General Fair Information

The Grundy County Fair and Agricultural Society, Extension Staff, 4-H Youth Committee, Grundy County FFA Staff and Superintendents shall not be responsible or liable for any accidents that may happen during the fair, nor shall they be responsible for any damage, loss, or stolen property including death or loss of livestock. To avoid possible error and to conform to the rules of the Society, read the rules carefully before making entries.

Protests

Anyone individual or group wishing to protest the fair may meet at the grandstands on Friday, July 19th from 7:00 am – 7:30 am. Protests occurring at any other time during the fair will be asked to leave the grounds.

Complaint Filing Procedure

Anyone who has a complaint must follow procedure! Complaining to your superintendent, Extension staff, FFA Advisor or Fair Board member without following procedure will not achieve any results.

1. Complaints **MUST** be filed in written form and signed by the person with the complaint.
2. Complaints must be filed at the 4-H office on the fairgrounds during the week of fair. Complaints will not be accepted after the fair.
3. Complaints will be reviewed & all joint decisions of the Executive Committee of the Fair Board, CYC & Extension Staff and Youth Committee will be final.

Alcohol Policy

No one is allowed to bring any beer or alcoholic beverage(s) onto the fairgrounds. Absolutely no alcohol in any barns or buildings and anyone caught will be asked to leave the buildings. Exception to the policy will be camp ground sites.

Fair Lost & Found

The Fair Lost & Found can be located at the 4-H Office on the fairgrounds. Items that are not claimed by the last day of fair will be taken to the Extension Office. Items will remain in the Extension Office for a period of two weeks. Unclaimed items will be disposed of.

Grundy County 4-H & FFA Show Premiums

The Grundy County Fair Association has set aside \$7,000 to be distributed among the fair exhibitors. Grundy County Fair Participants are eligible for premium funds. Clover Kids will receive \$1.00 per exhibit. Checks will be issued by the fair association based on the records of ribbon placing kept by superintendents and Extension staff. ALL checks issued by the Agricultural Society (Fair Board) are **VOID** if they are not cashed within **60 days** of the date issued. After 60 days from the date on the check, uncashed checks will become a donation to the Fair Board. If you do not wish to receive a premium check from your fair exhibits please contact the Extension Staff prior to Fair.

Exhibitor: Camping & Overnight Policy

The Grundy County Fair Board allows Exhibitors (Age 17 & under) to stay overnight at the fairgrounds. Fair week camping rules must be followed. For a complete listing of camping rules and an application to reserve a camping spot please go to the Grundy County Fair Website... <http://grundycountyfair.com> and click on the Camping Tab. Spaces fill fast so sign up early!

General Overnight Rules and Regulations for Exhibitors (Age 17 & under) are as follows:

1. All 4-H and FFA members staying overnight must have a chaperone who is at least 21 years of age and is approved by the fair board officers.
2. No chaperone may be responsible for more than 3 exhibitors.
3. All persons staying overnight must camp in the designated camping area. There will be NO sleeping in the barns.
4. All persons must be in bed by midnight. Anyone failing to observe this curfew will be required to leave the fairgrounds.
5. No bicycles, mopeds, motorcycles, 4-Wheelers, Gators, Rangers or golf carts are allowed by campers on the fairgrounds.

Campgrounds: Camping & Overnight Policy

The Grundy County Fair Board allows camping at the fairgrounds. Anyone interested in camping on the fairgrounds must follow the procedure for reserving a camping spot.

The procedure for reserving a camping spot are as follows:

1. Registration request will be taken from January 1, 2019 – July 15, 2019
2. The registration form must be mailed in every year. Campers staying the full week receive priority on camping spots over day campers. We also consider the postmark on registration form. You will need to mail in a registration after January 1, 2019.
3. Because of the Campgrounds popularity, submission of a request for a camping space does not guarantee receiving one.

Pre - Fair

- 👉 County Youth Coordinator (CYC) will contact and confirm your position as Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent.
- 👉 CYC will schedule a face to face or meet with you over the phone to review Fair Classes, Rules & Awards for the area you supervise.
- 👉 Beef, Meat Goat, Sheep & Swine Superintendents must attend pre-fair Weigh In's
- 👉 All Superintendents are asked to attend Clean-up & Set up Day on Sunday, July 14, 2019 to help set up buildings you supervise.

Superintendent Fair Responsibilities

1. Superintendents are REQUIRED to be at Fair.
2. Assure that all the animals are cared for during the week. Any animal health concerns the superintendent should notify the 4-H Fair Office.
3. Prevent as much as possible handling animals.
4. Requests for any needs or repairs should be submitted in writing to the Extension Office. Requests will be forwarded to the appropriate group.
5. All purchasing power for supplies to be vested in are the Decision of the Executive Committee of the Fair Board.
6. It is the Superintendent's job to make sure that no Alterations are made to any facilities without the Permission of the Executive Committee of the Fair Board. Livestock Stalls are assigned. DO NOT make changes to stall assignments or offer additional stalls (youth reserve & pay for stall space) to exhibitors without checking with the CYC.
7. Assign jobs to volunteers. If you do not use them. You will Lose them.
8. Make proper arrangements prior to the event (barns, stalls, Gating, etc; show arena, judging building arrangements, table set up, etc.) you supervise.
9. Arrive 45 min prior to the weigh in / check in & show. This allows your time to pick up box, check on last minute set up needs and check in exhibitors.
10. Post show sheets as soon as possible for families to review. This allows time to make corrections and repost prior to the show.
11. Do NOT remove any show binders from the fairgrounds.
12. Please remember that parents are not allowed to make award decisions or talk to the judge to influence or change award decisions.

Exhibits Release

All Exhibits are released on Sunday, July 21, 2019. Please See Fair Schedule for times.

1. Exhibitor or family must check out with the Superintendent or Extension Staff.
2. Superintendents need to check the buildings 10 min prior to release time.
3. Exhibitors who remove their exhibits prior to release time without proper consent of the Executive Committees will not be allowed to exhibit at the 2020 Grundy County Fair. Tack can be removed at any time.
4. Requests to remove exhibits prior to release must be made by July 1st and on file at the 4-H Extension Office. All early release decisions are made by a committee of 4-H Staff, Youth Committee President, Executive Committee of the Fair Board & Fair Veterinarian. Exhibitor will be notified of the decision. All decisions are final and documented.

Attention: Superintendents, Parents & Exhibitors

IOWA YOUTH CODE OF ETHICS

Youth are expected to be sincere, honest, and act in sportsmanlike ways at all times. Youth represent the entire program and their behavior reflects on their parents, leaders, club, and the entire youth program. All adults involved with the youth program, leaders as well as parents, are expected to set positive examples and serve as positive role models by what they say and do. Any youth who breaks the Code of Ethics or allows another person (adult or peer) to talk them into violating the Code of Ethics agrees to forfeit all prizes, awards, and premiums. The youth may also be prohibited from exhibiting at this and future exhibitions including the Iowa State Fair and other county, state or regional exhibitions.

Youth agree to follow these guidelines:

1. I will do my own work, appropriate for my age and physical and mental development. This includes research and writing of exhibit explanations, preparing exhibits (such as sewing, cooking, refinishing, etc.), care and grooming of animals, etc. Adult assistance should help guide and support me, not do it for me.
2. All exhibits will be a true representation of my work. Any attempt to take credit for other's work, alter the conformation of animals, or alter their performance is prohibited. Copyright violation or allowing others to complete your exhibit is considered misrepresentation and is prohibited.
3. I will treat all people and animals with respect. I will provide appropriate care for animals.
4. I will present exhibits that are safe for consumption. All food exhibits will be safe to exhibit and for judges to evaluate. Other exhibits will be safe for judges to evaluate and for exhibition.
5. All food animals that may be harvested immediately following the show shall be safe for consumers and shall have met all withdrawal times for all medications, and be free of volatile drug residue.
6. If any animal requires medical treatment while at the fair or exhibition, only the Official State Fair Veterinarian may administer the treatment. All medications that are administered shall be done according to the label instructions of the medication used.
7. My animal's appearance or performance shall not be altered by any means, including medications, external applications, and surgical procedures. Any animal that is found to have changed its appearance or its performance shall be disqualified from the show, and have penalties assessed against the exhibitor, parent and/or guardian by the management of the fair or exhibition.
8. I will follow all ownership and possession rules and, if requested will provide the necessary documentation.
9. I will follow all livestock health requirements for this fair or exhibition, according to the state health requirements as printed in the Premium Book of the fair or exhibition. I will provide animal health certificates from a licensed veterinarian upon request from the management of the fair or exhibition.
10. By my entering an animal in this fair or exhibition, I am giving consent to the management of the fair or exhibition to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. If the laboratory report on the analysis of any sample indicates a presence of forbidden drugs, this shall be evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample take from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the exhibitor, parent and/or guardian to prove otherwise.
11. I am responsible for my exhibit and I will not allow others to violate this Code on my behalf. By my entering an exhibit in this fair or exhibition I will accept any disciplinary action taken by management of this fair or exhibition for any violation of this Code of Ethics and any other rules of completion of the fair or exhibition without recourse against the fair or exhibition.
12. I want my exhibit to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer, both good and not so good, and how to live with and learn from the outcome.
13. I will not be involved in any illegal activities while participating in 4-H and FFA events, including but not limited to alcohol, tobacco or drug use.

