Project Area or Exhibit?

What is the difference between a 4-H project and a 4-H exhibit? Each year, 4-H members enroll in project areas that interest them. They set goals to plan what they will learn in each project area. When they bring things to fair to show what they learned, these are called exhibits. How Can Families Be Involved in 4-H?

As a family, you will learn more about the 4-H program and the opportunities it has for youth and adults throughout the year. Here are some things you can do together:

- Read the 4-H newsletters and project materials with your child.
- Help your 4-Her select projects related to his/ her interests, abilities, and maturity.
- Ask your child to think about what they want to learn and how they want to go about it goal setting.
- Encourage record keeping by helping them find a place to keep this information and reviewing it throughout the year.
- Attend and participate in club meetings and events.
- Participate in county wide workshops.
- Share your ideas and knowledge with your child and his/her club members.
- Provide support and encouragement but let your child do the work!

4-H VOCABULARY

Every organization has a vocabulary that seems familiar only to its members and 4-H is no different. Here are a few of those words:

4hOnline— The online database that you re-enroll, ID animals, and register for statewide activities. This database is lowa.4honline.com. Ask your club leader or Mollie for login information

Conference Judging—This method of judging is used for static exhibits at the county fair. A 4-Her discusses their work with the judge. The judge determines the ribbon placing and the item is put on display during the fair.

Entry Forms—These forms are what the 4-Her completes to enter specific exhibits into competition at the county, district, state and interstate levels. Guthrie County Fair Entry Forms are always due by 4:30 on August 1st.

<u>Exhibits</u>—A 4-H exhibit is an item resulting from project work and the 4-H'er has chosen to bring to fair and have evaluated by a judge. For example: a 4-Her may enroll in the woodworking project area and choose to bring a birdhouse they constructed.

ID Forms— All animals that are part of a 4-H project needs to be properly identified on an ID form. Market animals will ID forms completed at their weigh-in but all others are done on 4hOnline by May 15th.

<u>Projects</u>—A 4-H project is an area of emphasis in which a 4-Her enrolls, studies, learns, and keeps records. The "Pick Your Adventure" paper lists all of the project areas in 4-H from A-Z.

<u>Static Exhibits</u>—This term is used to refer to non-animal exhibits. It includes photography, food & nutrition, child development, woodworking and more!

HOW CAN FAMILIES HELP?

The 4-H program encourages parents, grandparents, guardians, and family members to help the 4-Her with his/her projects. Here are some suggestions:

- Help youth select projects that relate to their interests/hobbies.
- Attend club meetings with your child.
- Give encouragement and supervision, but allow the 4-Hers to do their own work.
- Help youth develop a record keeping system for their project work. This may mean finding a special place for records and 4-H materials in your home and reviewing that information periodically with them
- Read the 4-H Newsletter and help them stay on top of dates, deadlines, rules, etc.
- Be willing to help whenever possible for the club as extra adult hands, hostess, driver, chaperone as the need arises.
- Be positive. Praise them when they succeed & be there to help when they struggle.
- Seek help from Extension Staff, Club Leaders, fellow 4-Hers, as well as people with specific expertise in project areas.
- Have Fun!
