparation instructions, time, temperature) **MUST** be included for any prepared or preserved food exhibit. Source of recipe must be credited.

- 2) Preserved foods must include a label with:
 - a. type of food
 - b. method of preservation
 - c. processing time
 - d. date processed (must be after Aug. 1 of the previous year.)
 - e. source of recipe an/or method of preservation (If publication, include name and date)

Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation methods must be used. (Check at the County Extension Office for recommended practices or call the ISU Hotline 1-800-262-3804 for current researched information.)

19. All foods products and food preparation procedures used, illustrated, or described must be unquestionably safe. **Any exhibit considered to be or to portray a food safety risk will NOT be accepted, judged, or displayed.** Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers. The use of alcoholic beverages in 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.
20. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption, nutrition/evaluation.
21. Garments should come in on hangers and in clear plastic bags. Pin entry tags on garments.
22. Posters and Displays:
 - A. A poster is a **poster board** on which information is presented. It can be 22" x 28" or foam core board that measures 22" x 30".
 - B. A display is a three-dimensional exhibit in which items, collections, comparisons, etc. are shown. Because space is limited we encourage you to keep displays small and consider cost. The total dimensions of a display box are not to exceed 10"h x 12"w x 14"d. These dimensions can be applied to best fit the exhibit size for height, width, depth.
23. **Note:** Home Improvement Classes - When appropriate, exhibit must include explanation of how the design elements or art principles were used in the exhibit. See individual classes.

Clover Bud Fair Classes

Cloverbuds may enter two non-livestock entries. For example: two Home Ec; two SMA or one Home Ec and one SMA. See SMA for Cloverbud classes. The following Home Ec classes are available for Cloverbuds. They are not eligible to exhibit at the State Fair.

Home Improvement

- Class CB1 Fabric Furnishings** - Any fabric furnishing made.
- Class CB2 A storage article.** Write on a card how it will be used in the home.
- Class CB3 A display or poster** of a goal you have reached in Home Improvement. See Rule #3.

Food and Nutrition

Perishable food will not be accepted as an entry or

evaluated. Products that require refrigeration (cream fillings, cream pies, cream cheese frosting, meat or broth, relish or fruit trays, cheeses, eggs, custards, egg noodles, and friendship starters, etc.) are not appropriate entries for the fair. These items do not hold up well at room temperature and often pose a food safety hazard. **Such items will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.**

Class CB4 A baked product. Include the recipe.

Class CB5 Poster or display showing foods from the Food Guide Pyramid.

Class CB6 A display or poster of a goal you have reached in Food and Nutrition. See Rule #3.

Clothing

Class CB7 Any garment constructed.

Class CB8 Develop a grooming schedule for yourself. Explain in writing.

Class CB9 A display or poster of a goal you have reached in clothing. See Rule #3.

Fair Classes for 4th Graders

The following classes are available for 4-H members completing the 4th grade who are not eligible to exhibit at State Fair.

Home Improvement

Class 1 Fabric Furnishings. Any fabric furnishing made.

Class 2 A storage article. Write on a card how it will be used in the home.

Class 3 A display or poster of a goal you have reached in Home Improvement. See General Rule #3.

Food and Nutrition

Perishable food will not be accepted as an entry or evaluated. Products that require refrigeration (cream fillings, cream pies, cream cheese frosting, meat or broth, relish or fruit trays, cheeses, eggs, custard, egg noodles, and friendship starters, etc.) are not appropriate entries for the fair. These items do not hold up well at room temperature and often pose a food safety hazard. **Such items will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.**

Class 4 A baked product. Include the recipe.

Class 5 Poster or display showing foods from the Food Guide Pyramid.

Class 6 A display or poster of a goal you have reached in Food and Nutrition. See Rule #3.

Clothing

Class 7 Any garment constructed.

Class 8 Develop a grooming schedule for yourself. Explain in writing.

Class 9 A display or poster of a goal you have reached in clothing. See Rule #3.