General Livestock Show Rules & Expectations



Eligibility

1. **ALL 4th -12th Grade 4-H members & K-3rd Grade Clover Kids must attend 4 Club Meetings.** Excused absences will not count. Leaders will turn in a list prior to fair entry deadline.
2. **ALL FFA exhibitors must follow FFA membership requirements.**
3. **Livestock Entries MUST be completed and submitted by July 1st!** Failure to complete or submit fair entries on time will make you ineligible to exhibit at the Grundy County Fair. **Late Entries will be accepted July 3rd with a \$10.00 Late Entry Fee. Entries will not be accepted after July 3rd! NO LATE ENTRIES FOR STATE FAIR! NO EXCEPTIONS!**

Livestock Ownership, Identification & Exhibiting

1. Exhibits must be owned by the 4-H or FFA member unless a lease agreement is filed with the Extension Office by May 15th. Horse Lease agreement is the only accepted lease agreement at the State Fair Level.
2. Animals identified under exhibitor's name **MUST** be entered at fair under the **SAME** exhibitor. Dog & Horses can be co-identified by immediate family members (Siblings / Step – Siblings). Each dog/horse must still be identified in 4honline under each sibling/4-H member and it is either identified as 4-H or FFA, not both. Siblings must both be in 4-H to identify the same dog/horse. The same animal can only be allowed to show in a class **ONCE**. See Horse section for more detailed information.
3. Livestock **MUST** be shown by the Grundy County 4-H or FFA member unless the member has two animals in one class. In this case another current Grundy County member may show the animal. If there are other reasons that the exhibitor cannot show the animal, they **MUST** submit a request in writing to the 4-H and Youth Committee with explanation for why they are unable to show their animal prior to the first day of fair.

Exhibitor Identification & Substitution

1. All livestock Exhibitors will be required to wear a wristband to identify them as a livestock exhibitor. This will help our building supervisors, Fair Board, and Extension Staff easily identify someone who should not be handling the livestock.
2. If you are not able to take your own livestock into the show arena due to an injury or disability you may submit a request for another 4-H'er to show your animal or help you in the arena. 

Eligibility

1. **ALL 4th -12th Grade 4-H members & K-3rd Grade Clover Kids must attend 4 Club Meetings.**
Excused absences will not count. Leaders will turn in a list prior to fair entry deadline.

3. **Livestock Entries MUST be completed and submitted by July 1st!** Failure to complete or submit fair entries on time will make you ineligible to exhibit at the Grundy County Fair. **Late Entries will be accepted July 3rd with a \$10.00 Late Entry Fee. Entries will not be accepted after July 3rd! NO LATE ENTRIES FOR STATE FAIR! NO EXCEPTIONS!**

Livestock Ownership, Identification & Exhibiting

1. Exhibits must be owned by the 4-H or FFA member unless a lease agreement is filed with the Extension Office by May 15th. Horse Lease agreement is the only accepted lease agreement at the State Fair Level.
2. Animals identified under exhibitor's name **MUST** be entered at fair under the SAME exhibitor.
Dog & Horses can be co-identified by immediate family members (Siblings / Step – Siblings). Each dog/horse must still be identified in 4Honline under each sibling/4-H member and it is either identified as 4-H or FFA, not both. Siblings must both be in 4-H to identify the same dog/horse. The same animal can only be allowed to show in a class **ONCE**. See Horse section for more detailed information.
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Exhibitor Identification & Substitution

Market Beef

Beef Show Saturday, July 20th, 2019

1. All entries must have been weighed and tagged at the weigh-in December 8, 2018. Exhibitors may weigh & tag a maximum of 10 head.
2. Entries must be owned by the exhibitor.
3. Each exhibitor is limited to four market beef entries.
4. All market beef animals must be dehorned.
5. Classes will be divided into classes of no more than 10 calves according to fair weights.
6. Minimum fair weights will be 1000 lbs. for steers and 950 lbs. for heifers. A feeder class will be held for calves under minimum weight.
7. Painting, dyeing, and use of color agents on beef animals are not allowed. Exhibitors can use colored grooming aids on hooves only. Beef projects showing evidence of this will not be permitted into the show ring.
8. All market beef animals will be entered in the rate of gain contest. The top ten will be recognized.
9. Beef entered in the carcass contest will be scanned during the fair weigh-in. Scanning fee is \$20.00 per head. Only market animals exhibited in market classes with beginning weights are eligible for carcass class. Grundy County Beef Producers are paying half of the scanning fee. Participants will be responsible for paying the other half of the scanning fee and must be paid before the day of the show in order to participate.
12. Carcass class placing will be determined with scan results and weight gain. Animals will not be slaughtered.
13. Dairy beef animals must be at least 50% dairy breeding to be eligible. Dairy animals will be shown in their own class with the 1st and 2nd place animals eligible to compete for grand champion animal.
14. Market Beef Miniature class is for breeds that do not exceed 1000 lbs. Breeds that should meet the minimum weights as specified in rule #6 will not be allowed to show in this class. Ex. Angus Steer weighing 850 at Fair weigh in will go in the Market Feeder Class.



Dairy Cattle

1. Entries are open to registered or grade dairy cattle. Exhibitors are encouraged but not required to obtain papers on grade animals making them Identified Grade Dairy Animals. Papers may be obtained through dairy breed associations or DHI.
2. Each entry must be the property of the exhibitor. Partnerships between the exhibitor and his/her parents or guardians will be accepted.
3. It is preferred that the registration papers be in the name of the exhibitor. Any name will be accepted as long as evidence can be shown that the exhibitor owns a portion of the animal and the name listed on the registration is a parent or guardian to the exhibitor.
4. Entries born before September 1, 2018 must be dehorned.
5. All dairy exhibitors must dress in white pants, and white dress shirt or county 4-H or FFA shirt.
6. If there is one animal in a class it will not necessarily be declared champion. However, if there is only one animal in a breed class they may compete for overall Supreme Champion even if the animal received a blue ribbon in its class and upon discretion of the judge.
7. **ALL** Dairy Cattle & Goats participating in the Dairy Show must check in on Tuesday, July 16th and stay until Livestock are released on Sunday, July 21st. You are allowed to bring your own portable milker for milking cows as one will not be provided.
8. A supreme dairy champion and a reserve supreme dairy champion will be selected from the Holstein division champions and the other breed champions. **All breed champions and reserve breed champions must be brought to the show ring for the supreme selections.**
9. A junior and reserve junior champion will be selected in each breed and in each Holstein division regardless of the number exhibited. A supreme junior champion and a reserve supreme junior champion will be selected from other breed junior champions. **All junior champions and reserve junior champions must be brought to the show ring for the supreme selections.**

Livestock Ownership, Identification & Exhibiting

2. Animals identified under exhibitor's name **MUST** be entered at fair under the **SAME** exhibitor. Dog & Horses can be co-identified by immediate family members (Siblings / Step – Siblings). Each dog/horse must still be identified in 4Honline under each sibling/4-H member and it is either identified as 4-H or FFA, not both. Siblings must both be in 4-H to identify the same dog/horse. Exhibitor Identification & Substitution

1. All livestock Exhibitors will be required to wear a wristband to identify them as a livestock exhibitor. This will help our building supervisors, Fair Board, and Extension Staff easily identify someone who should not be handling the livestock.
2. If you are not able to take your own livestock into the show arena due to an injury or disability you may submit a request for another 4-H'er to show your animal or help you in the arena. This request must be submitted to the Youth Committee prior to Fair. Decisions of the Youth Committee are final.
3. To participate in Showmanship class the exhibitor must show their own animal. No substitution of livestock allowed. You may not show your sibling's or friend's animal.



