Re: Livestock Identification Deadlines and County Weigh-ins

On behalf of the Iowa 4-H Program and considering the current and ongoing situation regarding the COVID-19 virus, adjustments are being made to this year’s livestock identification process and county weigh-ins.

As of today, all **county weigh-ins for meat goats, sheep and/or swine are to be cancelled.**

This is for the health and safety of our 4-H families and staff. Unfortunately, that means fairs that conduct rate of gain contests will not be able to do so for the 2020 fair season. For those counties who’ve already had their weigh-in this spring, those contests could still occur.

The May 15 livestock ID deadline will be moved back to June 1. This applies to ALL livestock that are usually identified by May 15 including: Breeding Beef, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goat, Dog, Horse, Meat Goat, Poultry, Sheep and Swine. Rabbits will remain at the July 1 deadline.

Tagging Procedures – we are asking county extension offices to work with families to obtain official 4-H ear tags, or if county staff are comfortable could set up on-farm tagging. We are not requiring counties to do that latter, it’s just another option. Any process that is utilized should keep in mind good biosecurity practices and measures for people and animals. **Additionally, for identification purposes, we are asking all tagged animals be documented by photo that is uploaded to 4-H Online. Process will be outlined in the FAQs mentioned below.**

Retinal Imaging – since 4-H sheep and meat goats are required to have retinal images collected for State Fair eligibility, we are hopeful that adding two weeks to the ID deadline will allow staff to collect those images, perhaps on the farm or if circumstances improve and social distancing is less of a concern, those animals could come to a central site for image collection.

A Frequently Asked Questions document is being developed and will be posted on the 4-H Livestock website, <https://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/projects/livestock>, as soon as possible. An email will also be sent to all 4-H families currently enrolled in a livestock project via 4-H Online with these changes.

We will continue to monitor and re-evaluate the situation and make additional adjustments as needed. We appreciate your understanding and want you to know we have our 4-H staff, families and youth members’ absolute best interest at heart. We understand these are unprecedented times and will do everything we can to ensure youth can exhibit their livestock projects this summer.

PETS

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. All 4-H members are eligible to exhibit in the 4-H Pet Show and 4-H Fun Events.
3. All pets must be entered into the correct class on the pre-fair livestock entry form due into the Cherokee County Extension Office by the pre-fair due date announced in the "4-H Newsletter". (If there are not enough pre-fair entries, the show will be cancelled.)
4. Members need to have the animals in the pet project on the fairgrounds only for the time of the show. Entry of pets will take place 1/2 hour before the show.
5. All pets must come on a leash, in a box or cage, or in a bowl.
6. All exhibitors are responsible for their own pets.
7. Any female animal in season can not be exhibited.
8. An exhibitor is limited to enter in two class, one entry per class.

DOG OBEDIENCE

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. All dogs must be enrolled on Livestock Identification forms filed at the Extension Office by May 15 of the current year. All dogs must be entered into the correct class in Fair Entry.
3. All dogs must be immunized against RABIES, DISTEMPER, and PARVOVIRUS. Proof of immunization is required.
4. Mixed and purebred dogs are allowed.
5. Dogs are to be shown by the 4-H member that owns them and trained them.
6. Any female dog in season may not be exhibited.
7. All dogs should be well groomed, free of loose hair, fleas, lice, and ticks. Toenails should be of suitable length and the eyes and ears clean and clear.
8. Entry of dogs will take place half an hour before the show. Entries will **not** remain on the fairgrounds, but rather must be present only for the show. All dogs must be on leash or crated while waiting for their class to be called.
9. Exhibitors must bring the necessary equipment to provide adequate care for their dog during waiting periods (water or food).
10. EXHIBITOR CONDUCT. Exhibitors shall not strike dogs nor use any other unnecessary harsh physical means of disciplining dogs. The exhibitor shall be ready with the dog when called.
11. This is not an AKC sanctioned dog show. However, AKC rules have been used as guidelines.

EXOTIC ANIMALS

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. Animals that do not fit into other divisions are eligible for this department.
3. Pot-bellied pigs may not be exhibited due to the fact that all swine exhibited at the Cherokee County Fair are sent for harvest following the show.
4. Classes/lots will be broken down at the discretion of the superintendent according to the number/species/breeds of entries.
5. Animals will not be housed on the fairgrounds. They will arrive the day of show, be judged, and released following the show.
6. Exhibitors are allowed to use halters or collars in the show ring.
7. Exhibitors should be prepared to discuss with and/or inform the judge and the audience about information such as: animal's name, species, breed, care, feed, health, age housing needs, etc.
8. All exhibitors are highly encouraged to participate in a showmanship contest.
9. Animals will be judged on their specific species/breed requirements.

4-H BUILDING EXHIBITS

GENERAL 4-H RULES AND REGULATIONS

Exhibits will be judged on the Tuesday before the fair, according to the judging schedule posted in the 4-H Newsletter. Reminder all Static Exhibits must be in fair entry at <http://cherokeecountyfair.fairentry.com> by Wednesday July 8th to take to the fair.

1. This department is open to youth who are participating in 4-H Youth Development Programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension. All exhibitors must be enrolled in 4-H/FFA/FCCLA during the current year and have signed "Iowa Youth Code of Ethics" on file at the Extension Office.
2. All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the 4-H General Rules and Regulations and all 4-H department exhibit class rules and regulations.
3. The following general rules and regulations apply to the following departments: Animal Science, Agriculture & Natural Resources, Creative Arts, Family & Consumer Sciences, Personal Development and Science, Engineering & Technology. 4H'ers must also follow the specific rules in the individual departments, classes, and lots.
4. 4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) are eligible to exhibit at the Iowa State Fair, Exceptions:
 - A. Group exhibits from an entire club may include 4th grade members.
 - B. Exhibitors in 4-H classes are not eligible to exhibit in a similar department of the FFA divisions or vice-versa.
 - C. Exhibits previously entered in an FFA Ag Science Fair or any other FFA event or competition may not be entered in any 4-H exhibit class.
5. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H'er participation in 4-H projects or programs during the current 4-H year. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project or program. The exhibitor should determine the class that relates to their goal.
6. Exhibits that do not comply with the class description, size guidelines, copyright restrictions, safety, and approved methods will be disqualified and not put on public display.
7. Endangered and threatened plants and animals (includes insect), or songbird feathers and nests may NOT be used in any exhibit.
8. Copyrighted materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission form the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits. See also special rules for Visual Arts and General Copyright information for 4-H'ers. <http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/statefair/handbook>.
9. Due to security, we discourage 4-H members from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as the exhibit or part of an exhibit. The Cherokee County Fair and Iowa State University Extension & Outreach will use diligence to insure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement, but will not be responsible for damage or loss by fire, theft, etc.