**The following are State Fair Classes for
4-Her's who have completed
5th through 12th grades.**

Child Development

501A Educational display or other type of exhibit relating to a child development project/program, such as age appropriate games and toys, original stories, babysitting, toy safety, positive guidance and discipline, kids with special needs, careers, etc. Exhibit information should include what you have learned about yourself and/or about children while creating and using this exhibit or what the child gained or learned from use of the item in the exhibit.

Clothing

511A Clothing Design and Creative Sewing

Includes, but not limited to, constructed garments or accessories; design illustrations, sketches, models, etc.; modified, designed or recycled garments; making a garment that enhances the way you look, or others look, design or sewing for others, etc.

Application of design elements and art principles must be explained when appropriate. See Rule #9

511B Choosing Clothes and Learning About Fabrics

Includes, but not limited to, purchased garments or accessories, textile fiber or fabric characteristics, choosing clothes or accessories to enhance the way you look, or others look, labeling, etc. Include only one shoe, earring, etc. if part of the exhibit.

Application of design elements and art principles must be explained when appropriate. See Rule #9

511C Clothing Safety and Care

Includes, but not limited to, decisions about clothes for sports, temperature control and protection, laundry experiences, clothing care, etc.

511D Other Clothing & Sewing Ideas

Any other exhibit which is an outgrowth of a 4-H clothing and textile project or educational experience. Could include, but not restricted to: 1) exploration of ethnic or historical clothing, 2) dress as a means of expression; 3) clothes for special needs of handicapped, elderly, and/or children; 4) cultural expression through clothes; 5) career or processes in the textile and/or apparel industry; 6) decorative processes such as textile dying, printing, embroidery, knitting, or quilting; 7) construction of household textiles. The exhibit may be an object, notebook, or poster. **Application of design elements and art principles must be explained when appropriate. See Rule #9**

Food and Nutrition

1. The recipe (ingredients, preparation instructions, time, temperature) **MUST** be included for any prepared food exhibit. Source of recipe must be credited.
2. Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label, VI-991201-WB/SAS. Only food processed after August 1 of previous year is acceptable.
 - a. Type of Food
 - b. Method of preservation
 - c. Processing time
 - d. Date processed (must be after Aug. 1)
 - e. Source of recipe and/or method of preservation (if a publication, include name and date), current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home preservation methods must be used. Check at Extension office or call the ISU Answer Line @ 800-262-3804 for current recommended practices.
3. **State Fair Rule Only:** Preserved foods **MUST** include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and then discarded. The second will be on display and will be returned to the exhibitor.
4. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Consider this recommendation rather than pans, plates, china, or baskets due to potential damage or loss. Place exhibit in a reclosable plastic bag with the entry tag fastened outside the bag.
5. **Items that require refrigeration like cream fillings, cream pies, cream cheese frosting, meat or broth, relish or fruit trays, cheeses, eggs, custards, egg noodles, and friendship starters. etc. are not appropriate entries for the fair.** These items do not hold up well at room temperature and often pose a food safety hazard. Such items will not be accepted or judged.
6. **Due to safe handling concerns during processing, no meat jerky product exhibits are allowed.**
7. All food products and food preparation procedures used, illustrated, or described must be unquestionably safe. **Any exhibit considered to be or to portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged or displayed.**
8. **The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.**
9. Posters or banners selected for State Fair should not exceed 22" by 28". **Total dimensions** of a small display box should not exceed 10"x12" x14". These dimensions are flexible and can be applied to best fit the exhibit size for height, width and depth. **Due to security, we discourage 4-Her's from adding items that have special meaning and/or historical value.**
10. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption/nutritional evaluation. **Frostings, glazes, or drizzles are NOT allowed**

on baked products including, but not limited to, cakes, cookies, bars, yeast breads, and quick breads. See Rule #17 for requirements concerning Food & Nutrition exhibit(s) labeling, packaging, etc.

521A Food Preparation and Safety

(including Food Preservation) Includes, but not limited to, prepared product, product evaluation, food preparation terms, storage practices, etc.

521B Consumer Behavior and Management

Includes, but not limited to, resource management, product comparison, meal planning and service, purchasing, food packaging and recycling, nutrition labeling, etc.

521C Nutrition and Wellness

Includes, but not limited to, dietary guidelines, nutrient functions, physical health, etc.

