Exhibitors will receive a halter from Bremer Co. Dairy Promoters. Project requirements:

1. Projects open to 4-H Clover members in grades K-3rd grade.
2. Members must be enrolled in Bottle/Bucket Calf project by May 15th.
3. Class is open to any newborn or orphan calf, steer or heifer, dairy, beef or crossbred.
4. Calf must be born between February 1st and May 1st of the current year. The calf must be fed on a bottle/bucket before the calf is two weeks of age, by exhibitor.
5. The calf/calves must be properly identified. The identity of the calf must be entered in 4-H Online in the 4-H Extension Office by May 15, 2021.
6. Members are responsible for the care of the calf during the time put on a bottle/bucket until fair. Which includes feeding, training the calf to lead, keeping track of health and safety.
7. Project worksheets need to be filled out and given to the Judge on Saturday, July 30, 8:00 am at their interview
8. Calves will be entered no later than Saturday, July 30 at 7:00 a.m. and will be released after the show.
9. The following criteria will be used for judging for K-1st graders.
 - What has member learned about the care and raising of the calf?
 - Getting calf ready for show day.
 - No need to Clip, but can if wishes to
 - Lead halter, no need for Show halter, but can if wishes to
 - Cleanliness
 - Exhibitors knowledge of the calf
 - Did the calf get sick?
 - If so, what did an Adult and Exhibitor do to help calf
 - Calf's birthdate
 - Breed
 - Steps of feeding
 - Just knowing the steps started on Bottle, then Bucket, then Weaning
10. The following criteria will be used for judging for 2nd-3rd graders.
 - What has member learned about the care and raising of the calf?
 - The fitting and showing of the calf
 - No need to Clip/Fluff, but can if wishes to
 - Lead Halter or Show halter
 - Cleanliness
 - Be able to explain how his/her calf is to be show ready to their breed
 - Exhibitors knowledge of the calf
 - General health
 - Did your calf get sick?
 - If so, be able to explain what and how did you treat the calf

11. Calves must meet the same health requirements as all other beef and dairy animals

You may do what you would like with the calves after fair. The 3rd graders may keep the calf as a second-year project. Show them next year as a dairy heifer or beef animal. Classes will be divided up according to the age or weight of the calf, not the exhibitor's age. The Bottle/ Bucket Calf class is for fun. We would like the exhibitors to learn from the experience. Also, for the experience in the show ring and having an animal at the fair. Please make sure the exhibitor is having nothing but FUN through this Bottle/ Bucket Calf experience.