10. Large items such as tractors, outdoor equipment, etc., may be displayed outside the exhibit buildings. Exhibitors of large exhibits selected for the Iowa State Fair will be requested to transport them to and from the State Fair.
11. The 4-H'ers goal and applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance and design. Exhibitors will receive written evaluation comments on the exhibits and a blue, red, or white ribbon. Refer to exhibit class evaluation rubrics for detailed evaluation criteria in each class. Rubrics are located on each 4-H project page at: <http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/projects>. All judges' decisions are final.
12. A written explanation, an audio or video recording is to be included as part of each exhibit. The exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit:
 - A. What did you plan to learn or do?
(What was your exhibit goal?)
 - B. What steps did you take to learn or do this?
 - C. What were the most important things you learned?

Exhibitors are encouraged to check for additional requirements in exhibit classes for Visual Arts, Clothing & Fashion, Home Improvement, and Sewing and Needlework.

"Exhibit Goal" sheets containing the three questions are available from club leaders, the Cherokee County Extension website and the Cherokee County Extension & Outreach Office. **THIS FORM MUST BE ATTACHED TO YOUR ENTRY!** These forms are also acceptable to place in the member's record keeping system when fair is over.

13. All exhibits, activities, and programs must represent appropriate safety procedures in the development of the exhibit and during the evaluation process. This includes static exhibits and activities revolving around the *Communications* program.
14. Exhibit classes are broad categories. To plan exhibits, 4-H'ers are encouraged to use project guides and manuals and program materials to determine goals and learning experiences. Some project manuals include specific exhibit suggestions and procedures. An exhibit can represent an idea, a part, or all learning involved in the respective project or program.

15. Members are not limited to one entry per class, but a variety of techniques is strongly recommended.
16. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - *Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size.
 - *Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48' x 48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (unfolded) dimensions.
 - *Display boxes may not exceed 28' x 22' in height or width and 12' in depth.

18. The Ranch Horse Conformation Class is designed to showcase the conformation necessary for a ranch horse to do his job under saddle. Equine are ridden into the ring for judging. After walking to the judge and trotting past, equine are lined up by the ring person along the rail, facing the center of the arena with ample space between each entry. The exhibitor will then dismount, proceed to ground-tie and unsaddle the equine, placing the tack along-side the equine on the left side. When unsaddled, the exhibitor may then take up the reins and stand the equine up for inspection by the judge. Bits may be checked by the judge. After all equine have been inspected by the judge, and the judge's card is ready to be marked, the exhibitors shall be signaled to re-saddle their equine, and riders may remount for presentation of ribbons. First and 2nd year exhibitors will be allowed to have helpers assist them with re-saddling. If Junior (Grades 4-8) class exhibitors need assistance, please visit with the equine department superintendent prior to **Class 925**.

19. **Classes 902, 905, 908, 911, 920, 923, 925, 930, 933, 936, 941 and 944** are for 1st and 2nd year exhibitors **only**. If you exhibit in these classes, you are not eligible to exhibit in **Classes 900, 901, 903, 904, 906, 907, 909, 910, 921, 922, 926, 927, 931, 932, 934, 935, 937, 938, 942, and 943** (1st and 2nd year exhibitor classes are meant for 4-H'ers with limited riding/show experience and are open to all equine. If the exhibitor has the experience/comfort level to enter the grade 4-8 or grad 9-12 level classes, they may do so; however, they cannot enter a mix of both levels).

20. Equine should not be ridden in any areas south of the Expo Building.

21. For safety reasons, while on the fairgrounds, equine may only be ridden by the 4-H'er. If a 4-H'er needs assistance with their animal, a member of 4-H'er's immediate family or other adult may receive approval to ride the animal after discussing the situation with the equine department superintendent and receiving permission to do so. Professional groomers and/or trainers are prohibited.

22. An Equine Sportsmanship Award will be given in the following age groups: 1st and 2nd year exhibitors, Juniors, and Seniors. This award will be given any exhibitor in the Equine area that best demonstrates the 4-H slogan, **"To win without bragging, lose without squealing."** the winners will be chosen by a selected committee.

12. No **stallions** may be shown in either halter, performance, or game classes, except in **Class 912, Halter Foal**.
13. Ponies are any animal under 14.1 hands. A horse is any equine 14.1 hands and over (14.1 hands equals 57 inches). Ponies that are shod will have 1/2" deducted from height. POA height cards will be accepted. **Exception:** If you have horse breed registration papers, you are allowed to classify the animal as a horse, if you have pony breed registration papers, you are allowed to classify the animal as a pony. **Example—** *a Quarter Horse who is 14.0 hands and is registered with AQHA, the equine can be classified as a horse.* Registration papers must be provided. **Animals may exhibit in only one division: Pony or Horse.** From Rules and Regulations for 4-H Equine Shows in Iowa, (June 2013).
14. Equine exhibitors in all classes will wear a white or solid colored long-sleeved shirt or blouse with buttons, zippers, or snaps and a color (tuxedo shirts are allowed) and dark blue jeans. Hard-soled, Heeled boots are required, along with a 4-H armband worn on the upper left arm. English classes will wear the appropriate attire as described in 4H 511C. Check 4H 511C concerning the use of spurs. **All 4-H youth participating in any related horse event regardless of type of event on the fairgrounds while mounted must wear properly fitting protective headgear passing or surpassing current applicable ASTM/SEI (American Society for Testing and Materials/Safety Equipment Institute) standards with chin strap and properly fitted harness secured.** It is the responsibility of the rider, parent or guardian to see that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use, and is properly fitted and in good condition. All helmets will be inspected on equine check in day. Cherokee County Extension and Outreach, Cherokee County Fair, 4-H, and FFA make no representation or warranty, express or implied, about any protective headgear, and caution riders that death or serious injury may result despite wearing such headgear as all equestrian sports involve inherent dangerous risk and as no helmet can protect riders against all foreseeable injuries.
15. The classes in this department will be judged based on scoring procedures listed in 4H 511C, Rules and Regulations for 4-H Equine Show in Iowa (revised June 2013). This handbook includes descriptions of various classes and what the judge is looking for, as well as information on show ring etiquette and proper attire, appointments, and equipment. Copies may be purchased at the Cherokee County Extension and Outreach Office for \$12.00 or can be downloaded from-www.extension.iastate.edu/4hfilesagriculture/4H511CEquineRulesRegOnline2013.pdf. 16. All decisions will be final. The judge will make a reasonable effort to give reasons for final placing in each class. Any questions, comments, or complaints should be directed to the horse department superintendent.
17. Patterns—The show Judge shall determine the patterns used for the Showmanship, Equitation (if used), Reining, and Western Riding Classes and these will be provided in the exhibitor packet and/or posted prior to class time.

* Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.

* Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed.

* Meat jerky products are prohibited.

* The recipe must be included for any prepared food exhibit; credit the source of the recipe.

* Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2019 is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used. Which is available at the Cherokee County Extension Office.

* Preserved food exhibits must include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display. Exhibitors will leave a portion of the perishable food for display, and can take the rest home.

* Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a re-closable plastic bag with the goal sheet attached to the outside.

* The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

603 Breeding Gilts

1. Each exhibitor will be permitted to show a maximum of two breeding gilts.
2. All breeding gilts will be eligible to show; however, gilts less than 220lbs will not be eligible for championships. Breeding gilt cannot be selected from a market pen of three.
3. This show is a **non-terminal show**. Exhibitors may choose to have their pigs harvested at the conclusion of the fair. Exhibitors NOT marketing their pigs MUST complete the proper paperwork at WEIGH IN of the fair, indicating the ear tag number of each breeding gilt leaving the fairgrounds. Breeding gilts not indicated on the paper forms at weigh in will be harvested following the fair. **No** exceptions. It is the recommendation of the swine committee to quarantine show breeding gilts for 30 days after the fair. The Cherokee County Extension and Outreach, Cherokee County Fair Board, Official Fair Vet, 4-H, and FFA assume no responsibility for swine returning home with any disease from the fair.
4. Breeding Gilt Champion has the option to be shown at the **All Iowa Show Down**.

EQUINE

Because of insurance responsibilities, confine horses to designated areas!

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. 1st & 2nd Year equine exhibitors are required to attend but not limited to two (2) horse riding practices. Contact the Extension Office for the riding practice schedule. All other equine exhibitors are encouraged to attend riding practices to further their skillsets.
3. **Equine exhibitors are required to stall one equine on the fairgrounds during the fair. The stalled horse does not have to be shown in the 4-H equine show, but must be ID'd in the 4-H's name and have a current health certificate. All other Equine would come the day of the show and return home following the show.**
4. **An Equine can only be identified to one 4-H'er. Immediate family members (siblings/step-siblings) can co-identify the same horse. Siblings must both be in 4-H to identify the same equine. The same animal will only be allowed to show in a class ONCE— Example, a 5th grade 4H'er cannot show a horse in barrels, and the 8th grade sibling show the same horse in barrels; however, the other sibling could show that same horse in pole bending / per division. (County Rule Only)**
5. Each 4-H member will be allowed to ID a maximum of 5 equine; of those 5, a maximum of 2 can be leased.
6. **No substitution of equine after ID date. (May 15)**
7. The Showmanship Classes are open to all showmen. There is no entry fee or premium paid for Showmanship Classes. All exhibitors are strongly encouraged to participate in the appropriate Showmanship Class at the fair.
8. Premium money will be paid in all Classes, except for Grand and Reserve Champion animals and Showmanship Classes.
9. Each exhibitor may enter a maximum of four animals. Only one entry per exhibitor per Class, per Division.

All swine exhibited must be accompanied by a record of a negative pseudorabies test, the test having been performed within 30 days prior to show, for swine originating from a Stage 4 or lower status county. No pseudorabies testing is required for swine originating from a Stage 5 county. (As of February 2005, Iowa is Stage 5).
13. There shall be no coloring agents, powder, or oil used on pigs. Pigs in violation will be disqualified.
14. 4-H'ers may exhibit up to 8 pigs EXAMPLE: 4-H'ers may exhibit two pens of three market or production pigs, and two breeding gilts, for a maximum of 8 pigs.
15. Each exhibitor will be permitted to show two pens of 3. **A maximum of six pigs** may be entered in **Class, Market or Production Pigs**.
16. All exhibitors need to furnish adequate planking for storage of tack over pens. They should also consider using a concrete water pan or a different watering system that cannot be over turned easily.
17. Exhibitor are required to bring their own pen bedding (wood chips).

4. The order of sign-up will determine the order you choose your pig for the project.
5. 4-H members will be responsible for the care and feeding of their project at the fair.
6. 4-H members are allowed to ID one Kids and Pigs project.
7. 4-H members will be responsible for participating in the Cherokee County Fair Clean-up, July 9, 2020.
8. 4-H members will be responsible for participating in loading pigs and cleaning up of the Swine barn after the pigs have left on Sunday, July 19, 2020.
9. 4-H members are responsible for attending the learning meetings.
10. 4-H members will show their project in the Kids and Pigs class and can participate in the showmanship class.

6. Each project will be evaluated on the following 100 point grade system. The management will be scored during the feeding season.

Production Records	20 points	Live Evaluation of Pen	20 points
Pen Performance	20 points	Farm Visit	20 points
Youth Interview	20 points	TOTAL	100 points

7. Project, as stated in rule #6, will be evaluated live by a feeder lamb judge at the fair.
8. Those animals weighed individually at the sheep weigh-in will be eligible to compete in the rate-of-gain competition. Rate-of-gain contest will be done separately for advanced sheep feeding and show lambs.
9. Sheep should be sheared at weigh-in for Best Rate-Of-Gain and #2 pelts.

