WEINAND JOINS COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT UNIT AS LEADERSHIP SPECIALIST

Mary M. Weinand has joined Iowa State University Extension and Outreach's Community and Economic Development team as a leadership and community development specialist. She began the position August 12.

Weinand comes to CED with a background in ISU Extension and Outreach, adult education, financial literacy, entrepreneurship, and diversity and inclusion. Before transitioning to CED, she served as a human sciences extension specialist in family finance for 12 counties in Southeast Iowa.

As a human sciences specialist, she provided leadership, delivery and support for integrated content areas including family resource management, consumer education, family economics, entrepreneurship, decision making, leadership development and public policy. She also has experience in banking, equity research, and workforce and economic development. As part of CED's civic engagement and equity team, she will work in areas of community leadership, equity and processes.

Weinand earned her bachelor's degree in marketing and finance from St. Mary's of Notre Dame, her master's in business administration from De Paul University. and her master's in adult education from Iowa State University. She also holds certifications in ToP online facilitation and remote work, entrepreneurship and nonprofit management.

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SEABERG JOINS COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT UNIT AS INDUSTRY EXTENSION SPECIALIST

Luke Seaberg recently joined Iowa State University Extension and Outreach's Community and Economic Development (CED) program unit as an industry extension specialist.

Seaberg brings a passion for housing, planning, and sustainable economies to the role, where he will support the local housing and government team.

Prior to coming to ISU, Seaberg worked in Madison, Wisconsin, as the program director for Tenant Services at Tenant Resource Center, a housing nonprofit specializing in housing counseling, eviction prevention, and homeless case management services. Among other duties, he led trainings and seminars on subjects related to housing and housing law on topics including the eviction process, fair housing, environmental health, and rental assistance.

"I am excited to bring my experience with and enthusiasm for educational programming aimed at working professionals to CED," said Seaberg.

"It's always great to be in a room with a group of people who are committed to improving their community. Being able to facilitate and participate in those conversations is really special. It's where the change happens," he said.

Seaberg has a master's degree in urban planning and development from Cleveland State University, where he also worked as a research assistant in the university's Center for Economic Development, studying the economic impact of industrial sectors, anchor institutions, and major events such as the 2016 Republican National Convention. In addition to his master's degree, Seaberg also holds a graduate certificate in GIS.



"I've always loved looking at maps, old, current, or even fictional. I appreciate their capacity to convey information and data in a visual and relatable way. People love maps and can connect to them in a way that they often can't to a report or a graph," he said.

"I am excited to be able to work at the intersection of my interests, where I can blend my experiences with GIS into my broader goal of working in the realms of housing and local government," he added.

Seaberg earned two bachelor's degrees in economics and social thought and political economy at the University of Massachusetts Amherst, where he also studied the economics of cooperative enterprise, an area of local development with a rich history in lowa and the rest of the Midwest.

As an industry extension specialist, Seabergw will deliver educational programming in rural housing, planning and zoning, and strategic planning, as well as work with team members to develop new programming and engage with county and municipal officials, as well as community stakeholders, to meet the needs of all lowans in the realm of community and economic development.

HENDERSON JOINS COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT'S LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND HOUSING TEAM

On July 5, Lindsay Henderson returned to her alma mater as a field specialist for Iowa State University Extension and Outreach's Community and Economic Development focusing on local government and housing.

Henderson earned a bachelor's degree in sociology and a master's degree in community development, both at ISU.

"I am excited and honored for this next chapter in my ISU adventure as a Community and Economic Development Extension and Outreach team member," Henderson said.

Previously Henderson served as the community vitality director for her hometown of Webster City, Iowa. She contributed to several significant initiatives for the community, including the city's rebranding and marketing, the Twin Parks Revitalization campaign, a municipal fiber pre-feasibility study, and the formation of a local housing trust fund. Earlier she served as the workforce director for Iowa Central Community College.

Henderson also is a founding member and board president of the nonprofit LIFT-WC, leading the rehabilitation of the historic
