Certification

Certification Options:

The Community Food Systems certification has 6 different options for certification due to the many components included in the process, and areas of interest from those becoming certified. Below is a list of the different certifications that connect with modules described on page 1. Each certification bullet also shares a brief description and hours for completion.

Full: Modules 1-4, Design Thinking, Economic Impact Analysis, Feasibility, and Mapping 101. This certification is appropriate for individuals interested in offering the entire Community Food Systems process including facilitation, mapping development, report generation, providing general design support, offering feasibility analysis, creating teams for projects, and conducting economic impact analysis. Participants will have 8 months to complete certification and is assessed at 120 hours of time or 4 hours/ week for 32 weeks.

Facilitator: Modules 1-4 This certification is appropriate for individuals interested in offering the facilitation components of Community Food Systems process within Phase 1 and Phase 2. This includes determining mission, vision and core values, assisting in public input sessions and interviews, creating teams for projects, and working with technical assistance providers. Participants will have 5 months to complete certification and is assessed at 80 hours' time or 4 hours/ week for 20 weeks).

Assessor: Modules 1, 3 and Mapping 101 This certification is appropriate for individuals interested in offering the assessor components of Community Food Systems process within Phase 1 and technical assistance related to mapping. This includes assisting in the community food systems assessment, snapshot, and resource manual, as well as developing maps for decision making. Participants will have 4 months to complete certification and is assessed at 60 hours' time or 4 hours/ week for 16 weeks.

Design Thinking: Module 1 and Design Thinking. This certification is appropriate for individuals interested in understanding design thinking methods and an overview of basic design practices for priority projects within Phase 2. Participants will have 1 months to complete certification and is assessed at 10 hours' time.

Economic Impact Analysis: Module 1 and Economic Impact Analysis. This certification is appropriate for individuals interested in developing new skills for conducting an economic impact analysis study for communities for priority projects within Phase 2. Participants will have 6 weeks to complete certification and is assessed at 20 hours' time.

Feasibility Analysis: Module 1 and Feasibility Analysis. This certification is appropriate for individuals interested in understanding various types of feasibility studies and analysis as it relates to food business development. Participants will have 1 months to complete certification and is assessed at 10 hours' time.

Mapping 101: is offered as a separate certification but is included in the Full and Assessor certifications through Community Food Systems. Mapping 101 is appropriate for individuals interested in understanding how to create maps for decision making and building new skills in QGIS for data and map development. Participants will have 2 months to complete certification and is assessed at 30 hours' time.

Cohort Meetings:

While going through the certification for Full, Assessor, Facilitator or Mapping 101 you will have the opportunity to participate in cohort meetings that are scheduled through zoom, this is optional for your certification. Once you register for your certification, you will receive a timeline of cohort meetings that are scheduled through zoom.

Fee Structure:

Because you participated in a certification pilot, you are being offered these modules at no cost. However, to be transparent about the assessed cost for future cohorts, below is the fee structure once the modules move out of pilot stage:

- Full: \$550
- Facilitator: \$300
- Assessor: \$200
- Design Thinking: \$30
- Feasibility: \$30
- Economic Impact Analysis: \$75
- Mapping 101: \$100

Course Access:

Below is the process for accessing the online certification modules.

Payment process through Iowa State University Extension Store:

1. After completing the in-person workshop, you will receive an email from kaleyh@iastate.edu that includes hyperlinks to the ISU Extension Store for each certification. This is where you will purchase modules.
2. Once you click the hyperlink of the certification(s) you wish to complete, the ISU Extension Store site will prompt you to create an ISU Extension Store account.

NOTE: The email address you use to create this account must also be the email address you use when creating your Moodle account.

3. Once your ISU Extension Store account is created you will be able to purchase modules. The ISU Extension Store accepts payment in the form of debit or credit cards and checks. If paying by check or money order, this process may be delayed due to receipt of payment. When payment has been received by the Extension Store's Distribution Center (mailing address is displayed above if this payment method was selected), you will be notified by email that your enrollment status is now active, and your Moodle learning account can be created.

Creating a Moodle learning account:

1. Once Iowa State receives confirmation of payment from the ISU Extension Store, an email will be sent to you from kaleyh@iastate.edu that includes a link to the ISU Moodle platform. This is where you will create your account.

NOTE: When creating your Moodle learning account, you must use the email address that was entered when the course was purchased through the ISU Extension Store as your Moodle learning account email.

2. After creating your account, you will be sent a confirmation email message from the Moodle site. That message requires you to activate your account.
3. Once you have activated your account, please confirm this with Kaley Hohenshell at kaleyh@iastate.edu to register your account to the purchased modules.
4. After your account is registered to the course, you will receive an email from kaleyh@iastate.edu that includes a link that will direct you to the course page.