BOTTLE/BUCKET SHEEP

513 Bottle/ Bucket Lambs

1. Must be enrolled in a 4-H Club.
2. Bottle/Bucket Lambs must be ear tagged and identified on 4hOnline by May 15th.
3. Lambs must be born before May 15th of current year and be bucket or bottle fed, **no nursing.**

SWINE

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. This species requires YQCA (Youth for the Quality of Animals) training. See Rule #7 of the general Livestock Rules & regulations for details.
3. Check weights and tags before entry. All swine market/production animals weighed in must be slaughtered. * Market/Production Animal Champion Hog has the option to be released. Only if it will be shown at the **All Iowa Show Down**. No Exceptions!
4. It is highly recommended that exhibitors know what class each animal will be entered in at the time of weigh in at the fair.
5. All pigs must have an official 4-H tag OR USDA tag at the time of weigh-in.
6. **Hogs must be of U.S. Origin.** COOL forms must be filled out and signed at weigh-in.
7. Breeding gilts can be shown **only** in the breeding class.
8. Exhibitors are hereby notified that lightweight and heavyweight pigs are subject to dockage according to the packers' base bid.
9. Cherokee County Pigs are required to be **Paylean Free**. No feed containing ractopamine will be allowed for pigs that will be coming to the Cherokee County Fair due to packer requirements. Questions and concerns should be directed to the Extension Office or a Cherokee County fair board swine member. More details will be coming. **Do not feed your pigs paylean products.**
10. All pigs to be marketed must have a minimum of 1/2" inch of hair for Packer requirements.

ADVANCED FEEDING

1. The object of the advanced sheep feeding program is to make it possible for 4-H'ers to feed sheep and market them on a business basis.
2. Members are required to bring the project to the fair. Sheep need to be groomed so they are presentable at the fair. Sheep do not need to be halter broken.
3. 4-H and FFA members may feed as one pen of three head of sheep, either ewes or wethers. Each individual may exhibit two pens.
4. The sheep must be weighed in at the 4-H market sheep weigh-in date. The date of the weigh-in will be May 8th. Must be designated as an advanced sheep feeding project at that time. The sheep need an official 4-H tag. Initial purchase price of feeder lambs will be determined on day of weigh-in. Sale price to be determined on entry day of fair.
5. At the fair, members will be required to give the history of their project, including management techniques, feeding, and costs during the year.

SHEEP

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. This species requires YQCA (Youth for the Quality of Animals) training. See Rule #7 of the General Livestock Rules & Regulations for details.
3. In order to comply with the State Veterinarian Regulations, all sheep exhibited must have received their health certificates within 14 days prior to entry day, since sheep health certificates are only valid for 14 days. All sexually intact sheep must be identified with an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag and this number along with a 4-H ear tag number must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. To request free scrapie tags, call 1-866-873-2824. The due date for health certificates will be announced in the 4-H Newsletter.

BREEDING

500 Breeding Ewe Lamb

1. Entries are open to ewe lambs born on or after January 1st of this year and regularly enrolled in a 4-H Sheep Project. All lambs must be identified at birth. Birth date is to be given on entry form.
2. Lambs may be purebred, crossbred, or grade, but not the same lambs exhibited in the market classes.
3. Ewe lambs must be sheared over whole body with comb, and fed for maximum growth (not fattening) to encourage early sexual maturity.
4. Breeding ewe lamb and yearling classes will be judged on breeding characteristics.
5. Two lambs may be entered.

COMMERCIAL BREEDING YEARLING

501 Commercial Breeding Yearling

1. Each exhibitor may exhibit two yearlings born between January 1 and June 1 of the previous year. Yearlings will be mouthed. Yearlings should be selected from exhibitor's own breed flock that were exhibited as breeding ewe lambs at the previous year's Cherokee County Fair.

- * Entries must be made on the Clothing Event Entry Blank. The due date for entries is July 3rd.
- * Judging to take place prior to the Cherokee County Fair on Sunday, July 12, 2020 at the Extension Office.
- * Participants will be evaluated on the following:
 - a. Learning to Communicate—goals, knowledge, confidence
 - b. Developing Individual Self—esteem, grooming, posture, poise
 - c. Making Decisions about Appearance and Design—clothing/fabric choices, fit of garment
 - d. Choosing Clothes for specific Occasions or Purposes—appropriateness of outfit and accessories
 - e. Identifying Quality Garment Features—knowledge of quality features of garment and fiber content
 - f. Managing to Get your Money's Worth—cost of clothing, budget

Class A Constructed Garment/Outfit

- * 4-H'ers may model a garment or outfit they have constructed, hand-knitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted themselves during the current 4-H year.
- * A garment or outfit consisting of one to three pieces such as party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear, and/or coats are acceptable entries.
- * A garment such as a vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, dress, coat, etc. is an acceptable entry.
- * Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered as garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected.
- * All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected by the member.

Class B Selected Garment/Outfit

- * 4-H'ers may model a selected and/or purchased outfit that represents the 4-H'ers goal or intended use for the selected outfit.
- * The outfit may be selected and/or purchased from any source, including clothing store, department store, consignment shop, used clothing stores, etc.

* Clothing items which are home-sewn are not eligible unless the completed garment was purchased from a used clothing source. Clothing items which are custom sewn specifically for the participant are not eligible.

* Gifts of clothing are eligible unless the completed garment was purchased from a used clothing source. Clothing items which are custom sewn specifically for the participant are not eligible.

* Gift of clothing are eligible, only if the 4-H'er was actively involved in the selection of the garment/outfit.

Class C \$15 Challenge

* Cost of outfit must be \$15 or less, not including shoes, accessories or undergarments. Receipt (s) MUST be turned in with the 4-H Clothing Event Report Form.

* 4-H'ers may model an outfit they have selected and/or purchased within the current 4-H year from a garage sale, consignment sale, or resale shop (i.e. Goodwill, Salvation Army or other stores of this type) that represents the 4-H'ers goal or intended use of the selected outfit. Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts that were selected by the 4-H'er belong in Clothing Selection.

