DID YOU KNOW? There are 4 levels in 4-H!

Clover Kids: Kindergarten through 3rd.

Juniors: 4th through 6th Grades.

Intermediates: 7th through 8th Grades.

Seniors: 9th through 12th Grades.

The **HEAD** signifies that 4-H builds skills such as: problem solving, communication, decision-making, independence and offers opportunities to see ones self as an active participant in the future and opportunities for self-determination.

The **HEART** represents that 4-H builds confidence, relationships, character, respect for self and others, generosity, and offers opportunities to value and serve others.

The **HANDS** show that 4-H offers opportunities for serving others, career preparation, hands-on learning & mastery, along with offering engagement in learning opportunities to excel.

HEALTH represents the well-being that provides—how to form healthy habits, manage stress, manage change and a sense of belonging. 4-H offers positive relationships with caring adults in an inclusive and safe environment.

4-H MISSION

4-H empowers youth to reach their full potential through youth-adult partnerships and research-based experiences.

4-H Member, Club, and Family Information

Okay, you're joining 4-H. Now what?

- 1) Select one or more project (interest) area(s) in which to enroll. There are a variety of different project areas to choose from which all fall under one of these six categories:
 - → Agriculture and Natural Resources
 - → Animals
 - → Creative Arts
 - → Family and Consumer Science
 - → Personal Development
 - → Science, Engineering and Technology
- 2) If you haven't already, select a 4-H club in the county to join.

As a new 4-H member, you and your family have lots of new opportunities! Let's look at what it means to be a 4-H member, what 4-H clubs actually do, and how your family can also participate!



As a **4-H MEMBER**, you are expected to:

- 1. Attend and participate in at least 50% of the monthly club meetings throughout the year.
- 2. Present an educational presentation at your club meeting.
- 3. Participate in club community service projects.
- 4. Explore project areas that interest you.
- 5. Take part in activities, camps, project workshops and more!
- 6. HAVE FUN!

4-H MEMBERS

- *** Exhibiting at the county and/or state fair is a highlight each year for many 4-H members. Youth are encouraged, but not required, to showcase project work at the county and/or state fair.
- *** Additionally, keeping records of project work throughout the year is strongly encouraged. Record keeping forms are available from the county office or can be downloaded online at

What does a 4-H Club do?

Most clubs meet monthly with a year-long plan for their program. A 4-H Club elects its own officers and conducts its own business. Each meeting usually includes one or more presentation by club members. Meetings may also include presentations by leaders, parents and/or experts; recreation and/or games; family nights; and/or field trips. Most 4-H clubs also do a variety of community service projects which are decided upon and completed by club members.

Generally, a club meeting consists of calling the meeting to order, the Pledge of Allegiance and the 4-H pledge, roll call and minutes of the last meeting, the treasurer's report, reports from committees, old business (things talked about before), new business (new ideas, activities and plans), and then adjourning (ending) of the business meeting. Educational presentations, fun activities, and/or refreshments generally occur before or after the meeting.

The 4-H program encourages parents, grandparents and other family members to help 4-H members with their projects. Here are some suggestions:

- → Help youth select projects that relate to their interests and hobbies.
- → Attend club meetings with the 4-H member and volunteer to help as the need arises (i.e., chaperone, hostess, an extra set of hands)
- → Give encouragement and supervision, but allow the 4-H member to do his/her own work. Be positive! Praise their successes and be there to help when they struggle.
- → Help youth develop a record keeping system for their project work.
- → Read the 4-H Newsletter and help youth stay up-to-date on deadlines, rules, dates, upcoming events, etc.
- → Seek help from club leaders, ISU Extension and Outreach staff, other 4-H members and parents, experts, etc.

4-H Lingo: Talk the Talk

As a new 4-H member, you will learn lots of new words, phrases and acronyms. Let's start deciphering what some key 4-H terms mean, and soon you will be talking the talk!

4-H Online

This online database provides the Iowa State University Extension and Outreach office with your membership information. This is also where you identify and verify livestock and other project information. You can also utilize this website to register for state and regional 4-H events. https://v2.4honline.com/#/user/sign-in

4-H Enrollment

Annually in the fall, members must re-enroll into 4-H Online. This includes your name, address, phone, health information, parent contacts, and project areas you have chosen for this year.

