

What is a farrowing caretaker interest group?

It's a group of people who are responsible for the daily care of sows and litters in the farrowing area of any pork producing operation. Group members use a common set of educational materials and shared teaching experiences to improve skills critical for success in the farrowing area.

Why join this interest group?

Join because you want to be connected in a convenient and efficient way to peers in other operations to discuss issues concerning farrowing and devise operation-specific solutions to problems. Having the opportunity to establish a bond with others who share your interests and challenges at work is motivating. It is expected that through this interest group new and sustaining bonds between farrowing personnel at geographically dispersed operations will be established.

What will members of the interest group do?

~Nov 10th – order Farrowing Management CD ROM
Nov 17th – 12:00 to 1:30 pm CST – 1st phone/internet conference; start to review CD ROM
Nov 20th – start 1st homework assignment

Dec 1st – 12:00 to 1:30 pm CST– 2nd phone/internet conference – completed first 5 parts on the CD ROM, taken and graded the quizzes, completed homework
Dec 4th – start 2nd homework assignment

Dec 15th – 12:00 to 1:30 pm CST– 3rd phone/internet conference, completed last 4 parts on the CD ROM, taken and graded the quizzes, completed homework.

On three occasions participants are joined by phone from work, home, or any other location. A high-speed internet hookup is optional. You will have the visuals with audio on the CD ROM which was recently revised.

The group gatherings are designed to address questions about the educational materials and specific

farm issues. **Dave Stender (712)225-6196 and Drs. Reese (402-472-6425) and Locke Karriker and I will facilitate these discussions.** The homework activities and quizzes will be mailed to each group member. Members will score their own quizzes.

Do I need access to a computer?

Yes. Most of the educational materials will be supplied on a CD ROM. Therefore, it is critical to have a computer with the following system requirements.

- 1) Windows 98/NT or higher
- 2) 200Mhz Intel Processor or higher
- 3) 32MB RAM or higher
- 4) 16-bit color depth or higher
- 5) Sound Blaster compatible sound card

How much time will it take to participate in this activity?

It takes 3 to 4 hours to view the materials on the CD ROM. The homework activities should take about 1 hour and you'll probably spend 3 to 4 hours on the quizzes. Including the three group meetings you will probably spend 11 to 14 hours in total.

Has this type of educational program been offered before and what did the participants think?

Yes. A 14-member farrowing interest group was formed in January 2005 in Nebraska. On a scale of 1 (strongly agree) to 4 (strongly disagree), members indicated the group's activities met their expectations (1.5) and they would recommend it to others (1.3).

One owner/operator wrote "Having my three employees attend the Farrowing Caretaker Interest Group is having more impact on my operation than anything we have done in 15 years. Their attitude is much improved."

Won't I learn as much by simply viewing the Farrowing

Management CD ROM myself?

No. While the CD ROM is very informative and user-friendly educational tool, it does not connect you to peers in other operations and the authors to discuss issues and solve farrowing problems. Also, there will be limited opportunity to test your knowledge of the subject matter and to probe deeper into certain subjects.

General Information

This activity is designed for people who work in the farrowing area of any conventional pork producing operation. It covers the basics in lactating sow and piglet care. Although the activity is designed for beginners, it has also served as a refresher for people experienced in farrowing management.

Below is a partial list of tasks that you should be able to perform or perform better as a result of participating in this activity:

- ✓prepare the sow and farrowing space
- ✓know when and how to assist a sow to farrow induce sows to farrow
- ✓process piglets
- ✓manage the sow to maximize feed intake
- ✓identify and treat pig and sow health problems
- ✓identify disadvantaged pigs and improve their survival rate
- ✓euthanize disadvantaged piglets
- ✓keep records
- ✓recognize normal behavior of pigs and sows