2. **Dress Code:**

Western:

Dark blue jeans without holes. A belt is required. Western boots must be worn (Fashion heels are prohibited) A Solid White or Colored, button or snap front long sleeved, collared shirt with 4-H chevron or arm band on the upper left arm or chest, or FFA Jacket, 4-H T-shirt (No club or county council or state fair T-shirts). Shirts must be tucked in, no bling. No chaps allowed. Spurs are permissible but must be dull and the rowels free-moving. In Western Halter & Showmanship classes the exhibitor is expected to wear a cowboy hat. A helmet is required for all riding classes 4-H and FFA youth participating in any and all mounted classes and/or games **MUST** wear an American Society of Testing Materials (ASTM) and Safety Engineering Institute (SEI) approved headgear with chin strap and properly fitted harness **AT ALL TIMES**, while mounted and riding, including warm up. **This includes any adults or kids riding on the fairgrounds.**

Western Equipment: western saddle and appropriate bridle, snaffle bit or bosal for the duration of the class. Bridle may be either a standard plain or silver headstall with browband, shaped ear, “one ear”, or split ear. Stirrups shall not be tied to one another or to the saddle in any manner. Silver equipment will not count over a good working outfit.

English:

Hunt seat type helmet must be worn. Hunt coats of traditional colors such as navy, dark green, gray, black or brown. Maroon and red are improper. Breeches (or Jodhpurs) are to be of traditional shades of buff, khaki, canary, light gray or rust. Shirts of any color with tie or choker are preferred. Hair must be neat and contained (in net or braid). High English boots or paddock (jodhpur) boots of black or brown. FFA Jacket or 4-H Tshirt are not proper for this class. 4-H and FFA youth participating in any and all mounted classes and/or games **MUST** wear an American Society of Testing Materials (ASTM) and Safety Engineering Institute (SEI) approved headgear with chin strap and properly fitted harness **AT ALL TIMES**, while mounted and riding, including warm up. **This includes any adults or kids riding on the fairgrounds.**

Hunt Seat Equipment: an English snaffle (no shank), kimberwick, Pelham, and/or full bridle (with two reins), all with cavesson nosebands and plain leather brow bands, must be used. Saddles must be black and/or brown leather of traditional hunting or forward seat type.

Horse Class Rules (Continued):

3. If there is any doubt whether an animal is a horse or pony the superintendent will decide. Horses are animals over 57" tall (14.1 hands or greater) and ponies 57" and under (less than 14.1 hands).
4. All trailers must park west of arena.
5. Warm up your horses by arena or west of arena.
6. The same horse may be ridden by 2 members of the same family in riding classes that are performed individually only! Ex: barrels, poles, trail
7. **Deadline to make corrections is at the 11:00 am CHECK IN on Wednesday, July 17, 2019 only!**
8. Exhibitor's requiring special needs or adaptations must contact the Extension Office by July 1st, 2019 so that accommodations may be considered.

SHOWMANSHIP *(Grades are as of 2018-2019 school year)*

Showmanship is judged on the exhibitor's ability to present their horse in hand (unmounted). The Exhibitor is judged on their ability to execute a set of maneuvers, using the Quarter Method to control their animal and present their animal in a clean and fit manner.

Participation in this class is HIGHLY recommended by the superintendents.

All 4-H & FFA Exhibitors are Eligible to participate. There is no pre fair entry.

English Riding Classes

English Pleasure is judged on the horse's manners and suitability for English or hunter style work. The horse should move straight, with a steady rhythm and a free flowing stride. The horse should not come behind the bit, or travel too fast. English Equitation is judged on the rider's ability to control their horse, effective use of aids, proper attire, correct form, and cleanliness of the rider and horse all while negotiating a pattern in a style consistent with English pleasure style movement.

Western Riding Classes

Western Pleasure is judged on the horse's manners and suitability for relaxed by collected gait at a relatively slow speed. Judges also look for a calm and responsive disposition. The horse should travel on a loose rein at a constant speed. All classes will exhibit backing.

1. Junior Horse (5 year old & younger) must have a Snaffle Bit, bosal, curb bit, half-breed or spade bit. If Junior Horses are shown in a snaffle or bosal must be ridden two-handed. All other bits must be ridden one handed. When a curb bit is used, a curb strap or chain is required.
2. Senior Horses (6 yrs old and older) may be shown in a curb bit, half-breed bit, or spade. Senior Horses are ridden one handed.

Mandatory obstacles include: opening, passing through and closing gate, ride over 4 poles, backing obstacles and two optional obstacles will be added for a minimum of 5 obstacles.



General Livestock Show Rules & Expectations

Eligibility

1. **ALL 4th -12th Grade 4-H members & K-3rd Grade Clover Kids must attend 4 Club Meetings.** Excused absences will not count. Leaders will turn in a list prior to fair entry deadline.
2. **ALL FFA exhibitors must follow FFA membership requirements.**
3. **Livestock Entries MUST be completed and submitted by July 1st!** Failure to complete or submit fair entries on time will make you ineligible to exhibit at the Grundy County Fair. **Late Entries will be accepted July 3rd with a \$10.00 Late Entry Fee. Entries will not be accepted after July 3rd! NO LATE ENTRIES FOR STATE FAIR! NO EXCEPTIONS!**

Livestock Ownership, Identification & Exhibiting

1. Exhibits must be owned by the 4-H or FFA member unless a lease agreement is filed with the Extension Office by May 15th. Horse Lease agreement is the only accepted lease agreement at the State Fair Level.
2. Animals identified under exhibitor's name **MUST** be entered at fair under the **SAME** exhibitor. Dog & Horses can be co-identified by immediate family members (Siblings / Step – Siblings). Each dog/horse must still be identified in 4honline under each sibling/4-H member and it is either identified as 4-H or FFA, not both. Siblings must both be in 4-H to identify the same dog/horse. The same animal can only be allowed to show in a class **ONCE**. See Horse section for more detailed information.
3. Livestock **MUST** be shown by the Grundy County 4-H or FFA member unless the member has two animals in one class. In this case another current Grundy County member may show the animal. If there are other reasons that the exhibitor cannot show the animal, they **MUST** submit a request in writing to the 4-H and Youth Committee with explanation for why they are unable to show their animal prior to the first day of fair.

Exhibitor Identification & Substitution

1. All livestock Exhibitors will be required to wear a wristband to identify them as a livestock exhibitor. This will help our building supervisors, Fair Board, and Extension Staff easily identify someone who should not be handling the livestock.
2. If you are not able to take your own livestock into the show arena due to an injury or disability you may submit a request for another 4-H'er to show your animal or help you in the arena. This request must be submitted to the Youth Committee prior to Fair. Decisions of the Youth Committee are final.
3. To participate in Showmanship class the exhibitor must show their own animal. No substitution of livestock allowed. You may not show your sibling's or friend's animal.

Exhibitor Show Attire for ALL Species: *(see your species rule section for additional information)*

1. Full length pants.
2. Grundy County 4-H, or FFA T-Shirt, or white shirt with the 4-H Chevron
3. Leather shoes or boots are recommended
4. **Unacceptable Clothing:** shorts, hats, caps, sweat bands, sandals, flip flops, State Fair shirt, County Council shirt, or club shirts etc.

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR MENTOR & HELP POLICY (Applies to County Fair Only!)

The purpose of the mentor program is to open up opportunities for learning. It is NOT intended for the mentor to do all the work for the exhibitor. The Help Policy is in place to clarify who is allowed to assist an individual during fair.

1. **MENTOR:**
 - a. Someone who is not an immediate family member but has been mentoring the 4-H'er in a specific project area during the 2018-2019 4-H year.
 - b. **A mentor form must be done by July 1st.** Form must turned into the Extension Office & include a brief summary of what the 4-H member & mentor are doing during the year in the specific project area. A photo of the mentor & 4-H'er is requested.
 - c. The mentor program **ONLY** applies to Grundy County. See State Fair Grooming Rules for exhibiting Livestock at the Iowa State Fair.
2. **HELP POLICY:**
 - a. Current Grundy County 4-H or FFA Members and Immediate Family Members (mom, dad or siblings, or step siblings), grandparents, aunts and uncles.
 - b. Superintendents & Youth Committee members are available to assist.
 - c. **NO PROFESSIONAL GROOMERS ALLOWED!** Penalty for violating this rule is disqualification!
Note: This, in simple terms, means you are not allowed to hire a professional groomer to come to the fair to groom your animal!

Sportsmanship

1. **ALL PARENTS, MENTORS & EXHIBITORS** are expected to act in a sportsmanship like manner and show respect for the judges, exhibitors, superintendents, Extension Staff, FFA Advisors & Fair Board. Persons not acting accordingly may be asked to leave the show, arena, or fairgrounds.

