IOWA COUNTY 4-H AWARDS CRITERIA

Awards are presented to 4-H'ers to recognize young people who have **gained knowledge and skills** in a specific project and who are showing evidence of **personal growth**. Awards are based on the 4-H records only. The **nomination form must be filled out and included with your record keeping system**, which is then submitted to your 4-H Club Leaders by **September 17th**.

A written recommendation by a leader or adult county committee member is required for these Senior 4-H Level Awards: Danforth "I Dare You", 4-H Scholarship, Walker Acre Scholarship, David McCartney and Zentmire Award.

Parents may inform the Records and Awards Committee or their 4-H Club Leader of any special circumstances that may exist regarding their child.

OUTSTANDING FIRST YEAR 4-H'ER

Recognizes first year 4-H'ers who have submitted their records for evaluation and have met all the following requirements:

- Attended at least half of his/her club's meetings
- Gave a presentation/working exhibit.
- Completed project records for at least **two projects**, including **at least two goals** (what you want to learn or do) in each project. No financial records needed.
- Took an active role in local and/or county activities.

(Recommendation by leader or adult county committee member is optional).

First Year Members are not eligible for Merit Awards.

PROJECT AWARDS

Project awards are presented in each of the three grade levels (junior-grades 4, 5, & 6; intermediate-grades 7 & 8; senior-grades 9-12).

These are the requirements for project awards:

- A. **Award Nomination form** for current year.
- B. **Title page** – include name, address, birth date, and club name.
- C. Completion of the **Yearly 4-H Summary** (4H-96)
- D. 4-H Story (can include 4-H highlights, frustrations, favorite projects, what you would like to do next year) Should be placed in a section following the summary.
- E. 4-H Resume, Non-project pictures and clippings should be placed in a section following the summary.
- F. **Experienced 4-H Project Record** (4H-96B) **OR Advanced 4-H Project Record** (4H-96C) or, for livestock, horticulture and crops
Pictures and/or clippings may be included in the project area

Your Records clearly show evidence of:

- at least **two new or expanded goals** in the project **each year**.
- complete **financial records** for project.
- must give one form of a planned communication, in the current 4-H year, for example: presentation, working exhibit or lead a workshop in **any project area** or 4-H related topic given at school.
- citizenship and/or leadership** activities appropriate for each grade level.

3. AGRICULTURE and NATURAL RESOURCES DIVISION

| Entomology (includes Bees) | Relating to insects and their relationship to agriculture products, public health, natural resources, and earned safe methods of insect control and management. |
| Environment | In the areas of conservation, water quality, waste management, energy, recycling or other issues related to the environment. |
| Forestry | In forest management and conservation as applied to the utilization of forest products and woodland beauty. |
| Horticulture | In planning, caring for and/or managing one or more of the following: vegetable gardens, flower gardens, fruit crops, house plants, commercial horticulture crops, landscaping or home grounds improvement. <u>Must</u> include a completed Horticulture Project Worksheet. |
| Plant Science | Relating to basic biological facts about plants and soils including plant growth factors, plant reproduction, plant characteristics and utilization of plants. |

| Wildlife | In understanding, appreciating and conserving wildlife. Includes fishing. |

4. SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING DIVISION

| Award Area | Recognizes Knowledge and Skills Gained ... |

| Aerospace | Relating to the basic concepts about space science and aeronautics. Projects include: kites, model rocketry, model airplanes and learning to fly. |
| Arc Welding | Using arc welding equipment. Including the standards for welds of maximum strength and the safe use of equipment. |

| Electric | Relating to electricity, electrical wiring and electrical safety. |

5. PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

| Camping | In basic camping (safety, equipment, outdoor cookery, etc.) through participation in a variety of camping experiences. |
| Citizenship | From participation in at least two or more citizenship activities such as: Responsibilities with family, club, community, world, learn about government, plan a community service activity and study family heritage, etc. |
| Communications | By organizing and presenting material in a variety of situations (presentations, working exhibits, speeches, debates, interviews, Share the Fun, theater, etc.) |
| Health | For maintaining personal health (for example, physical, intellectual, emotional and social health). 4-H'er must demonstrate knowledge about community health resources, environmental issues, and decision-making as related to personal, family or community health. |
| Leadership | Those who have acquired and demonstrated leadership skills and abilities within and beyond the local club level. Requirement: *Enrolled in the Leadership Project and have completed specific activities for his/her project goals. |
| Music | In the active study of music by being involved with music in a variety of ways. |
| Safety | Relating to the practice and promotion of safety in their home and community in a variety of situations. 4-H'er must demonstrate an understanding of how safety can be applied to one or more 4-H programs or projects. |
| Self Determined | Through the planning and completion of a self-designed project during the current 4-H year. |

MERIT AWARDS

Awards may be given in Junior, Intermediate and Senior levels. Members must have been a 4-H member for two years including the current year. Recipients of this award will be determined by the Awards Committee, Club Leaders will submit members. No nomination is required.

