Remember...hours requirements are as follows:

- Interns must complete 40 volunteer hours (at least 20 of those need to be JCMG-approved project hours) during their first full calendar year in the program.
- Master Gardeners who have completed their internship will need to complete 20 volunteer hours (at least 10 of those need to be JCMG-

approved project hours) and 10 educational hours during each calendar year to maintain certification

#### **JCMG Plant Sale & Flea Market**

#### Fundraiser is BACK in 2022!

A fter a COVID-19 hiatus in 2020 and 2021, we're planning to "change things up" for the Plant Sale & Flea Market (PSFM) scheduled on Saturday, May 7, 2022, at the JC Fairgrounds.

After record-setting PSFM revenues in 2018 and 2019, our recent planning discussions have centered on the health and safety for our volunteers during a global pandemic and the plants we want to sell.

Now, unfortunately, new issues with invasive species (e.g., Asian jumping worms) are a concern for gardeners (see links below for more information). As a result, it is necessary for JCMG to implement several changes for the upcoming 2022 PSFM to build on the success of previous sales and maintain safety standards for all for a project that started in 2007. The following is a summary of our recommended changes.

1. JCMG will rely on ONLY MG volunteers for plant donations. This is a big change, however many MG programs currently do this and we feel JCMGs will take the utmost care to inspect plants before making a donation. We've researched MG plant sales in Iowa and other states to develop a list of desirable plants (available on our JCMG Members only page) OR use the link (https://www.extension.iastate.edu/johnson/ content/2022-plant-sale-flea-marketinformation) and those that will not sell as well. If you have any of these plants to donate, please let Linda Schreiber (Inschreiber@gmail.com) know the cultivar, type, the bloom color and number of plants you can donate, as she is keeping an inventory of plants available for the 2022 PSFM.

- 2. We have also developed new procedures for the PSFM donations. Next spring, as you dig plants to donate, knock off all the soil and bring your plants to the Johnson County Fairgrounds where potting mix and clean/sterilized containers will be available to pot plant donations. MG volunteers will be available to help you repot your donations and will tend the plants until the sale is held. A schedule of available times to pot donations will be developed.
- 3. All perennial donations should arrive at the Fairgrounds by the end of April. This major change will allow time for plants to be repotted, inventoried and give the plants an opportunity to adjust from transplant shock.

In a subsequent newsletter we'll address shrubs, tender bulbs (cannas, etc.), vegetables, annuals, houseplants and flea market items and guidelines will be developed along with drop off times.

We feel these changes will help us better *plan* and help our program to continue to *build on the* success of previous years and ultimately *benefit our* customers.

Please contact us about helping out with the PSFM. With all of the challenges of the past year, we will need an army of MG volunteers to continue our program's record of success.

## Naked Ladies and Other Amaryllis

When we moved to Iowa in March of 2013, we were looking at established gardens and wondering, "What's coming up?" One mystery was a bed of strap-like leaves that came up in the spring and died back in the summer without blooming. What went wrong? Then late summer came, and large buds were poking up from the dead leaves, buds that look like the popular holiday Amaryllis.

Could it be related to Amaryllis? And surprise... the bud stalks grew like a long-legged "naked lady," and had beautiful pink Amaryllis flowers! It was then that I remembered the hardy "September lilies" that bloomed around my home in Georgia. A smaller species of Amaryllis, they also grew leaves in the spring that died back in the summer and had red-orange blooms in the fall. It turns out that there are several species in the genus *Lycoris*, with common names indicating the nature of the plant:'

Surprise Lily, Magic Lily, Mystery Lily, Resurrection Lily, etc. Some are called "spider" lilies, not to be confused with *Hymenocallis*, which is a different genus. The popular holiday flower commonly called "Amaryllis," is a *Hippeastrum*. The true *Amaryllis* is the Belladonna Lily. Other relatives include *Narcissus* (Daffodils), *Galanthus* (Snowdrops), and *Leucojum* (Snowflakes).

When we moved in, there were just a few Surprise lilies, planted close to the entrance of the storage area under the addition to our house. I dug them up and moved them a few feet to a place where they were less likely to be stepped on. They didn't bloom the next year, but the following year they did. Since then, the clump has grown from 6-8 blooms to 20 or more!

I also enjoy growing the holiday "Amaryllis." After the bulbs bloom, I store them in a sunny basement window until the leaves die down. I then put them in a dark corner and let them dry out. When they start showing leaves or flower buds, I bring them up and put them in a sunny window until they bloom again! After blooming, I put them in a shady corner of the garden until they die back again (bringing them in if we get a frost before the leaves die back).

Incidentally, all members of the Amaryllis family can be toxic, which means you don't want pets or small children to chew on them! Reasonable precautions should be taken when they are forced as house plants. My cats have always left them alone!