521D Other Food and Nutrition Ideas

Exhibit can tell or show any special related topic such as measurement of ingredients, eating out, special recipe collection, cultural food traditions, food science "whys", careers, etc.

520 Youth Challenge Class

This class is not eligible for State Fair. This entry is NOT included as one of the six (6) Home Ec entries and does not have to be shown at local achievement show. Do not need to do a written explanation. (See General Rules)

1. Any 4-H member is eligible to enter. Member need not be enrolled in a Food and Nutrition project.
2. Members may enter one entry. Entry must be on entry form due to the Extension Office by July 1.
3. The purpose of the class is to use only the following recipe - make, bake and present your best.
4. Fair entry should consist of six (6) cookies/bars/pieces on a plate.

Youth Challenge Toffee Chunk Brownie Cookies

1 cup butter	1 tablespoon vanilla
4 oz. unsweetened chocolate, coarsely chopped	3 cup all-purpose flour
1 1/2 cup sugar	1/8 teaspoon salt
2 eggs	1 1/2 cup. coarsely chopped chocolate-covered toffee bar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Melt butter and chocolate in large saucepan over low heat, stirring until smooth. Remove from heat; cool slightly.

Stir sugar into chocolate mixture until smooth. Stir in eggs until well blended. Stir in vanilla until smooth. Stir in flour and salt just until mixed. Fold in chopped toffee.

Drop on ungreased cookie sheet by the rounded tablespoonfuls. Bake 12 minutes or until just set. Let cookies stand on cookie sheets 5 minutes; transfer to wire racks to cool completely. Store in airtight container.

Adult Open Challenge Class

Class 520D 4-H Leaders

Class 520E 4-H Parent or Guardian

The purpose is to increase involvement, have fun, and set an example for 4-H members.

General Rules:

1. Any adult is eligible to enter.
2. Participants may enter one entry.
3. All entries in the challenge class will be entered during the afternoon of SMA/Home Ec judging day. Judging will be at the conclusion of the day.
4. Six cookies/bars/pieces should be placed on a firm paper plate or flat cardboard which is labeled with the participants name and address in an inconspicuous place, plus the customary entry tag. Entry tags may be picked up at the registration table. Place food in a plastic bag.
5. First and second place ribbons will be given in each class. No premium money will be awarded.

Adult Challenge Marbled Biscotti

1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine, softened	1 3/4 cups "M&M's" Choco- late Mini Baking Bits, divided
1 cup granulated sugar	1 cup silvered almonds, toasted*
2 large eggs	1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
1 teaspoon vanilla extract	
2 1/2 cups all -purpose flour	
1 teaspoon baking powder	
1 teaspoon baking soda	

* To toast almonds, spread in single layer on baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees F for 7-10 min. until light golden, stirring occasionally. Remove almonds from pan and cool completely before using.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly grease cookie sheets; set aside. In large bowl cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy; beat in eggs and vanilla. In medium bowl combine flour, baking powder and baking soda; blend into creamed mixture. Dough will be stiff. Stir in 1 1/4 cup "M&M's" and nuts. Divide dough in half. Add cocoa powder to half the dough, mixing to blend. On well - floured surface, gently knead doughs together just enough to marble. Divide dough in half and gently roll each half into 12X2- in. log; place on prepared cookie sheets at least 4 in. apart. Press remaining 1/2 cup "M&M's" onto outside of both logs. Bake 25 min. Dough will spread. Cool logs 15 - 20 min. Slice each log into 12 slices; arrange on cookie sheet cut-side down. Bake an additional 10 min. Cool completely. Store in tightly covered container.

Home Improvement

All exhibits that are to be hung for display should have the hanger provided by exhibitor.

***Note:** If appropriate, you must include explanation of how the design elements or art principles were used in this exhibit.