Removal of Projects

1. All exhibits are released on Sunday, July 21st. Please see the Fair Schedule for Check Out times.
2. All Exhibitors including livestock exhibitors must check out with either the Superintendent or 4-H Extension Staff.
3. Exhibitors who remove their exhibits prior to release time without proper consent of the Executive Committees will not be allowed to exhibit at the 2020 Grundy County Fair.
4. Tack / Supplies are allowed to come & go as needed.

The Herdsmanship Award will go to the top Club or Chapter based on scoring below. This will be judged randomly each day of the fair including show day for each species. Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy, Goats, Rabbits, & Poultry will be judged two times per day of the fair including their show day. Horse will not be judged because of their short time on the grounds but Horse Exhibitors are asked to pick up the area around your trailer after the show.

Meat Goats

1. Market Goat Classes are open to wether or doe kids. (No Bucks)
2. Only Market Meat Goats tagged and weighed at the Sheep & Meat Goat Weigh In on Sunday, May 5th, 2019 are eligible to show in the market classes. You may weigh up to 15 Market/ Meat goats. All Market Meat goats must be ear tagged. All Breeding Meat Goats must be Identified by either a ear tag or tattoo. Yearling are not required to have new tags if they have a previous 4-H ear tag or a tattoo.
3. Market Meat Goats must be Identified in 4honline for 4-H Exhibitors or ID Form must be filled out and on file for FFA Exhibitors at the Extension Office by May 15.
4. Breeding Does have to be identified with either a tag or tattoo and must be identified in 4honline For 4-H Exhibitors or ID Form must be filled out and on file at the for FFA Exhibitors at the Extension Office by May 15.
5. Meat Goats will be weighed in again at fair on Tuesday, July 16 at 9:00 am.
6. Market Meat Goats must weigh a minimum of 50lbs. Classes will be divided by weight. All breeds will show together. Anything under 50lbs will be entered in a feeder class.
7. Market classes will be divided by weight as the superintendent deems necessary. Breeding classes will be divided by birth date as superintendents deem necessary.
8. Exhibitors will be required to have horns disbudded, dehorned or tipped blunt on all market wethers & does before arrival on fairgrounds. Removal of horns on fairgrounds is NOT permitted. Breeding Does can be shown with full horns.
9. Goats must be broke to lead. Exhibitors may use halters, collars, or collars with a short lead when showing. No Choking of animals will be allowed.
10. Scrapie Eradication Program. All reproductively intact goats that are exhibited must be tagged with a Scrapie flock tag in their ear. The animal is tagged by the 4-H'er if born and raised by the 4-H'er, if purchased it is tagged by the seller. If purchased, you should also receive an owner statement from the seller. Registered goats may use officially approved unique tattoo numbers instead of scrapie ear tags provided. They have documentation of participation in the scrapie program from their veterinarian.
11. An exhibitor may show a maximum of 7 meat goats.

Eligibility

3. **Livestock Entries MUST be completed and submitted by July 1st!** Failure to complete or submit fair entries on time will make you ineligible to exhibit at the Grundy County Fair. **Late Entries will be accepted July 3rd with a \$10.00 Late Entry Fee. Entries will not be accepted after July 3rd! NO LATE ENTRIES FOR STATE FAIR! NO EXCEPTIONS!**

Livestock Ownership, Identification & Exhibiting

1. Exhibits must be owned by the 4-H or FFA member unless a lease agreement is filed with the Extension Office by May 15th. Horse Lease agreement is the only accepted lease agreement at the State Fair Level.
2. Animals identified under exhibitor's name **MUST** be entered at fair under the SAME exhibitor. Dog & Horses can be co-identified by immediate family members (Siblings / Step – Siblings). Each dog/horse must still be identified in 4Honline under each sibling/4-H member and it is either identified as 4-H or FFA, not both. Siblings must both be in 4-H to identify the same dog/horse. The same animal can only be allowed to show in a class ONCE. See Horse section for more detailed information.
3. Livestock **MUST** be shown by the Grundy County 4-H or FFA member unless the member has two animals in one class. In this case another current Grundy County member may show the animal. If there are other reasons that the exhibitor cannot show the animal, they **MUST** submit a request in writing to the 4-H and Youth Committee with explanation for why they are unable to show their animal prior to the first day of fair.

Exhibitor Identification & Substitution

1. All livestock Exhibitors will be required to wear a wristband to identify them as a livestock exhibitor. This will help our building supervisors, Fair Board, and Extension Staff easily identify someone who should not be handling the livestock.
2. If you are not able to take your own livestock into the show arena due to an injury or disability you may submit a request for another 4-H'er to show your animal or help you in the arena. This request must be submitted to the Youth Committee prior to Fair. Decisions of the Youth Committee are final.
3. To participate in Showmanship class the exhibitor must show their own animal. No substitution of livestock allowed. You may not show your sibling's or friend's animal.

Exhibitor Show Attire for ALL Species: *(see your species rule section for additional information)*

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR MENTOR & HELP POLICY (Applies to County Fair Only!)

1. **MENTOR:**

Sportsmanship

1. **ALL PARENTS, MENTORS & EXHIBITORS** are expected to act in a sportsmanship like manner and show respect for the judges, exhibitors, superintendents, Extension Staff, FFA Advisors & Fair Board. Persons not acting accordingly may be asked to leave the show, arena, or fairgrounds.

Removal of Projects

1. All exhibits are released on Sunday, July 21st. Please see the Fair Schedule for Check Out times.
2. All Exhibitors including livestock exhibitors must check out with either the Superintendent or 4-H Extension Staff.

General Livestock Show Rules & Expectations

Eligibility

1. **ALL 4th -12th Grade 4-H members & K-3rd Grade Clover Kids must attend 4 Club Meetings.** Excused absences will not count. Leaders will turn in a list prior to fair entry deadline.
2. **ALL FFA exhibitors must follow FFA membership requirements.**
3. **Livestock Entries MUST be completed and submitted by July 1st!** Failure to complete or submit fair entries on time will make you ineligible to exhibit at the Grundy County Fair. **Late Entries will be accepted July 3rd with a \$10.00 Late Entry Fee. Entries will not be accepted after July 3rd! NO LATE ENTRIES FOR STATE FAIR! NO EXCEPTIONS!**

Livestock Ownership, Identification & Exhibiting

1. Exhibits must be owned by the 4-H or FFA member unless a lease agreement is filed with the Extension Office by May 15th. Horse Lease agreement is the only accepted lease agreement at the State Fair Level.
2. Animals identified under exhibitor's name **MUST** be entered at fair under the **SAME** exhibitor. Dog & Horses can be co-identified by immediate family members (Siblings / Step – Siblings). Each dog/horse must still be identified in 4honline under each sibling/4-H member and it is either identified as 4-H or FFA, not both. Siblings must both be in 4-H to identify the same dog/horse. The same animal can only be allowed to show in a class **ONCE**. See Horse section for more detailed information.
3. Livestock **MUST** be shown by the Grundy County 4-H or FFA member unless the member has two animals in one class. In this case another current Grundy County member may show the animal. If there are other reasons that the exhibitor cannot show the animal, they **MUST** submit a request in writing to the 4-H and Youth Committee with explanation for why they are unable to show their animal prior to the first day of fair.

Exhibitor Identification & Substitution

1. All livestock Exhibitors will be required to wear a wristband to identify them as a livestock exhibitor. This will help our building supervisors, Fair Board, and Extension Staff easily identify someone who should not be handling the livestock.
2. If you are not able to take your own livestock into the show arena due to an injury or disability you may submit a request for another 4-H'er to show your animal or help you in the arena. This request must be submitted to the Youth Committee prior to Fair. Decisions of the Youth Committee are final.
3. To participate in Showmanship class the exhibitor must show their own animal. No substitution of livestock allowed. You may not show your sibling's or friend's animal.

Exhibitor Show Attire for ALL Species: *(see your species rule section for additional information)*

1. Full length pants.
2. Grundy County 4-H, or FFA T-Shirt, or white shirt with the 4-H Chevron
3. Leather shoes or boots are recommended
4. **Unacceptable Clothing:** shorts, hats, caps, sweat bands, sandals, flip flops, State Fair shirt, County Council shirt, or club shirts etc.

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR MENTOR & HELP POLICY (Applies to County Fair Only!)

The purpose of the mentor program is to open up opportunities for learning. It is NOT intended for the mentor to do all the work for the exhibitor. The Help Policy is in place to clarify who is allowed to assist an individual during fair.