Medical Information/Release

Much like the information provided to schools and other youth-serving organizations, 4-H needs medical information in case of an emergency with a member. All information is kept confidential.

Code of Ethics Forms

This form asks members to be responsible for doing their own project work in an ethical manner. This form is completed electronically at the time your 4-H enrollment is submitted. Signature lines are provided for 4-H members and their parents to sign as an understanding and agreement of the expectations.

4-H Newsletter

Monthly newsletter sent to all Appanoose County 4-H members and Clover Kids with information regarding upcoming deadlines, events and opportunities happening in the county, region, and state. Be sure read the newsletter monthly to stay informed about 4-H!

Livestock Identification (Id)

All 4-H animals must be identified in 4-H Online by May 15th (date is set by the state). Market animals will have ID forms completed at their respective weigh-ins with the information needed to enter them into 4-H Online. Check with the office for specific rules, identification requirements & deadlines.

Fair Entry

This is an online entry website where the 4-H member registers their specific exhibits to compete/participate in at county and/or state fair. Each contest has a rulebook and entry deadlines. http://appanoosecounty.fairentry.com/

Pre-Entry Help Days

Held at the end of June, where staff members are available to help assist families with online entries in Fair Entry and collect stall fees for all livestock entries. Stall fees must be paid in-person to the Extension Office by cash or check by the deadline for your livestock entries in FairEntry to be approved. Pre-Entry is not the same thing as livestock identification, both livestock id (due May 15th) and pre-entries (due July 1st) must be completed for your livestock to be eligible to exhibit at the county and/or state fair.

Fairbook

The Fairbook is a booklet containing the rules and classes for specific species and project areas for the Appanoose County Fair. If you are looking for guidelines or wondering what can be brought to Fair, the Fairbook is the place to turn to. Please make it a priority to read the section(s) of the Fairbook that pertain to your exhibits prior to exhibiting at county fair.

YQCA

YQCA stands for Youth Quality Care of Animals. It's a training that is required to be completed annually by 4-H/FFA members showing livestock at the county and/or state fair. Completion of the course can be done online or at in-person trainings hosted by the county office. Training dates and locations will be posted in the monthly 4-H newsletter.

Record Keeping

As a 4-H'er makes progress in creating goals, finishing projects, "Making the Best Better", it is very beneficial to accumulate all of that information to make a 4-H Record Book. This can be submitted for judging annually in September to potentially receive an award at the county 4-H Awards Banquet. Record Book forms can be picked up from the Appanoose County Extension Office or accessed on our county website.

Projects

A 4-H project is an areas of emphasis in which a 4-H member enrolls, studies, learns, and keep records. Projects are grouped into one of six clusters: Agriculture and Natural Resources, Animals, Creative Arts, Family and Consumer Sciences, Personal Development and STEM.

Exhibits

A 4-H exhibit is an item resulting from project work that the 4-H member has chosen to bring to fair and have evaluated by a judge. Examples: A 4-Her may enroll in the woodworking project area and choose to bring a birdhouse to the fair that they have constructed. A 4-H'er is enrolled in the swine project area and brings a breeding gilt to the fair to showcase and be judged on that exhibit.

Static Exhibits

This term is used to refer to non-animal exhibits that result from project work that the 4-H'er has chosen to bring to the fair and have evaluated by a judge. It includes photography, food, child development, robotics, woodworking and so much more!

Conference Judging

This method of judging is used during fair to encourage, educate, and evaluate the 4-H member's exhibit and learning process. The 4-H member brings an exhibit to the fair and a judge visits with the youth to determine a ribbon placing and the item is left on display during county fair.

Write-Up/Goal Sheet

Document created to go along with your exhibit at county fair. This document will include step-by-step instructions on how you completed your exhibit, materials list, cost of the project, and photos of you completing the project. The write-up can be typed or hand written.

Communications

Educational Presentations are talks or demonstrations, given in front of an audience, about some topic that interests the 4-H'er. **Working Exhibits** are less formal. They involve a one-on-one type of demonstration technique. **Share-the-Fun** includes entertainment acts, like music, dance, interpretive speech, or skits. They can involve any number of youth—from one 4-H'er to the whole club. **Extemporaneous Speaking** is another project area where 4-H'ers have the opportunity to practice speaking.

4-H Year

The 4-H year runs from September 1st to August 31st. All 4-H record keeping and club books follow these dates.