531A Design in the Home

An educational display, notebook, poster or other type of exhibit such as a design element or art principle, explaining design of an item, selecting an item illustrating design, etc. **MUST include explanation of how a minimum of 2 design elements or art principles were used in this exhibit.**

531B Furniture in the Home

Includes, but not limited to, reclaimed furniture, room plans, furniture styles, historic furniture, buymanship, etc. **MUST include explanation of how a minimum of 2 design elements or art principles were used in this exhibit.**

531C Accessories for the Home

Includes, but not limited to, wall accessories, nature accessories, flatware selection/coordination, table design, lighting design, etc. **MUST include explanation of how a minimum of 2 design elements or art principles were used in this exhibit.**

531D Fabrics in the Home

Includes, but not limited to, upholstered furniture, pillows, curtains, table linens, storage protection, etc. **MUST include explanation of how a minimum of 2 design elements or art principles were used in this exhibit.**

531E Maintenance in the Home

Includes but not limited to cleaning plan, storage, energy conservation, recycling, own home away from home, etc. **If appropriate**, include an explanation of how the design elements or art principles were used.

531F Other Home Improvement Ideas

Any other exhibit which is an outgrowth of a home improvement project or program such as decision making process, careers, etc. **If appropriate**, include an explanation of how the design elements or art principles were used in this exhibit.

Consumer and Management

Educational display or other type of exhibit relating to any consumer and management idea such as decision making, comparison shopping, consumer rights and responsibilities, spending plans and record keeping, careers, etc. The process of learning about yourself while making decisions as a consumer is an important part of the project. The exhibit should demonstrate use of the decision making model as described in project materials. An exhibit might include some of the following examples and/or other learnings from the project. Examples include games, stories, computer programs, photographs, displays, notebooks, videos, etc.

541A Spending Plans and Record Keeping:

Track your spending - account books, computer records, envelope systems, checkbook records
Set up family record keeping system

Survey peer spending habits - allowances, clothing, food, etc.

Track your 4-H projects spending - livestock records, photographs, clothing, etc.

Describe appropriate use of credit.

Track how you spend your time - calendar, diary

Set up a family calendar system

541B Comparison Shopping

Compare products

Compare types of stores or places to shop

Compare cost of shopping with cash and credit

Compare colleges, trade schools, etc.

Compare cost of recreational activities

Compare financial institutions (banks, savings and loans, credit unions, etc.)

Compare car insurance

Compare investments and savings

541C Consumer Rights and Responsibilities

Explore advertising influences

Show how to make a consumer complaint

Show where to find consumer information

Evaluate reliability of consumer information

Describe cost of fraud (shoplifting, bad checks, etc.)

Describe potential problems related to privacy issues (social security number, credit card, internet shopping, etc.)

Fashion Revue

Entries Due - July 1, 2009

- 551 4-H members enrolled in Clothing projects** are eligible to participate in the County Fashion Revue. 4-H'ers will model one (1) garment they have made within the past club year. Ribbon placing and premium money will be given. Entry in this class is an extra entry (not one of the 6 [six] Home Ec. entries). The garment can be entered in another class at fair. **Entry form and description forms are due July 1.** A judging schedule will be sent to each entrant. **Each 4-H'er must be available for judging in early July, and must be available for the Style Show held during the county fair.**

Fashion Revue State Fair Requirements:

All participants (boy or girl) to qualify for participation in the state event:

- Be a participant in a 4-H Clothing project or educational experience in the current year.
- Be in the senior age range for the 4-H program (completed 9th-12 grade).
- The participant may represent the county at the state event in Fashion Revue more than once.
- Preferably have been enrolled for three or more years in a 4-H Clothing project, including current year (not required).
- Model a garment or outfit the entrant has con-

structed, hand-knitted or crocheted during the current 4-H year.

1. Garments or outfits consisting of one to three pieces such as party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, skirt, active sportswear and/or coats are acceptable as Fashion Revue entries.
 2. Blouses and sweaters are usually considered as garments. If they are used under a coat or jacket for a touch of color at the neck (similar to a scarf) they may be selected or constructed.
 3. All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected.
- f. Bring the garment or outfit and accessories to the fair with him or her.

State Fair Fashion Revue and Clothing Selection Event will be announced at Entry Time

**Clothing Selection
Entries Due - July 1, 2009**

**Judging July 13 - 8:30 am - 3:30 pm
Extension Office, Garner**

561 All 4-H'ers are eligible to enter the Clothing Selection class. This is an educational event with equal opportunities given to both boys and girls.