COMMUNICATIONS

The Communication Department is designed to provide opportunities for youth to select a method by which they might develop their personal communication skills in sharing talents, knowledge, or information with others. The classes are designed to provide a series of developmental experiences for various age levels. The ability to communicate will be the major criteria for evaluation this department.

* Entries for this department must be made on the appropriate forms and returned to the Cherokee County Extension Office. The due date for entries is June 26th.

* Judging for educational Presentations and Extemporaneous Speaking will take place prior to the Cherokee County Fair. Judging day will be Sunday, July 12th at the Extension Office. Ribbon placings will be announced at the Cherokee County Fair. See the fair schedule.

* The following premiums will be paid on an individual basis for the Communications Department:

* Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits may be given by one or more 4-H'ers. Teams consisting of youth of mixed grades will be entered in the class of the member in the highest grade level (i.e. a team with a 5th grader and an 8th grader must be entered in the intermediate/senior class.)

* 4-H'ers are encouraged to wear appropriate clothing representative of the 4-H Youth Program and/or the topic of the presentation. If clothing contributes to the topic being presented, such as wearing a beekeepers' outfit while doing a presentation on bee raising, a 4-H'er is encouraged to wear such clothing. Where distinctive clothing is not involved, clothing that alerts the public it is a 4-H'er giving a presentation is strongly encouraged.

4. Exhibitors will be required to have horns disbudded, dehorned, or tipped blunt on all goats prior to arrival on the grounds.

5. Exhibitors are allowed to use halters or collars in the show ring.

a. Thirty minutes before the program, each participant will draw three of the available topics, selecting one to speak on. The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H. The selected topic will not be available to the other participants.

b. A preparation room will be available. A participant may not leave the preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help from a parent, leader, other adult, or any other youth. Each participant will have 30 minutes preparation time.

c. All reference material will be screened by a program official on the following basis:

* Participant may bring his/her own books, magazines or newspaper clippings for reference during the thirty minutes of preparation.

* Reference material must be printed material such as books or magazines (cannot be notes, outlines or speeches prepared by the participant or by another person for use in this program.)

* Some relevant reference material may be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historical material related to the 4-H program.

d. Each speech shall be the result of the 4-H'ers own efforts using approved reference material that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided. Plain 3" x 5" note cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. If notes are used, the 3" x 5" note cards provided must be used in delivering the speech.

e. Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.

f. Each speech shall be not less than four but no more than six minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the judge. The participant will be shown time cards in an ascending order (1,2,3,4,5) by the time keeper. "Stop" will be said at six minutes.

g. The Program time keeper will introduce each participant by name and the club he/she represents. The participant will be expected to introduce his/her speech by title only.

h. Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters or audiovisuals of any sort. A podium will not be available.

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H General Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. This species required YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) training. See rule #7 of the General Livestock Rules & Regulations for details.
3. **ALL** dairy cattle must have TWO of the following ID options completed by MAY 15: Official tattoo, Registration# (all levels of registry are acceptable), Official DHIA metal tag or 840-type RFID tag, Photo uploaded (2 photos: right side, left side). ***Farm tags are not an acceptable method of official ID.
4. Dairy exhibitors will wear a white shirt and white or blue jeans.
5. Dairy animals will be classified to their dominating breed characteristics.
6. Dairy animals will be placed by breeds in blue, red, and white groupings and premiums will be awarded on the basis of these groupings.
7. Heifers may be either purebred or grad Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein Friesian, or Jersey cattle. Purebred papers are not needed.
8. Blue ribbon winners from Jr. heifer calves thru senior yearling compete for Jr. Champion. 2 year old cow thru dry cow compete for Sr. Champion.

PRIDE OF IOWA

This class encourages participation at the county fair and helps acquaint 4-H'ers with products grown or produced in Iowa. This class also serves as a first step in communications exhibits.

2020 Theme for Pride of Iowa

“Sweeter than Honey more Precious than Gold”

- * Entrants must be enrolled in 4-H. 4th graders are encourage to enter. Entries may be made as an individual or as a team. The team can be any number of members and a mix of age levels.
- * The 4-H'er must submit their entry on the Pride of Iowa entry form due into the Extension Office by July 8th. The entry must include the recipe and the recipe's main or "featured" ingredient should be one of the commodity products produced in Iowa. *Examples would include garden vegetables, meat, and fruits.*
- * The member prepares or demonstrates how to make the recipe at the contest. The member is not required to narrate or give a verbal presentation. However, they should be prepared to answer the questions fair goers or judges might ask. The recipe should be relatively simple to prepare and should be appropriate to the age and skill of the member.
- * Samples of the finished recipe should be given away to fair goers. It is suggested that you have enough "samples" to serve approximately 75 to 100 people. Some of the samples can be prepared ahead of the contest.
- * Members must supply their own gloves, food safety equipment, aprons, paper towels, food ingredients, and equipment. A 6 foot table will be provided (for demonstrating and serving). Ingredients can be partially prepared ahead of the contest, (nuts chopped, meat precooked, mushrooms drained, etc.) but the ingredients of the recipe must be mixed together at the fair during the time of presentation.
- * Each entry must have a poster with their name (s), recipe, and club they are representing displayed.
 - A panel of volunteers from the county will serve as judges. Criteria for judging will include:
 - a. taste and flavor of the product
 - b. attractiveness of display area
 - c. use of theme and originality
 - d. enthusiasm of the entrants
 - e. serving and food safety
 - f. recipe appropriate to age and skill
- * All participants will receive "Participation Ribbons" and a \$2.00 participant premium.
- * Judges will award 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place. 1st place will receive Grand Champion rosettes and \$15 in prize money. 2nd place will receive Reserve Grand Champion rosettes and \$10.00 in prize money. 3rd place will receive white ribbons and \$5.00 in prize money.

Step 3—Pour the apple cider vinegar and vanilla extract into small holes and vegetable oil into large hole. Pour the 1 cup of water over everything. Using a fork, mix everything together until blended.

Step 4—Bake in oven for 30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the middle comes out clean.

