Pro Ag Outlook Series To Offer Insight for 2024

Farmers and the ag industry will get an in-depth look into 2024 during this year's Pro Ag Outlook and Management Webinar Series (https://www.aep.iastate.edu/proag/),

November 13-17.

Five webinars will be offered, designed to provide participants with a concise evaluation of

current market conditions, expected trends in crop and livestock income potential, and management implications.

All webinars will run from noon to 1 p.m. Central time, with a live question and answer session following each presentation.

"We are looking forward to the lineup of experts on our webinar series this year," said Ann Johanns, program specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach. "Each speaker brings a unique topic and perspective to the program. Bobby Martens starts our series off focusing specifically on Iowa agribusinesses and issues impacting them going into 2024, and our newest faculty member, Rabail Chandio, will share a detailed analysis of who owns Iowa farmland – and how the state's ownership structure impacts many facets of this industry."

In addition to Martens and Chandio, presentations will include "The interaction of USDA programs and carbon payment," by Alejandro Plastina, extension economist; "Livestock Outlook and profit potential for beef, pork and other lowa industries," by Lee Schulz, extension livestock economist; and "Crop markets for 2024 and beyond," by Chad Hart, extension economist and crop markets specialist.

"This is a great opportunity for agribusiness professionals and producers alike to hear research on issues impacting their businesses across the state in a convenient and timely method," continued Johanns.

Programs will be available for on-demand viewing the day following the live broadcast. Registration is \$20 and includes access to the five live programs (https://www.aep.iastate.edu/proag/#register) and archived recordings. Winter Feeding Workshops Planned for Cattle Feeders

The dry growing conditions of 2022 and 2023 have led to supply and quality issues of hay and other forages in some areas of the state. Cattlemen may be faced with a short supply of hay, corn silage with the potential for nitrates, and poor pastures that resulted in stored hay being fed most of the summer. Unfortunately, tight hay supplies will likely lead to higher prices later in the winter feeding period, according to lowa State University extension beef specialist Denise Schwab.

A workshop on Winter Feeding Basics for Your Cow Herd will be held **November 20**, **beginning 6:30 pm, at Turner Hall in Postville and November 29**, **beginning at 6:30 pm, at NERF Borlaug Center, Nashua.** At each location, beef specialists will discuss the current hay situation, the impacts of the dry conditions on forage quality, potential toxicity concerns, and balancing cow rations in late gestation and early lactation.

Soil Temperatures: Are We There Yet?

Researchers recommend that soil temperatures at the 4-inch depth are 50° F and cooling before applying fall anhydrous ammonia or manure with a high ammonium nitrogen (N) content, such as with liquid swine manure. Looking at the current 4-inch soil temperatures across the state, we did drop below that 50° F mark this weekend.

However, the weather forecast is calling for warmer temperatures this upcoming weekend, which may result in soil temperatures warming back up into the low to mid-50s again before dropping below 50° F again. You can monitor the 3-day history average soil temperatures in every lowa county and forecasted 4-inch soil temperature on the ISU Environmental

Mesonet website (https://mesonet.agron.iastate.edu/agclimate/soilt.php)

Historically, the soil temperatures at the 4-inch depth cool below 50° F in the northern third of the state the first week of November. For central and southern lowa, soil temperatures cool below 50° F during the second week and third weeks of November, respectively.

New Beef x Dairy Resource Available on Iowa Beef Center Website

A new resource for producers feeding on dairy crossbreds is now available thanks to a grant from the Iowa Beef Industry Council. Funded through the Iowa State Beef Checkoff, this research grant awarded to a team at Iowa Beef Center focused on a three-part project that includes the creation of a web resource library on current beef x dairy information. "Most existing resources focus strictly on feeding the straight dairy calf, and mostly straightbred Holsteins," said project leader and Iowa State University Extension and Outreach beef specialist Denise Schwab. "This resource list is specific to the beef on dairy crossbred, and includes everything from simple fact sheets to major research results from all across the country."

Planning for the End-of-Life Costs and Expenses

A common misconception in farm estate and succession planning is that an estate plan is only used after an individual passes away. In fact, a comprehensive estate plan should also provide for possible long-term care needs, dictate health care directives, and designate a trusted individual to oversee desired funeral arrangements. Determining these arrangements in advance can lessen the burden on loved ones after death. Additionally, proper estate planning can help farm families manage other potential costs such as inheritance taxes or estate taxes.

An inheritance tax is a tax on an individual bequest to a beneficiary. Currently, six states impose an inheritance tax. Generally, state laws exempt the deceased's spouse as well as lineal descendants or ascendants from paying an inheritance tax. Iowa is phasing out its inheritance tax which will end on January 1, 2025. There is no federal inheritance tax.

The federal estate tax, on the other hand, is a tax imposed on the value of an estate that exceeds the Unified Estate and Gift Tax Credit. Under

the current federal tax system, the value of assets gifted during life is combined with the value of a taxable estate at death to determine the amount, if any, of gift and estate taxes due. In 2023, the basic exclusion is \$12.92 million per person (\$25.84 million per married couples). Because of this historically high exclusion, very few farm estates (approximately .16%) are subject to gift and estate taxes 1/1.

Example: A single individual dies in 2023 with a taxable estate of \$13.92 million. The estate would only owe taxes on \$1 million (\$13.92 million – \$12.92 million).

In 2026, the Unified Gift and Estate Tax Credit will revert to \$5 million, adjusted for inflation. Because Congress may choose to increase or decrease the exemption beforehand, farmers must stay informed and work closely with their tax advisor and lawyer.