SHEEP RULES

1. Sheep must be in the Exhibitors possession by May 1, 2019. Livestock ID's must be filed on 4honline by May 15, 2019.
2. You may weigh-in up to 15 lambs.
3. To be eligible for exhibit the following must have been completed at the county wide weigh-in May 5th.
 - a. Ear tagging of all Breeding and Market lambs. Yearlings are not required to have new tags if they have a previous year's 4-H ear tag.
 - b. Weighing of all market lambs.
 - c. Ewe lambs to be entered into the Breeding Show MUST have breeding information completed on the Sheep ID form during the May 5th weigh-in. Lambs without this form completed may only be exhibited in the Market Sheep Show. Yearling ewe lambs must be included on this form.
 - d. All yearling ewes without a 4-H ear tag must be present at the May 5th weigh-in for identification, but are not required to be weighed.
4. Market lambs may be of either sex. Male lambs must be castrated prior to the May 5th County Weigh-In.
5. Scrapie Eradication Program. All ewe lambs and yearlings (reproductively intact animals) exhibited at the Grundy County Fair and the Iowa State Fair, must have a Scrapie Flock Ear Tag. If you or your family have your own flock or lambs, be sure they have been tagged by their owners before they leave the farm. Any ewe or yearling brought to the county fair without this ear tag, will not be eligible to show. Lambs will be checked before they are unloaded and ineligible lambs will not be allowed to unload. These tags MUST be in place for the May 5th weigh-in.
6. Wethers do not have to be ear tagged with Scrapie program tags.
7. Market lambs must be rough sheared (no more than 1-inch of wool remaining) within 10 days prior to the first day of fair. NO rough shearing will be allowed at fair. However, final clipping or trimming may be done at fair prior to the show.
8. Breeding sheep may not be exhibited in a Market Class.
9. Classes will be divided by the superintendent according to fair weights.
10. Exhibitor and / or family member must be present to help check-in at the fair.
11. An exhibitor can enter a maximum of 7 carcass lambs in the market class of which all seven can be entered in the carcass class. Lambs entered in the carcass contest will be scanned during the fair weigh-in. Entry cost is \$10.00 per Lamb. Scanning fee MUST be paid at weigh in. Carcass class placing will be determined with scan results and weight gain. Animals will not be slaughtered.
12. No animals can be exhibited with horns.

2. Purebred ewes must be registered. Registration papers will be checked at check in. Purebred's without registration papers will shown in the commercial ewe classes.



SHOWMANSHIP- SWINE *(Grades are as of 2018-2019 School Year)*

All 4-H and FFA exhibitors are eligible to participate. There is no entry before fair.

1. An individual may only win once as a Junior and once as an Intermediate in each of the livestock species. Once they have won showmanship in their grade level, they must advance to the next division the following year. An individual can win Senior Showmanship more than once.
2. You must show your own animal. There is NO substitution of livestock allowed.
3. First and Second Place Ribbons will be given in each class.

Showmanship will be judged on the following criteria:

- ✓ Appearance of the Animal - Condition, Cleanliness, Grooming , Clipping
- ✓ Presentation of the Animal - Leading, Response to direction of ring master, posing, use of equipment, showing to the animals best advantage
- ✓ Appearance of the Exhibitor - Proper clothing and shoes, alertness, attitude
- ✓ Knowledge of the Exhibitor

Market Swine

1. All pigs will be tagged and identified by May 1st. 4-H'ers enrolled in Swine project area on 4honline were mailed information about the identification process. Exhibitors may tag a maximum of 15 pigs total (Market & Breeding)
2. State Fair Pigs must be tagged. Cost is \$8.00 per head. All State Fair pigs (market & breeding) must have a special DNA punch tag.
3. All pigs MUST be ear notched using the Universal Ear Notching Method.
4. Maximum beginning weight will be 60 lbs. Pigs weighing more than 60 lbs can be identified for market class ONLY.
5. Exhibitors may show a maximum of 8 pigs at fair total (Market & Breeding)
6. Market & Breeding Hogs must be identified at the Fair Weigh In/ Check In
7. Market pigs must weigh at least 210 lbs and can be no larger than the maximum weight of 295 on entry day.
8. Classes will be split by the swine committee. Market classes by ending weight.
9. Derby (carcass) Contest placing will be determined by the National Pork Producers Council's Pork Value Index.
10. There shall be no coloring agents, powder or oil used on hogs. No clipping of hogs on the fairgrounds. Hogs or Exhibitors in violation will not be allowed to show.
11. Hogs entered in the carcass contest will be scanned ruing the fair weigh-in. Entry cost is \$10.00 per hog that is scanned. Scanning costs must be paid prior to show or Exhibitor will not be allowed to show. Carcass class placing will be determined with scan results and weight gain.

3. Exhibitors may tag a maximum of 15 pigs total (Market & Breeding)



Clover Kid General Rules

All Exhibitors must follow the 4-H General Rules

1. Enrolled Clover Kids. It is recommended that they attend at least 4 regular club meetings.
2. All exhibitors must complete & submit fair entries on time.
3. All exhibitors are required to wear a wristband to identify them as a livestock exhibitor. This will help our building supervisors, Fair Board, and Extension Staff easily identify someone who should not be handling the livestock. Wristbands will be handed out at each fair check in.
4. **One Exhibitor per Exhibit!**
5. Only one animal per youth unless otherwise stated in rules. Should a youth's animal die or be sent home from fair by the vet the youth may still participate in the event by walking in arena to share the story about their project. This ONLY applies if the animal was entered by July 1st entry deadline.
6. **Show Attire**
 - a. 4-H Clover Kids: 4-H t-shirt, Pants & Tennis shoes or boots
 - b. Clover Kids: Nice shirt or t-shirt, Pants & Tennis shoes or boots
7. Clover Kids may only have help from superintendents, other 4-H or FFA members, adult family members or mentors. The purpose is for the exhibitor to learn from those who are assisting them and not for that assistant to do all the work for the exhibitor.
8. **Only youth who have completed Kindergarten and older are permitted to handle livestock projects at fair for safety purposes.**
9. **Clover Kid Exhibit opportunity is NOT competitive. It is meant to be a learning experience to prepare the kids for entering 4-H & FFA in the future.**
10. All **EXHIBITORS, PARENTS & MENTORS** are expected to act in a sportsmanship like manner and show respect for the judges, exhibitors and superintendents. Persons not acting accordingly may be asked to leave the show, arena, or fairgrounds.
11. All participants will receive the same recognition in the species they exhibit. Recognition may vary by Species.
12. **All exhibits & tack are released on Sunday, July 21st. Please see the Fair Schedule for check out times. Exhibitors who remove their exhibits prior to release time without proper consent of the Executive Committees will NOT be allowed to exhibit at the 2020 Grundy County Fair.**
13. Request to remove exhibits prior to release must be made by July 1st and on file at the 4-H Extension Office. Requests will be reviewed by the CYC, an Executive Committee member of the Fair Board & 4-H Youth Committee. Exhibitor will be notified of decision. All decisions are final.
14. Sale of any animals on the fairgrounds during the week of fair is NOT allowed. Animals sold or released prior to fair are NOT released early to anyone.
15. **No extra animals are allowed on the grounds.**
16. Anyone who has a complaint MUST follow the complaint filing procedure on page 9 of the Fair Book.

3. Exhibitor may identify up to 2 animals, but can only exhibit 1 calf.
4. Calf must be bucket or bottle fed (no nursing).
5. Calves will be shown on halter.
6. Each exhibitor will be given an opportunity to walk their bucket calf in the arena. Exhibitor is allowed to have one adult or 4-H mentor walk with them in the arena.
7. Confirmation and quality of the calf is NOT to be considered.
8. Exhibitor will be interviewed in the arena about their bucket calf. Questions may include things like the bucket calf's name, what you do to take care of the calf, what you like about the project and more.
9. Each Exhibitor will be given a poster to complete and turn in at check in. Posters will be hung in the Bucket Calf Barn. Posters can include a story about what the exhibitor has learned about caring for the calf, how to groom and keep the animal clean, knowledge of general health, condition and management and pictures.
10. 3rd & 4th Year Exhibitors will experience a mini show and show sticks and combs are optional. This is for educational purposes only. There will be no placing of animals all exhibitors will be given participation ribbons.