Participants must model one (1) garment of clothing they have selected and purchased. Clothing may be purchased new or used. **Gifts of clothing, either new or used, are not eligible.** The purpose of the program is to help youth develop skills in buying clothing.

Clothes may be purchased from any source, including consignment shops, used clothing stores, etc. Clothing items which are home-sewn are not eligible unless the completed garment was purchased from a used clothing source. Clothing items which are custom sewn specifically for the participant are not eligible.

Clothing Selection entry and description forms are due July 1. A judging schedule will be sent to each entrant. **Each participant must be available for judging in early July and must be available for the style show during the county fair.** Ribbon placing and premium money will be given. **Outfits can be entered in another class at the fair.** Entry in this class is an extra entry, not one of the 6 [six] Home Ec. entries.

Participation in the event is based on satisfactory selection of a purchased garment that represents one of the following three categories:

- * **Casual Clothes:** Clothes for school or work. Work may range from professional to non-technical and service types. Restaurant, sales, hospital (receptionist, nurses aide), grocery store (from manager to stock person), house cleaning, secretary, 4-H

volunteer, etc. are examples of types of clothes that might suggest casual clothes.

- * **Sport or Functional Clothes:** Clothes that assist with a task or activity, protect you from the environment or promote safety. Clothing may be chosen for a particular sport, i.e., bicycling, temperature control situation, or for use in a specific hazardous situation, i.e., farming. This clothing may be selected to minimize environmental conditions or to help prevent accidental injury. Clothing to meet special needs of a handicapping condition fit under this category.
- * **Special Occasion Clothes:** Clothing for special events (graduation, prom, wedding, etc.). Clothing is chosen to allow personal expression with some thought of future use.

Style show ribbon placing will be presented after the style show at the fair. One Senior boy and/or girl (9th-12th grade) is eligible for State Fair. 4-H'ers selected to represent the county at State Fair should have had a county experience(s) in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating design, fit, fabric quality, construction features, price and cost per wearing of clothing before making the decision to select and purchase the particular outfit selected for the Clothing Selection event. 4-H'ers may participate only one time in the Iowa State Fair Clothing Selection event.

Ribbons and premium will not be awarded if participant does not attend the style show on Thursday during county fair.

**\$15 Clothing Challenge
Entries Due - July 1, 2009**

**Judging July 13 - 8:30 am - 3:30 pm
Extension Office, Garner**

513 All 4-H members are eligible to participate in the County \$15 Clothing Challenge. 4-H'ers will model one (1) garment they have purchased within the past club year. Ribbon placing and premium money will be given. Entry in this class is an extra entry (not one of the 6 [six] Home Ec. entries). **Entry form and description forms are due July 1.** A judging schedule will be sent to each entrant. **Each 4-H'er must be available for judging in early July, and must be available for the Style Show held during the county fair.**

State Fair Requirements:

All participants (boy or girl) to qualify for participation in the state event:

- a. Purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H'ers goal or intended use for the selected outfit.
- b. Have had individual planned or county experience(s) in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating fit, quality and construction features, price and cost comparison.

- c. Outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store, or resale shop (i.e. Goodwill, Salvation Army, or other stores of this type.) (Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts that were selected by the 4-H'er belong in Clothing Selection.)
- d. Cost of outfit must be \$15 or less, not including shoes, accessories, or undergarments.
- e. Receipt(s) MUST be turned in with "Clothing Event Report Form".
- f. All entrants must be present for judging in early July.
- g. Up to three participants (grades 9-12) may be selected to participate in the Iowa State Fair Clothing Event (one female, one male, one minority). A 4-H'er may represent Hancock County in the \$15 Challenge only once.

Reminders:

FCS (Family Consumer Science) exhibitors must turn in entry sheets at the Fair Office the day of judging to get paid for their premiums! The Exhibit Goal Sheet is available on the Hancock County Fair website (www.hancockcountyfair.com) or may be requested from the Hancock County Extension Office. This is the form that needs to accompany every exhibit that is brought to the fair. (Excluding Livestock and Garden Projects)