1. The objective of the production beef feeding program is to make it possible for 4-H or FFA members to feed cattle and market on a business basis.
2. Members are required to bring the project to the fair. They do not need to be groomed or halter broken.
3. 4-H and FFA members entering this project shall have only one entry per lot purchased and weighed as part of the normal county fair weigh in process. Purebred, grade and crossbred cattle will all be shown in the same class.
4. Purchase Price & Weight. Members must show a copy of original receipt if purchased, home raised calves need an appraisal by an order buyer/livestock auctioneer. Please turn in by January 15, 2020 to Cherokee County Extension Office. **25 points**
5. The cattle must be weighed between November 1 and January 15 and a certified scale ticket (example: *from any grain elevator*) and a sales receipt must be brought to the Cherokee County Extension Office by January 15. The cattle may also be weighed in at the 4-H Market Beef Weigh-in and designated as a Production Beef Feeding project at the time. The cattle need an official 4-H tag. They must be ID'd by January 15 and the tag number and color in their ear noted on the official ID form. It is suggested that 4-H'ers identify 4 animals at the weigh-in. Then when it comes time to go to the fair, select the best matching 3.
6. Those animals weighed individually at the beef weigh-in will be eligible to compete in the rate-of-gain competition. Rate-of-gain will be in two divisions: Advanced Cattle Feeding and Tie Calves.
7. Monthly Feed Reports need to be entered into **Performance Beef Database** online by the 10th of each month by the 4-H'er. **Performance Beef** accounts will be set up and emailed out by January 15, 2020. This program will keep a running total of average daily gain, cost per pound gained and your breakeven. All feed stuffs will use standardized pricing. 4-H'ers are encouraged to retain a copy of all feed records for their own records. **35 points**

The Beef Committee will do a farm visit in May to review progress.
8. Cleanliness—Bedding offered, barn, windbreak, protection. **10 points**
9. Bunk/Feed Management—only 4H advanced cattle in this pen, may share pen with siblings. Fresh feed, stalks scooped out. **10 points**
10. Fresh water source. **10 points**
11. Vet cost—Vaccine, implants, health papers, etc. **10 points**
12. The project will be evaluated live by the beef judge at the fair, plus members will be required to give the history of their project, including management techniques, feeding, poster, and the costs during the year.
13. Heifers must gain 2.0 pounds a day to receive a blue or purple ribbon. Steers must gain 2.2 pounds a day to receive a blue or purple ribbon.
14. Market acceptability, degree of finish, uniformity of pen. **25 points**

MARKET STEER

1. Minimum weight 875 pounds.
2. A market steer must gain 2.2 pounds a day from the county weigh-in day to the fair entry day to receive a blue or purple ribbon.
3. Steers will be exhibited on halter.
4. A Grand and Reserve Champion lightweight, middleweight, and heavyweight steer will be selected. these, plus the Grand and Reserve Champion County Drop calves, will be judged for Grand and Reserve Champion overall.

4. A dairy steer must gain 2.2 pounds a day from the official county beef weigh-in day to the fair entry date to receive a blue or purple ribbon.

7. Calves born before January 1st of the current year and weigh less than the minimum upon arrival at the Cherokee County Fair, will be eligible for a "feeder" class and will show on show day. They will not be eligible for the rate-of-gain.

The Cherokee County Extension Office and the Cherokee County Fair Board will use diligence to ensure the safety of all items entered at the Cherokee County Fair; however we are not responsible for damage or loss by fire, theft, etc.

Showcase items may be in any of the following categories:

Class A: Animals

Showcase items related to all species and types of animals. The actual animal may not be brought to the fair.

Class B: Creative Arts

Showcase items related to art, photography, and music.

Class C: Agriculture and Natural Resources

Showcase items related to plants, agriculture, and the environment. Notice: Due to the risk of bringing live plants to the county fair, you will be totally responsible for the care of your plant (s) while they are at the fair.

Class D: Family and Consumer Science

Showcase items related to food, clothing, or home decorating. Sewn or home-crafted items can be included in this class.

5. Recognition will be given to the top ten calves for Rate—of—Gain in 2 divisions. They are tie animals for Production Beef Feeding.

4-H / FFA LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS GENERAL 4-H RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All exhibitors must be enrolled in 4-H/FFA/Volunteers during the current year and have a signed "Iowa Youth Code of Ethics" on file at the Extension Office.
2. 4-H'ers in grades 4th-12th are eligible to show. All members must exhibit their own project unless excused by the general superintendent. Anyone assisting with the showing of livestock must be a 4-H or FFA member in good standing in Cherokee County.
3. All 4-H'ers must have met meeting requirements.
4. Animals must be identified on the proper 4hOnline by May 15th of the current year in order to be eligible for any fair class. Market Beef, Market Sheep, and Meat Goats were ID'd at their respective weigh-ins.
5. All 4-H livestock show entries MUST be made through Fair Entry by 4:30pm on July 3rd. No late entries will be accepted. <https://cherokeecountyfair.fairentry.com>
6. All livestock must be accompanied by a signed health certificate, available from your local veterinarian, which must be turned in to the Cherokee County Extension Office before the fair. The due date July 15th.
7. 4-H/FFA members exhibiting swine, beef, sheep, dairy (cattle and goat), rabbits, meat goats, and poultry at the county fair, Iowa State Fair, or Clay County Fair are required to have 4-H YQCA certification. The guidelines for YQCA are:
 - * Youth, grades 4-6th, must recertify annually by attending a YQCA training class.
 - * Youth, 7-9th, can attend a training class annually or complete the intermediate test which will certify them until they are in the 10th grade.
 - * Youth, grades 10-12th, can attend a training class annually or complete the senior test which will certify them until they are age 19.

Must be completed by June 30th.
8. Stalls will be assigned by clubs. All calves must be tied in the assigned stall. All other livestock must be in the appropriate pen.
9. Weigh-in times in ALL livestock classes will be strictly observed. All weights must be recorded by the superintendent in charge.
10. No advertising of feeds or commercial products will be permitted in connection with the 4-H or FFA shows.
11. It is strongly recommended that wood shavings or wood chips be used for bedding. Bedding will NOT be available at the fairgrounds.
12. Club members will furnish their own feed, pails feed boxes, hay troughs, forks, rakes, showing equipment, manure handling equipment, wood chip bedding, etc. All equipment should be labeled with the exhibitor's name. Exhibitors should take home all equipment and feed not used.
13. Gates on the barns will be closed at 10:30pm and everyone is to be out of the barn by that time. A 4-H/FFA exhibitor can stay overnight at the fair grounds in a designated area, if they are registered with the Fair Board in the fair office, and if they are accompanied by a parent/guardian.