Static General Rules:

1. **ALL** 4-H Exhibitors **MUST** attend at least **FOUR** local club meetings to be eligible to participate at Fair. Excused absences will not count.
2. **Static Judging is scheduled for Monday, July 15th from 11:00 am – 4:00 pm.** Entries are checked in at the Non-Livestock Judging Entry Table. Please check in no later than 3:30pm. **ENTRY TAGS WILL BE AT CHECK IN TABLE** Watch for instructions on attaching entry tags to your project at fair.
3. **Static Entry Released on Sunday, July 21st at 7:00 am – 9:00 am. This includes ALL Clover Kid Exhibits!**
 - a. All Static (non-livestock) exhibits must be picked up by 9:00 am.
 - b. Exhibits that are sold prior to fair are **NOT** allowed to leave early.
 - c. **Non-Livestock Exhibits may only be removed from the display by the exhibitor and his/her immediate family.** If an exhibitor or their immediate family is unable to remove their exhibits, the exhibitor is responsible to appoint a pickup person and let the Extension office know who this appointed person is by Wednesday, July 17th. Exhibits will not be released to an undesignated person.
 - d. All Non-Livestock Exhibitors **MUST sign a release form** when checking out all exhibits before removing the items from the exhibit building.
 - e. Exhibits removed without permission or prior to release time will forfeit premium.
4. **Exhibitor Substitution**
 - a. **Non-Livestock**

In case of illness or conflict that a 4-H or FFA member is unable to be present for conference judging of non-livestock exhibits, the exhibits may be brought to the fair by another person on entry day. Exhibits will be judged as there is time and written comments will be provided to the exhibitor.
 - b. **Communications**

If the exhibitor is unable to be present for any reason they will not be eligible to participate.
 - c. **Fashion Show**

If an exhibitor is unable to be present for Fashion Show Judging Day the exhibitor may submit a video and Fashion report but are not eligible for State Fair.
5. **Exhibit Rules:**
 - a. All Static Exhibits must include a Fair Exhibit Form. The form can be included as the form itself, in a binder, or by electronic media. Check for additional requirements in food & nutrition, photography, and visual art classes. A written explanation, audio recording or video recording is to be included as part of the exhibit. The exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit:
 1. What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?)
 2. What steps did you take to learn or do this?
 3. What were the most important things you learned?

- b. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H'ers participation in 4-H projects or programs during the current 4-H year. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project or program.
- c. Exhibitors in 4-H classes are not eligible to exhibit a similar department of the FFA divisions or vice versa.
- d. Exhibits previously entered in an FFA Ag Science Fair or any other FFA event or competition may not be entered in any 4-H exhibit classes.
- e. Exhibits that do not comply with the class description size guidelines, copyright restrictions, safety and approved methods will be judged at County Fair but will not be eligible to advance to State Fair and not put on public display.
- f. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - 1. Posters must not exceed 24" x 36" in size.
 - 2. Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48" x 48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (unfolded) dimensions.
 - 3. Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" in height or width and 12" in depth.
- g. Endangered and threatened plants and animals (includes insects), or songbird feathers and nests may NOT be used in any exhibits.
- h. **Copyrighted materials** and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits. (See also special rules for visual arts and general copyright information for 4-H'ers.)
- i. The 4-H'ers' goal and applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance, and design. Refer to exhibit class evaluation rubrics for detailed criteria in each class. Rubrics are located on each 4-H project page at <http://www.extension.iastate.edu/home/4h-youth>.
- j. Due to security, 4-H'ers are discouraged from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as the exhibit or part of an exhibit. The Iowa State Fair and Iowa State University Extension will use diligence to insure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement. However, they will not be responsible for damage or loss by accident, fire, theft, etc.
- k. Each item in an exhibit must be securely labeled, including the name of the county, class number, and exhibitor's name.

- l. All judges' decisions are final.
- m. Exhibitors who are selected for State Fair will receive a packet with an intent to participate form that needs to be completed and returned by the end of the week of country fair to the Extension Office. The packet will also include a class
- n. description for the exhibit and deadline for the exhibit to be turned in to the Extension Office for transportation to the Iowa State Fair.
- o. Large items selected to represent the County at State Fair is the Exhibitor's responsibility for transporting to and from State Fair.
- p. Exhibits going to the State Fair need to be packaged for travel. The Grundy County Extension Office assumes no liability for articles damaged in transportation to or from the Iowa State Fair.
- q. All Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the Iowa State Fair General Exhibit Rules for the exhibit to be eligible for Iowa State Fair.

DESIGN *Exploring the Elements and Principles*

Elements of Design


A design is a visual plan you can use to create your 4-H project. Everything you can see has a design. When you describe something you see, you use words that tell about the lines, shapes, colors, textures, and spaces. Line, shape, color, texture, and space are the basic elements of design.

Texture

Texture is the surface quality of an item; it's how something feels when touched or looks like it would feel if touched.

Sandpaper is rough. Velvet is smooth. A drawing of a tree stump could show rough outer bark and a smooth inner surface. Search for ways to add texture to your projects.

Texture adds variety and interest.



Line


Lines can be horizontal, vertical, dotted, zig-zag, curved, straight, diagonal, bold, or fine. Lines can show direction, lead the eye, outline an object, divide a space, and communicate a feeling or emotion.



Shape

Shapes are made by connecting lines. Circle, square, triangle, and free-form are words used to identify shapes.

Look at the objects around you and describe their basic shapes. Are they one shape, or are they a combination of many shapes? After doing this several times, you will begin to understand what a shape really is. Line creates two dimensional or flat shapes. When shapes are three dimensional, we call them forms. A circle is a shape; a ball is a form. A square is a shape; a cube is a form. A drawing is a flat shape; a sculpture is a three-dimensional form.



Color

Color is described with the words hue, value, and intensity. Hue refers to the name of the color—red or blue, for example. Value tells the lightness or darkness of a hue. Intensity refers to the brightness or dullness of a hue. You can use a color wheel and learn how colors work together.

Space

Space refers to the area that a shape or form occupies. It also refers to the background against which we see the shape or form. Space can be defined as positive and negative. The positive space of a design is the filled space in the design—often it is the shapes that make up the design. Negative space is the background. The negative space in design is as important as the positive area.



Principles of Design

Some combinations of design elements (line, shape, color, texture, and space) work better than others. Here are some guidelines to help you understand why. These guidelines—rhythm, proportion, emphasis, balance, and unity—are the principles of design.

Rhythm

You have felt rhythm in music. Rhythm also allows the eye to move from one part of a design to another part. Rhythm can be created by:

- Repeating a color, shape, texture, line, or space.
- Varying the size of objects, shapes, or lines in sequence.
- Using a progression of colors from tints to shades.
- Shifting from one hue to a neighboring hue (yellow to yellow-orange).



Unity

When things look right together, you have created unity or harmony. Lines and shapes that repeat each other show unity (curved lines with curved shapes). Colors that have a common hue are harmonious. Textures that have a similar feel add to unity. But too much uniformity sometimes can be boring. At the same time, too much variety destroys unity.

Proportion


Proportion refers to the relationship between one part of a design and another part or to the whole design. It is a comparison of sizes, shapes, and quantities. For example, the relationship between the vertical and horizontal measurements of a wall hanging may be pleasing because the unequal lengths produce an interesting contrast.



Emphasis

Every design needs an accent—a point of interest. Emphasis is the quality that draws your attention to a certain part of a design first. There are several ways to create emphasis:

- Use a contrasting color.
- Use a different or unusual line.
- Make a shape very large or very small.
- Use a different shape.
- Use plain background space.



Balance

Balance gives a feeling of stability. There are three types of balance. **Symmetrical**, or formal balance, is the simplest kind. An item that is symmetrically balanced is the same on both sides. Our bodies are an example of formal balance. If you draw an imaginary line from your head to your toes dividing your body in half, you will be pretty much the same on both sides. Designs that have a **radial**



balance have a center point. A tire, pizza, and a daisy flower are all examples of design with radial balance. **Asymmetrical balance** creates a feeling of equal weight on both sides, even though the sides do not look the same. Asymmetrical designs also are called informal designs because they suggest movement and spontaneity. Asymmetrical balance is the hardest type of balance to achieve and often takes experimenting to achieve.

Static (Non-Livestock) Classes

Animals

10110 Animal Science

An exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows the learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse & pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep, and swine. Ownership of any animal is not required.

10120 Veterinary Science

An exhibit that shows learning about keeping animals healthy.

Agriculture and Natural Resources

10210 Crop Production

An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of field crops.

10220 Environment and Sustainability

An exhibit that shows the connections between humans and their environment including energy, stewardship, conservation, entomology, fish and wildlife, or forestry. Includes collections.

10230 Horticulture & Plant Science

An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, soils, small fruit production, vegetable and flower gardens, plant nutrition, careers, etc. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in classes in the 4-H Horticulture department under 4-H Livestock) small fruits, vegetable and flower gardens. To exhibit vegetable specimens at the Iowa State Fair please make your own entries at the Extension Office no later than July 1, 2019. **To exhibit vegetable specimens (project), refer to Harvesting & Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit (4H0462)**

10235 Home Grounds Improvement

An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc.