Merit Awards will be given to recognize those members whose accomplishments reflect significant personal growth, active and enthusiastic club involvement and unselfish service to 4-H members and others but have not met project record keeping requirements. Merit award winners will have taken an active role in their club, but not necessarily the leadership role.

SENIOR 4-H LEVEL AWARDS

If you wish to be considered for a senior level award (Danforth, 4-H Scholarship, Walker Acre Scholarship, David McCartney and Zentmire Award), letter of recommendation by leader, adult county committee member or council advisor must be included. **It is the member's responsibility to secure the letter of recommendation.** If you wish to be considered for Livestock Achievement or Agriculture Awards, see page 2. Leadership/Citizenship is a project award; however, at the Senior Level, special recognition will be given during the senior portion of the awards program.

4-H AK-SAR-BEN (4-H'er must have livestock, but does not have to show at Ak-Sar-Ben Livestock Show)

Recognizes 4-H'ers who...

- have been enrolled in 4-H at least three years
- must be currently enrolled in beef, dairy cattle, sheep, swine or horse
- are making significant progress toward maturity and leadership through their service for the advancement of the 4-H program in our county
- give evidence of leadership on club and county level
- give evidence of participation in county activities

Danforth "I Dare You" Leadership

This youth must exhibit personal integrity, balanced living and a potential for leadership. Recipient may receive a partial scholarship from the American Youth Foundation to attend the National Leadership Conference. This conference gives youth an opportunity to develop self-esteem and leadership effectiveness.

William F. Danforth, founder of Ralston Purina, wrote the book "I Dare You" from his personal experience. He challenged young people to their highest potential, to aspire to attain influential lives of service and good citizenship. Mr. Danforth was one of the founders of the American Youth Foundation and he and his wife established the Danforth Foundation as a major educational and community service philanthropic institution. He was particularly interested in 4-H youth.

Achievement

Recognizes 4-H'ers showing personal growth through participation in a variety of projects and activities throughout all years in 4-H. Knowledge of 4-H projects and their contribution to improving family and community living should be demonstrated.

Requirements:

- Completed sophomore year.
- Completed at least three years in 4-H in a variety of projects.
- Carried and completed records for at least one year in the citizenship and leadership projects.
- Shown leadership beyond the club level (i.e. county youth council, county project committee, etc.)
- Given presentation, working exhibit, or led a workshop, in previous and current 4-H year.
- Shown community involvement.

Iowa County Make A Difference Award

This award recognizes youth who demonstrate good character in an effort to enhance 4-H at either a club or county level. A member can receive this award in each of the 4-H age groups.

Criteria:

- Member must demonstrate excellence in the character traits of trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring, and citizenship. They use these skills to enhance the 4-H program in their club or county

How to apply:

- Members do not apply for this award. It will be nominated by leaders, superintendents, and other volunteers

David McCartney Family Traveling Trophy

This award recognizes 4-H'ers who have come through problems in their 4-H projects with persistence, perseverance, cheerfulness and evidence of good citizenship. 4-H'ers must be 14-16 years old at the time of application for this award.

Demonstrate ways you have successfully dealt with problems in your 4-H projects.

Scholarships – Two \$100 Scholarships

These scholarships recognize Senior High School members for their outstanding participation in the 4-H program. Financial need will be considered when choosing the recipients. Must be a 12th grade member-must be a freshman in college to apply).

Demonstrate outstanding leadership skills in promoting the 4-H program.

Zentmire Traveling Trophy – 2

These trophies are given to 2 outstanding Iowa County 4-H'ers for a year. At the end of the year, the trophies are passed to the next trophy winners. Junior or Senior High School 4-H'er

Demonstrate outstanding skills in promoting the 4-H program and in citizenship and leadership at the club and county levels.

The Walker Acres Opportunity – 1 \$500 Scholarship

This scholarship is given to an Iowa County 4-H'er who graduated this year and is enrolled as a college freshman. The scholarship recipient must demonstrate an ability and desire to turn adverse circumstance into opportunity for success. The recipient must also demonstrate willingness to focus on immediate tasks as steps towards achieving a goal, as this scholarship will not cover all of a student's tuition. This scholarship is one stepping stone for a 4-H'er who is willing to take a risk in order to achieve.

Recipient must be a college freshman with intentions of pursuing either a 4 or 2 year degree. They may pursue the field which is their heart's desire: nursing, agriculture, welding, mechanics, animal husbandry, teaching, writing, or poetry. The receiver must be passionate in their quest and willing to do the hard work necessary to earn success. The recipient must represent the ideas articulated in the scholarship.
