New Iowa Tax Law Benefits Retired Farmers

As the end of the end of the year approaches, lowa taxpayers should be aware of new state laws impacting 2024 tax returns. Beginning in 2023, lowa Code § 422.5(3)(a) exempts all "retirement income" from state taxation for eligible individuals. Recognizing that for many producers, farm assets are the main source of retirement income, lowa law now allows "retired farmers" to choose to exclude **either** farm rental income <u>or</u> eligible capital gain from state taxation. Retired farmer means an individual who is disabled or who is fifty-five years of age or older and who no longer materially participates in a farming business. Federal tax laws still apply.

Retired Farmer Lease Income Exclusion — Under Iowa Code § 422.7, retired farmers may elect to exclude from Iowa taxation:

- the net income received from a written "farm tenancy agreement"
- covering **real property** held by the eligible individual for ten or more years
- if the eligible individual materially participated in a "farming business" for ten or more years.

If a retired farmer makes this election, they will not be eligible for the Beginning Farmer Tax Credit or the Iowa Capital Gain Deduction in future years.

Retired Farmer Capital Gain Exclusion — Beginning in 2023, retired farmers may qualify for the lowa capital gain deduction for the sale of real property used in a farming business if the retired farmer materially participated in a farming business for ten years or more **in the aggregate** before making an election to take the deduction.

The law also allows retired farmers to deduct gain from the sale of breeding, draft, dairy or sport cattle or horses (held for 24 months or more) if the taxpayer:

- materially participated in the farming business for five of the eight years previous years, AND
- Sold all or substantially all of the taxpayer's interest in the farming business when the election is made.

The same rule will apply to the sale of other breeding livestock held for a period of 12 months or more. Retired farmers may make a single lifetime election to exclude all qualifying capital gains under these provisions. However, retired farmers who elect to exclude gain under this provision may not claim the Beginning Farmer Tax Credit or the retired farmer lease income exclusion in future years.

Of course, it is always important to discuss your situation with your own tax professional. Boots in the Barn Offered in Two Locations in February

Boots in the Barn, a 4-part program for women dairy and beef producers, will be offered by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach in February and March in Edgewood and Decorah.

The course will be held Feb. 13, 20, 27, and March 12 in Edgewood and February 15, 22, 29, and March 14 in Decorah. At each location, the dairy session will run from 1-3 p.m. and the beef session will run from 6:30-8:30 p.m. Sessions:

Feb. 13 – Woods Edge Golf Course, and Feb. 15 – ISU Extension and Outreach Winneshiek County office—The topic will be forage and feeding management. Speakers will demonstrate and discuss selection, forage management tools, and best management practices for feeding high quality forage to the lactating dairy cow and the beef cow herd. Participants are encouraged to bring their own forage samples, TMRs for analysis and discussion. Feb. 20 – Edgewood Vet Clinic, and Feb. 22 – Danan Lansing Building, Winneshiek County Fairgrounds — The topic will be understanding calf health with necropsy. Speakers will lead participants through a calf necropsy to discover physiology of the lungs, rumen development and other calf health issues and topics on dairy and beef health care. At the Decorah location, there will be discussion on neonatal calf scours.

Feb. 27 – Woods Edge Golf
Course and Feb. 29 – ISU
Extension and Outreach
Winneshiek County office — The
topic will be troubleshooting dystocia
with a calving simulator. This is a
hands-on session with
"Butterscotch," focusing on
troubleshooting dystocia. For the
dairy session, discussion will be on
colostrum management and for the
beef session, calving distribution.

The final session will be held on March 12 – Woods Edge Golf Course and March 14 – ISU Extension and Outreach Winneshiek County office — The topic will be transitioning the farm and networking with charcuterie. At the Edgewood location speakers will help build confidence and leadership around family transition.

At the Decorah location, speakers will provide resources and ways to initiate dairy and beef farm family discussions. At both locations, participants will also network with fellow dairy and beef women as they learn to build their own charcuterie boards, led by local businesses.

Fall and Winters Habitat To-Do List

First, sometimes what's best for wildlife, is what we don't do! In this case, it's important to leave what remains from this year's growing season out for wildlife to use throughout the winter. Flowers in the garden or landscape, roadsides, old barn lots, hay fields you didn't get that last cutting in, and more can all provide critical food (from seeds and broad-leaved plants) and shelter for wildlife with a few important exceptions.

One of these exceptions is to engage in combat this fall and winter with the <u>woody invasive plants</u> (https://go.iastate.edu/JCOD1A) under your purview. Multiflora rose, autumn olive, European buckthorn, burning bush, and Amur honeysuckle are on my most-wanted list. The best control tactic for woody invasive plants is to <u>cut and treat them (https://go.iastate.edu/F0QEAX)</u> with herbicide, and winter is an ideal time to do so. Fall and winter is also a good time to prune in and around the native trees we want to keep.

Finally, winter is the time mother nature seeds prairie, and that <u>means it's a good time</u> <u>for you to do the same!</u> (https://go.iastate.edu/ONDZGC) Many prairie plants keep their seeds into the late summer, fall, and even winter and then cast them out onto the frozen ground. Humans can mimic that with a practice called frost seeding.

There's dozens more things you could do to do right by wildlife this fall and winter, but hopefully these tips at least get you started.