BREEDING BEEF

1. General Livestock Rules & Regulations and 4-H general Rules & Regulations apply in this department.
2. This species requires YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) training. See rule #7 of the General Livestock Rules & Regulations for details.
3. It is required that animals be double tied.
4. All Commercial breeding heifers will be in one class unless there is an adequate number of entries to class by weight.
5. Purebred/Registered breeding heifer identification. Two methods of identification are **REQUIRED** for all breeding beef. 1) A tattoo is required for ALL animals- includes registered AND commercial heifers-calfhood vaccination# cannot be used as the main tattoo identifier. 2) And, one of the following ADDITIONAL methods of ID is required as a secondary methods: Registration # (if the animal is registered) Or, calfhood vaccination # Or, official Iowa 4-H ear tag.
6. Commercial breeding heifer identification. Two methods of identification are **REQUIRED** for all breeding beef. 1) A tattoo is required for ALL animals-includes registered AND commercial heifers-calfhood vaccination# cannot be used as the main tattoo identifier. 2) And, one of the following ADDITIONAL methods of ID is required as a secondary methods: Registration # (if the animal is registered) Or, calfhood vaccination #, Or, official Iowa 4-H ear tag.(Commercial heifers shown at Ak-Sar-Ben and the Iowa State Fair must be tattooed.)
7. The Beef show Committee reserves the right to combine Purebred/Registered and Commercial Heifer if numbers warrant.
8. The Supreme Breeding Champion Class will consist of Overall Champion Commercial Heifer, all Breed Champions, and Foundation Cow/Calf Champion competing for the Supreme Breeding Champion. (animals in the Calf Selection are not eligible.)
9. A Champion and Reserve Champion County Drop Breeding Female will be selected from all of the *Commercial and Purebred/Registered Heifers and Foundation Cows* combined. To be eligible, animals must be born in Cherokee County. You must be signed up for County Drop in fairentry.
10. This year we will have a 1st Year exhibitor Showmanship class as well as our Junior Showmanship (5th-8th grade) and Senior Showmanship(9th-12th grade).
11. Guidelines for **Beef, No Fit Show**: Beef shows including Feeder Calf, Purebred/Registered Breeding Heifer, Commercial Breeding Heifer, and Showmanship.
 - * Animals may be clipped, blown and brushed or combed to enhance their appearance.
 - * Beef Animals will be shown free of any adhesive, glue, paint, or powder products.
 - * Any compounds that have adhesive qualities that when applied cannot be combed or brushed through or alter the color of the animal are forbidden. These products include, but are not limited to commonly used adhesives and colorants such as Prime Time, EZ Comb, Tail Adhesive, Ultra White or Black Touch Up, Black Finisher and Black Show Foam.
 - * Alcohol, water, oil, foam or any water—or alcohol based products with no Adhesive or glue qualities, or artificial colorings are permitted. These Products include conditioners and commonly used sprays such as Kleen Sheen, Revive, Final Bloom and White Show Foam.

14. The Dress Code for the show arena: All 4-H exhibitors will present themselves in an image appropriate to 4-H while in the show arena. Example: green or white 4-H shirt with appropriate jeans or slacks (without holes, tears or fraying edges), and hard sole shoes. No hats are to be in the show arena. Exhibitor number must be displayed on the back of the exhibitor. Equine and dairy exhibitors please see special dress requirements under your department. Dress Code Apparel for FFA members will be at the discretion of your Advisor.
15. Any animal that is not under control of the showman shall not be exhibited. The decision shall be made by the superintendent in charge.
16. Any attempt to change color of hair, or to alter the normal appearance of animals can result in disqualification. Exhibitors can use colored grooming aids on hooves only.
17. No drugs or medicines of any kind may be administered except by the order of the official fair veterinarian.
18. No unnatural means of providing an animal feed or water, i.e. stomach, I.V., etc. will be allowed except by the order of the official fair veterinarian.
19. The Fair Board and Cherokee County Extension & Outreach will not be held responsible for damage or injury due to animals exhibited.
20. All livestock will be released on Sunday of the fair at 3:30pm. Removal of 4-H/FFA livestock before the designated dismissal time will result in forfeiture of and Endowment premiums, unless the proper form is completed, approved by fair officials, and filed in the 4-H Fair Office. For more information, please contact the Extension Office.
21. All 4-H and FFA members entered in county livestock shows must notify the Cherokee County Extension Office by 4:30pm on July 15th. The pre-fair livestock entry due date, if they do NOT plan to bring their project to the show.
22. All exhibits must be in place by the time assigned in the fair schedule.
23. The Fairy Board and Extension & Outreach Office is not responsible for damage or loss of exhibits, but will use care to insure their safety.
24. All animals must be properly cared for with water, feed and dry bedding daily, if not properly cared for this may result in immediate disqualification of the animal from the department that the violation occurred and forfeiture of all premiums and awards to 4-Her.
25. **ALL** AK-SAR-BEN animals will be both identified AND entered for the show through AK-SAR-BEN. County staff will not handle any paperwork, payment, or DNA hair sample, families need to go online and submit DNA hair samples and later in the summer, submit show entries on their own.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK, POULTRY, AND BIRDS AT THE CHEROKEE COUNTY FAIR

- * Any evidence of warts, ringworm, foot rot, pink eye, draining abscesses, or any other contagious or infections condition will eliminate the animal from the show.
- * All livestock must be accompanied by a signed Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, available from their local veterinarian, on entry day. Health certificates for 4-H/FFA animals are due to the Extension Office by July 15th. If an exhibitor does not have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for his or her livestock project, they will not be permitted to exhibit that project.
- * Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.

BREEDING BEEF: Cattle originating from a herd, or area, not under quarantine can be exhibited without other testing requirements when accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, showing individual identity. Cattle from a herd, or area, under quarantine for tuberculosis may not be exhibited.

DAIRY: Dairy animals must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, showing individual identification for each animal, and originate from a herd not under quarantine.

