Entries on FairEntry ~Due Friday, June 16th~

Make your Fair Entries for **STATIC & LIVESTOCK** at http://humboldtdistrictfair.fairentry.com/
You will use your 4-H Online log-in username and password to make entries, in FairEntry. You will also need to enter your YQCA certificate number for livestock. Helpsheets are on the Humboldt 4-H website. Static, Clothing & Communication Projects will also need to be entered by June 16. There will be a week for late entries so those are due June 23rd, you will pay 5 times the entry for those late entries. Same process as in the past that you will use this website: to register and it will open May 16th.

YQCA Training—Youth for the Quality Care of Animals

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national multi-species quality assurance program for youth ages 8 to 21 (4th– 12th graders) with a focus on three core pillars: food safety, animal well-being, and character development. YQCA is the new required youth quality assurance certification. If you are planning on showing swine, cattle, sheep, goats, rabbits, or poultry you need to complete YQCA. To access the training, go to https://yqcaprogram.org/ and click the purple button to REGISTER/SIGN IN. If you have previously used this platform, sign-in using your log-in information (or hit the FORGOT link). If this is your first time at YQCA, you can register and create a new account to access the training. There is a \$12 fee per child to complete this training, which is paid when you log in your child. Financial Assistance is available by contacting our office. Please have your training completed by June 16, 2023. Once you have completed the training you will see a certificate on your screen, please screen shot the certificate and email that certificate to coop_hollyk@iastate.edu_as proof of completion. You will also need the Certificate Number for Fair Entry. THIS YEAR IT WILL BE REQUIRED TO HAVE COMPLETE BEFORE YOU DO ENTRIES FOR THE FAIR. PLEASE CONTACT THE OFFICE IF YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS.

Rabbit Tattoo

All rabbits are required to have a tattoo in their left ear for the fair. Superintendents can assist with this process at rabbit check in.

Clothing Event/Communications

For 2023, we will be combining the clothing and communications judging into one day. This will take place on Thursday, July 6th at the Humboldt County Extension Office starting at 9 AM. The morning will start with clothing entries followed by communication entries. We will provide a light lunch and snacks throughout the day. FAIR BOOK CHANGES

No Bake Sale—There will NOT be a back sale during Static Judging Day. Baked goods will be displayed for the public.

Production Beef Class—NEW CLASS

This class will consist of real world conditions of the cattle industry and your animal. This will be an added class that you will have to sign up for it in June when you register your animal for the fair. The cattle will be judged by the judge of the 4H beef show and will also have a couple of local guest judges that the cattleman will pick to help the judge make the decision. There will be one champion production steer, and one champion production heifer. All steers will show against each other regardless of weight, and the heifers will do the same. Depending on how many entrants there are for each class we may have to split them for room in the show ring, but this will be determined once registration is complete.

This class will be shown right after the second year bucket/bottle calf show. Cattle will also be allowed to compete in the regular show as usual as long as they are signed up for both! The production class will be based more on animal performance.

Judges will be looking at the following from the entrants: Profitability, Feed Efficiency, Rate of Gain, Input Cost/Feed Cost/Health Cost, and Carcass grade of the animal.

- The purpose of this class is to encourage creativity and out-of-the-box thinking when creating an outfit.
- These designs can be theatrical costumes, cosplay, wearable technology, sustainable/upcycled fashion, accessible fashion, and/or outfits that use unconventional materials.
- The outfit must be showcased as a worn garment modeled by the exhibitor or by the individual that it was designed for.
- Exhibitors may make their garment entirely, or permanently alter the silhouette of pre-existing materials through some method of permanent alteration or addition.
- Consideration is given to originality and innovation.

DIY Potholders Supplies

Please note, this is what you will need for ONE potholder.

- Sewing Machine
- Scissors
- · Iron and ironing board
- (2) squares of 9"x9" fabric
- (1) rectangle of 5"x2" fabric
- (2) squares of 9"x9" insulated, heat resistant batting (I used Insul-Bright)

Breakfast Cookies

Serves: 12 Cost/Serving: \$0.18 Serving Size: 1 cookie

INGREDIENTS

3/4 cup all purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/4 cup oil (canola or vegetable)

1/3 cup packed brown sugar

1 egg

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 medium apple, diced (about 1 cup)

1 1/2 cups oatmeal

3/4 cups shredded cheese (cheddar or Colby)

1/2 cup dried fruit (cherries, cranberries, raisins)

INSTRUCTIONS

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Spray a baking sheet with nonstick cooking spray.
- 2 Stir together flour, cinnamon, and baking powder in a large bowl.
- Stir in oil, brown sugar, egg, and vanilla until well combined.
- 4 Stir in diced apple, oatmeal, cheese, and dried fruit.
- 5 Drop dough in rounded tablespoons onto greased baking sheet. Wet fingers and pat each cookie down into a circle.
- 6 Bake for 12-14 minutes, until set in the middle and lightly browned on the edges.
- 7 Store in a covered container at room temperature.

TIPS

Wash hands after handling raw cookie dough.
