Expectations

- 2. Demonstrate skills you've learned for the club by giving a presentation during a club meeting.
- 3. Participate in a community service project.
- Record what you've done/learned in a record book.
- 5. Reach out for help from club leaders and Extension staff when needed. We're here to help!

Meetings



What does a 4-H club do?

- Clubs meet monthly with a year-long plan for their programs. The program year runs from September 1 August 31.
 - A 4-H club elects its own officers and conducts its own business.
- Each meeting usually includes presentations (by members/leaders/parents),
 recreation/games, a family night, or field trip.
- Most 4-H clubs do a variety of community service projects. Members should decide the types of projects their club will do.
- 4-H clubs should support their members in their various projects.

What happens at a 4-H meeting?

- 4-Hers say the Pledge of Allegiance and the 4-H Pledge.
- Roll call & reading of the minutes by the secretary.
- Treasurer's report of income & expenses.



- Committees tell what they've planned or done.
- "Old business" or things talked about before.
- "New business" or new ideas, activities, and plans.
- Members give presentations.
- Food & fun are at the end!

Club Officers - A 4-H Club elects the following officers:

President - conducts meetings and appoints committees

Vice President - is in charge of the program plans

Secretary - keeps minutes and attendance records

Treasurer - pays clubs bills and deposits funds received

Recreation Leader - helps plan parties and leads games

Reporter - writes newspaper stories about club events

Historian - keeps a lasting record of the club's yearly story

4-H VOCABULARY

Projects - A 4-H project is an area of emphasis in which a 4-H'er studies, learns, and keeps records.

Exhibits - A 4-H exhibit is an item resulting from project work that the 4-H'er has chosen to bring to the fair and have evaluated by a judge.

Static Exhibits - refers to non-animal exhibits displayed in the Jackson Building

Communications -

Educational Presentations
are talks or demonstrations,
given in front of an audience,
about some topic that
interests the 4-H'er. Working
Exhibits are less formal. They
involve a one-on-one type of
demonstration technique.
Share the Fun includes
entertainment acts like
music, dance, interpretive
speech or skits. They can
involve any number of youth
from one 4-H'er to the whole
club.

4-H Enrollment - Members must re-enroll annually in 4-H Online (online database).

Code of Ethics Form - This form asks members to be responsible for doing their own project work in an ethical manner. Signed in 4-H Online.

Medical information in case of an emergency with a member. All information is kept confidential.

Livestock Identification (ID) -

All animals part of a 4-H project must be ID'd in 4-H Online.

Fair Entry - Website used to enter all fair-bound livestock, communications, static, and clothing projects for the state and county fairs.

HOW PARENTS CAN HELP

Help members select the right projects for their interests. Be aware of the child's goals and encourage record keeping.

Give encouragement and supervision, but allow the 4-Hers to do their own work.

Help youth locate financial aid for project work when needed.

Provide a place for records and other 4-H materials in the home.

Help members set standards of honesty, teamwork, and good sportsmanship.

Be willing to help whenever possible with club activities.

Encourage and support the member in attending club meetings.

Help member complete club and county activities for the year.

Give input into the county programs by participating in county meetings and serving on Youth & 4-H Committee.

Read the 4-H newsletter, Clover Connections, and help youth stay on top of deadlines.

4-H exhibits can match the interests your child already has. Do they have a garden, like to draw, want to practice giving a presentation?

Help your child keep records throughout the year so there isn't a rush to complete them before the deadline.

Seek help from Extension
Office, Club Leaders, fellow
4-Hers, and experts in
specific project areas.