DOGS AND CATS: All dogs and cats exhibited must have a current rabies and distemper vaccination certificate. Dogs also need a parvovirus vaccination.

GOATS: All sexually intact goats must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag or an official tattoo registered with USDA (to request free scrapie tags, call 1-866-873-2824).

EQUINE: All equine shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with individual identification or a description of the individual animal. These requirements apply to all equine entering the fairgrounds.

MARKET BEEF: Steers and beef-type heifers exhibited in market classes must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, showing individual identification for each animal, and originate from a herd not under quarantine.

POULTRY AND BIRDS: All poultry exhibited must come from U.S. Pullorum-typhoid clean or equivalent flocks, or have had a negative Pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days of public exhibition and the test must have been performed by an authorized tester. Test will be done at check in. (No Pullorum testing this year.)

RABBIT: All rabbits must be healthy and free of contagious or infectious conditions.

SHEEP: All animals must be individually identified on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and originate from herds or areas not under quarantine. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for sheep will require clinical inspection by an accredited veterinarian within 14 days prior to date of entry to exhibition grounds. All sexually intact sheep must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin Identification tag. (to request free scrapie tags, call 1-866-873-2824). Any evidence of club lamb fungus, ringworm, draining abscesses, foot rot, sore mouth, or any other contagious disease will eliminate the animal from the show.

SWINE: All swine should be vaccinated for erysipelas at least 30 days prior to show. Please consult with your veterinarian. All swine exhibited must be accompanied by a record of a negative pseudorabies test, the test having been performed within 30 days prior to show, for swine originating from a Stage 4 or lower status county. No pseudorabies testing is required for swine originating from a Stage 5 county. (Iowa is Stage 5.)

OTHER SPECIES: Other species must be healthy and free of contagious or infectious conditions and comply with any inspection/health requirements specific to that particular species.

- No blocking chutes allowed in the barns.

The only dogs allowed on the fairgrounds are those entered in competition or guide dogs for the disabled.

THE DECISION OF THE EXTENSION STAFF, EXTENSION COUNCIL, 4-H YOUTH COMMITTEE, AND FAIR VET WILL BE FINAL.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS MAY BE REVISED ONLY BY
OFFICIAL FAIR VETERINARIAN.

4-H BOTTLE/BUCKET CALF CLASS

PURPOSE:

1. Design a cattle project to fit the physical size and maturity level of younger 4-H'ers.
2. Teach proper health care and nutrition requirements of young cattle.
3. Teach basic beef management skills without a large investment.
4. Provide a better understanding of the feeder cattle industry.

GUIDELINES:

1. Washing and brushing is the only preparation needed. There will be no clipping and no dressing applied.
2. Quality of the calf will not enter into the judging. Judging is based on how well the exhibitor handles the calf and how the calf responds to the owner.

EXHIBITOR CRITERIA:

1. Must be enrolled in a 4-H Club.
2. Bucket calves must be ear tagged and identified on 4hOnline by June 15, 2020
3. Calves must be born between March 1, 2019 and June 15, 2020 and be bucket or bottle fed, **no nursing**. Member must care for orphan calf within two weeks of birth.
4. Exhibitor can tag two calves.
5. Calves must be shown on a halter in the ring and broken to lead and tie.
6. Parents will not be allowed in the show ring with an exhibitor
7. Exhibitor must wear a 4-H t-shirt, hard shoes, and jeans or slacks in the ring when showing.

Option to come back for 2nd Year Bucket/Bottle Calves Showmanship.

2nd Year Bucket/Bottle Calves

1. All 4-H'ers who exhibited the previous year in 1st year Bottle/Bucket Calf Class are eligible.

3. The 2nd Year Bucket/Bottle Calves must be identified on 4hOnline by May 15
4. Exhibitors may only show their animal in one class, 2nd Year Bottle/Bucket Calf, Market Beef, or Breeding Beef.

OVERALL SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

The top three senior contestants in beef, the top two senior contestants in equine and swine, and the top senior contestants in dairy, sheep, and goats will be eligible to compete in overall showmanship finals. This is for Cherokee County Residence **ONLY**.

The overall showmanship contest may be canceled due to any infectious disease concern.

The highest ranking received in any species would be the species the exhibitor would be required to show for the showmanship. In the event that the exhibitor tied for ranking in two or more species, the first ranking received would be the species he or she would show. The next place winner in the remaining species would be eligible to compete. Each contestant must exhibit the same animal they showed in the species showmanship contest or one they own. Sheep and goat may bring more than one animal.

Each show person will groom and show his or her own animal, then each contestant will be required to show each of the other species exhibited. This will be done in a round robin rotation system. There will be judges for each species.

Points will be awarded for the grooming and showing of the exhibitor's own animal and for the showing of each of the other species.

The decision of the judges will be final.

The Grand Champion Overall Show person will be ineligible to compete in any future Overall Showmanship Contest at the Cherokee County Fair.

It is the expectation that those who qualify for Overall Showmanship will compete on Sunday in all species. A qualifier who refuses to participate after qualifying will not be eligible to participate in the future.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Adopted by the Association of Iowa Fairs, December 2002.

*** Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.** Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to juniors as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics", fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial, and national levels.

* All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

* The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. **Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues.** The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance from the animal to be used in testing. **Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules.** Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

* If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the

time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

* At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. **Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.**
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions, and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsibly person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

HERDSMANSHIP

Clubs will be rated as a club group in seven animal departments: Cattle, Sheep/Goat, Swine, Dairy, Equine, Rabbit and Poultry. The total fair presentation by 4-H groups should show a spirit of cooperation by each group through all species exhibits. This teamwork within groups/clubs will broaden and enhance the educational scope of 4-H members at the fair.

Each species will be inspected daily between the hours of 7am and 6pm. An average of all species for each club will be calculated daily. If your club doesn't exhibit a species, it will not count against you. Livestock exhibitors are to maintain their exhibit area in a clean and attractive manner. Herdsmanship duties are the responsibility of the 4-H member NOT the leaders or the parents.

Ribbons will be awarded daily!!!

1. Four top showmen, two juniors and two seniors, will be selected for beef, dairy, exotic animals, equine, meat goats, poultry, rabbit, sheep, and swine during the regular showing on the following points:
