## Attended Displays

- o Butterfly House Silent auction went well. Thank you to those who donated items and placed bids. Repairs to the hoophouse and plans for the fair are being discussed with Lucy fom Forever Green. The Insect Zool held at Mercer Park this month drew over 700 people. They passed through in a line so most were talked to.