10240 Outdoor Adventures

An exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoeing, fishing, hiking or other outdoor activities.

10250 Safety and Education in Shooting Sports

An exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms; archery equipment allowed if tips are removed from arrow.)

10260 Other Agriculture and Natural Resource

An exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above.

Creative Arts

10310 Music

An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangements, instruments, musical styles or history.

10320 Photography (*Limit of 5 exhibits*)

An exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only, not video.

Photography Special Rules:

1. Photographs may be either black and white or color. They may be processed from negatives, slides or digital cameras and computer manipulation programs. Photographs must have been taken since the previous county fair.
2. Photographs should be a **minimum of 4" x 6"**. Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs should not exceed 11" x 14". Exception: Panaramic photos must not exceed 24" in length.
3. All photographs must be printed on photographic paper.
4. Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally. 4-H'ers are responsible for design decisions such as border, color, and size. **Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.**
5. Non-mounted photos may be exhibited in a clear plastic covering.
6. A series is a group of photographs or slides [3 to 5] that are related or tell a step-by-step story. Photographs must be mounted together in story order or sequence. Finished size of individual photographs in a series should not exceed 6" x 8".
7. Digitally altered photos should include a copy of the photo before changes.
8. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
9. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
10. Use the 4-H Photography Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits. **You do not need to include a Grundy County Fair Goal Sheet.**
11. Exhibitors entered in 4-H photography are not eligible to exhibit in FFA photography show & vice versa.

PHOTOGRAPHY CONTINUED

10325 Digital Photography

A photo or series of photos submitted electronically, not printed. Photos in this class will be submitted, viewed, evaluated and displayed electronically.

Digital Photography Exhibit Special Rules:

1. Photographs may be either black and white or color.
2. Photographs will not be printed
3. Entries may be a single photo or a series of photos. A series is a group of photographs (3-5) that are related or tell a step-by-step story. Series photo entries must have all photos in the series viewable at the same time.
4. Photos entered should be submitted in the highest resolution possible. A finished file size of 1 MB – 3 MB is recommended.
5. Photos entered should be submitted in an acceptable and commonly used format for ease of viewing.
6. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
7. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
8. A Photo Exhibit Label must be used to provide required information for photo exhibits and can be submitted electronically with the photo entry.
9. Photos entered in this class will be evaluated on the same evaluation criteria used for printed photographs.
10. Exhibitors entered in 4-H photography are not eligible to exhibit in FFA photography show & vice versa

10340 Alternative / Creative Photography

A single photograph or photographic image that has been created with an alternative photographic process, or a photograph that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple overlapped photographs.

Alternative /Creative Photography Special Rules:

1. Photograph/Images must be mounted on foam core no smaller than 4”x4” and no larger than 10”x10” in height and width. No matting and no framing is allowed, put your creativity into the photography!
2. Photograph / Image can be created from film negative, digital negative, or digitally manipulated in computer.
3. Photograph must be on photo paper, canvas, or other flat material.
4. Exhibit must have Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits. Include information about the processes used.
5. Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting, photographs depicting unsafe practices or or illegal activities will not be displayed.

10345 Photography Idea / Educational Display

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class. This class includes photos printed on canvas, fabric, ceramic, etc. as part of an educational display showing learning about printing techniques, display, merchandising, etc.

10350 Visual Art

An exhibit that shows learning through original art, exploration of an art technique, or study of any other visual arts topic.

Visual Arts Special Rules:

1. Exhibits made from kits or preformed models will not be accepted. Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, whiteware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.
2. If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source or inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included.
3. Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist, or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.
4. Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H'er is prohibited without the written permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibit is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner. For additional information, see 4-H Exhibit Copyright Information at <http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/projects/visualart.htm>

10306 Visual Art (*Grundy County Only! Please try to use class 10350 if at all possible*)

An exhibit made or adapted from a pattern or a kit. Articles made from kits or patterns are acceptable for members who are learning a skill or technique. An adapted design using any copyright logos, designs or trademark material must have proof of written permission with support material or exhibit.

Examples:

Paper (collages, quilling, paper mobiles, origami, etc.)

Fiber (macrame, weaving, braiding, latch hook, crewel, cross stitch, knitting, crocheting, etc.)

Clay (ceramics, china painting, bisque ware, pinch pots)

Leather (collages, tooled items, leather lacing, etc.)

Textiles (block printing, batik, silk screening, soft sculpture, etc.)

Wood (carving, wood burning, sculpture, etc.)

Glass and Plastic (glass mobiles, etching, plastic castings, etc.)

Metal (metal tooling, wire sculpture, jewelry, assembly)

Chalk, Carbon, Pigment (linoleum block printing, water color, drawing, chalk rubbings, etc.)

Nature Materials (pine cone wreaths, dried flower arrangements, corn husk dolls, pysanki, etc.)

Jewelry (necklace, earrings, bracelet, etc.)

Hobby/Craft (scrapbooking, calligraphy, model building, etc.)

Combined Media (a project using 2 or more of the above classes)

Family & Consumer Sciences

10410 Child Development

An exhibit that shows learning about children. Examples: child care, growth and development, safety and health, children with special needs, and careers in child development.

10420 Clothing and Fashion: Constructed / Sewn Garments & Accessories

A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans. **Outfits or accessories worn during Fashion Show may not be entered in this class.**

10422 Clothing and Fashion: Purchased Garments & Accessories

Purchased garments or accessories that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans. **Outfits or accessories worn during Fashion Show may not be entered in this class.**

10424 Clothing and Fashion: Other Ideas / Educational Exhibits

Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including but not limited to design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc. **Outfits or accessories worn during Fashion Show may not be entered in this class.**

10430 Consumer Management

An exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, and consumer rights and responsibilities.

10440 Food & Nutrition: Prepared and Preserved Product

An exhibit of a prepared or preserved food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating, and choosing healthy foods, safety practices, or food preservation through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 “Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide” at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434> for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products.

10445 Food & Nutrition: Educational Display

An educational exhibit (poster, report, display) that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating, and choosing healthy foods, safety practices, or food preservation. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 “Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide” at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434> for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products.

Rules for this class continued...

Food & Nutrition Special Rules (Class 10445):

1. Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
2. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
3. Food product exhibits must be prepared, bake or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.
4. Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
5. Meat jerky products are prohibited.
6. The recipe must be included for any prepared food exhibit; credit the source of the recipe.
7. Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label. Only food process after August 1, 2018 are acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used.
8. Preserved food exhibits **must include two** product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.
9. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a re-closeable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the bag. (7 cookies per plate)
10. The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

10450 Health

An exhibit that shows learning through food choices, safe activities and skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and healthy lifestyle choices.

10460 Home Improvement

An exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving, and caring for your home living space, including extended personal living areas immediately adjacent to the home. Exhibits may include new or refinished/reclaimed/restored items.

10470 Sewing and Needle Arts: Constructed Item

A constructed item (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and skill in sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcases, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, or other items. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans.

10472 Sewing and Needle Arts: Other Ideas / Educational Exhibits

Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about sewing and needle arts including but not limited to construction techniques, use and care of fabrics and fibers, design illustrations, decorative processes, careers.

10480 Other Family and Consumer Science

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about a family and consumer science topic that does not fit any previous Family & Consumer Science class listed.

Personal Development

10510 Citizenship and Civic Engagement

An exhibit that shows learning about or contributing to your community, your country or your world.

10520 Communication

An exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, and visual communication skills in their many forms.

10530 4-H Poster Communication

Special poster exhibit to visually tell a story or idea about 4-H to the general public.

Exhibitors must use one of the following themes:

- ✓ 4-H is... (open to 4-H'ers interpretation)
- ✓ Join 4-H
- ✓ 4-H Grows (4-H.org. national marketing theme)
- ✓ A Universe of Possibilities (2019 Iowa 4-H Youth Conference Theme)
- ✓ Nothing Compares to 4-H Favorites (variation of Iowa State Fair Theme)

Poster Communication Special Rules:

1. Only one poster per 4-H'er may be entered
2. All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board, or foam core board-size minimum of 14" x 20" or maximum of 15" x 22".
3. Posters may be vertical or horizontal. Posters may be in any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage.
4. Posters **cannot** be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may **not** extend more than 1/8 inch above the poster or foam core board.
5. Poster **must** have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to back.
6. Posters **cannot** use copyright material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
7. 4-H'ers can include the clover. The 4-H Clover is a protected emblem. Do not copy/print other material over the clover. For questions about using the clover please contact the Extension Office.
8. Entries will be selected for State Fair depending on the allotment given to the county.

10540 Digital Storytelling

Any exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing technique using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.

10550 Leadership

An exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.

10560 Self-Determined

An exhibit that shows learning as part of your 4-H adventure and does not fit any other class.

Science, Engineering, & Technology**10610 Mechanics**

Any exhibit that shows skills or learning in automotive, electrical, small or large engines, tractors, welding, and restoration.

10612 Automotive: Repaired or restored vehicle**10614 Electric**

Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills learned about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy sources, safety, etc.

10615 Small Engine

Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-karts, etc.

10616 Tractor: Repaired or restored tractor.**10618 Welding**

Constructed item or educational display that shows skills or learning about welding.

10620 Woodworking

Any exhibit that shows learning about wood, woodworking techniques, and safe uses of woodworking tools and machines. Exhibits may include newly constructed or refinished/reclaimed/restored wood items.

10630 Science, Engineering, & Technology

Any exhibit that shows learning about or helps explain how science and technology help us interact with the world. Topics include: aerospace, biological and chemical sciences, computers & networking, earth & climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS), robotics, or any other application of Science, Engineering or Technology. Exhibitors in the 4-H Science & Engineering & technology classes may not enter in similar FFA Ag Mechanics classes and vice versa.

Fashion Revue

The purpose of this category is to encourage the sewing of a personal garment or outfit. Garments do not have to be perfect!

1. Consideration is given to fit, color, style, suitability, attractiveness, quality of construction, stage presentation, and required care.
2. A garment or outfit consisting of one to three pieces such as party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear and/or coats are acceptable as Fashion Revue entries.
3. Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered as garments. If they are used to complete an outfit they may be constructed or selected.
4. All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected.
5. Appropriateness of an outfit or garment will only be considered in terms of fit.

Clothing Selection

The purpose of this category is to select and/or purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H'ers goal or intended use for the selected outfit.

1. Judging is based on fit, color, style, suitability, attractiveness, quality and construction features, stage presentation, required care, and cost comparison
2. There is no consideration in the judging on the amount spent, only in the process of recordkeeping and reflection on the cost of the individual items as a part of the process.
3. Outfits may be purchased at a department store, boutique, online store, sidewalk sales, retail shops or mall stores. Outfits may also be purchased at garage sales or other second hand venues with the total price of over \$15. Outfits may be gifts, hand-me-downs, relative or friend's modern or vintage clothing, or existing personal clothing, as long as the 4-H'er actually selected the item as part of this specific outfit for the stated purpose.
4. Home-sewn clothing that was not sewn specifically for the participant are acceptable, such as purchases from a used clothing store.

\$15 Challenge:

This category is designed to expand the 4-H'ers shopping experience to shopping venues emphasizing recycling, reducing and reusing.

1. Outfits must be purchase at a garage sale, consignment store, Goodwill, Salvation Army or similar place.
2. Online venues are allowed, must be second-hand in nature. Shipping and handling is not included in the total calculations.
3. Traditional shopping venues may not be used, regardless of a low regular or sale price. Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts do not qualify, but may be entered in Clothing Selection if 4-H'ers selected the items to meet a specific purpose/goal.
4. Fifteen dollars is the purchase price limit including tax. However, some second hand stores and venues do not typically charge sales tax.
5. Receipt(s) for every item included as a part of the calculated total must be submitted with the entry. A garage sale receipt can be a piece of paper with the name of the location such as "Jane Doe garage sale", date, amount paid, and signature of person selling at the garage sale. If the outfit was free at a garage sale, "free" can be listed on the report form and on the receipt. Failure to provide receipts will result in a reduced evaluation.
6. An outfit consists of major clothing pieces such as a shirt and pants or a dress. Shoes, undergarments and accessories are not included in the \$15 purchase price limit.
7. Alterations are permitted to achieve a desired look or fit.
8. There are no additional considerations for an outfit that cost less than \$15.
9. The outfit pieces should be purchased to meet the 4-Hers' goal or intended use for the purchased outfit, and the 4-Her should have had an experience in shopping alternatives, evaluating fit, quality and constructions features, price and cost comparison.

1. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits may be given by one or more 4-H'ers. Teams consisting of youth of mixed grades will be entered in the class of the member in the highest grade level (i.e. a team with a 5th grader and an 8th grader must be entered in the intermediate/senior class.)
2. Topics selected by the 4-H'er(s) should be an outgrowth of his/her 4-H experience(s). Topics should be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
3. Participants in the 4-H Communication Programs are expected to wear appropriate clothing representative of the 4-H Youth Program and/or the topic of the presentation.
4. 4-H'ers must use sanitary and safe procedures and methods at all times. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits involving food must follow established food safety guidelines.
5. All participants are expected to comply with all copyright/trademark regulations. Copyrighted material may not be distributed without permission.
6. 4-H'ers will not be allowed to check out any exhibits for use in presentations. Please have a separate set of supplies for your presentation.
7. All presentations will receive ribbon placing of Excellence, Merit or Recognition.

Educational Presentations

Educational Presentations provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience in order to gain a desired response.

Educational Presentation Rules:

1. Time Limit: Junior (5th & 6th grade) presentations must not exceed 15 minutes, Intermediates/Senior (7th -12th grade) presentations must not exceed 20 minutes. Presenters will be verbally told to "STOP" when they exceed the time limit.
2. Presentation content must be the original work of the presenter(s). Extensive paraphrasing from other sources is prohibited. Use of brief quotations or excerpts from other work(s) is permitted provided the source is identified.

Extemporaneous Speaking

The purpose is to encourage the development of communication skills by providing an opportunity to think, organize thoughts, prepare a speech, and respond to questions when given a limited amount of preparation time.

1. Limit one entry per 4-H'er. Must be senior 4-H'ers – Completed 9th through 12th grade.
2. Program Format:
 - a. Thirty minutes before the program, each participant will draw three of the available topics, selecting one to speak on.
 - The selected topic will not be available to the other participants. The general nature of the topic will relate to 4-H. The other two topics drawn but not chosen will be returned to the available topics for other participants.
 - b. A preparation area will be designated with one participant admitted initially and one additional participant admitted each 15 minutes as the program progresses. A participant may not leave the preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help from a parent, leader or other adult or youth. A program official will assist participants with the time requirements
 - c. All reference material will be screened by a program official on the following basis:
 - Participant may bring his/her own books, magazines or newspaper clippings for reference during the thirty minute preparation.
 - Reference material must be printed material such as books or magazines (cannot be notes, outlines or speeches prepared by the participant or by another person for use in this program).
 - Some relevant reference material will be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historical material related to the 4-H program.
 - d. Each Speech shall be the result of the 4-H'ers own efforts using approved reference materials that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided.
 - e. Plain 3"x5" note cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.
 - f. Each speech shall be not less than four but no more than six minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the judge.
 - g. The participant will be shown time cards in an ascending order (1,2,3,4,5) by the time keeper. "Stop" will be said at 6 minutes.
 - h. The time keeper will introduce each participant by name. The participant will be expected to introduce his/her speech by title only.
 - i. Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters or audio visuals of any sort
3. Speeches will be evaluated using the following Criteria:
 - a. Content related to topic
 - b. Knowledge of the subject.
 - c. Organization of material
 - d. Power of expression
 - e. Voice
 - f. Stage presence
 - g. General affect
 - h. Response to questions
4. A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included as a part of the program.
5. Participant will receive ribbon placing of Excellence, Merit or Recognition.

11400 Extemporaneous Speaking

Working Exhibits

The purpose is to provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to communicate, interact with, and teach an audience in an informal and experiential way.

1. Groups will be in 30 minutes sessions at county fair.
2. 4-H'ers will not be allowed to check out any exhibits for use in working exhibits. Please have a separate set of supplies for your working exhibit.
3. The 4-H'ers should be prepared to talk about any step of the process of what they are teaching.
4. 4-H'ers can only be selected for one working exhibit at the Iowa State Fair.

The best subjects involve action and involvement by the audience by doing, feeling, tasting, smelling, etc. Part of the judging will be based on how well you attract and involve the audience. Be prepared to lure the audience to your exhibit by asking such questions as: "Would you like to know how to...?" or "Did you know that...?" or "Have you ever...?"

Working Exhibit participants will receive ribbon placing of Excellence, Merit or Recognition.

If there is a large group of participants the class will be split into 30 minutes sessions


